Amendment to the City's FY2016 General Fund, Non Departmental Budget, by transferring \$200,000 from HDL Economic Development Grant and appropriating an additional \$200,000 to restore funding for the longstanding 'Clean and Safe'

**PURPOSE:** To amend the FY2016 General Fund Budget (Ord. 2015-73-84) by transferring \$200,000, within Non Departmental, from HDL Economic Development Grant, and appropriating an additional \$200,000 to restore funding for the longstanding Clean and Safe program.

**REASON:** This paper would transfer \$200,000 within Non Departmental from an economic development grant for HDL (the downtown company that has been sold) to another entity within Non Departmental.

\$200,000 is recommended to be transferred to Venture Richmond which runs the Clean and Safe program. The budget passed on May 15, 2015 reduced Venture Richmond by \$200,000. This represented a 29% reduction to the Clean and Safe Program which provides baseline services for Downtown. Additionally, this amendment represented a 100% cut to the Community Business Group (CBG), a locally owned, minority contractor for the program. The restoration of these funds would ensure that the Clean and Safe program continues to effectively operate.

BACKGROUND: In 2000, the Downtown business community agreed to increase its financial support for enhanced services Downtown by increasing the Special Service District tax from \$0.03 to \$0.05 (a 67% increase)—provided that the City would be a 50/50 funding partner by outsourcing the Downtown sidewalk cleaning program at \$700,000 annually to Richmond Renaissance, now called Venture Richmond.

Since that time, the City has continued outsourcing Clean & Safe each year by allocating \$700,000 in the Non Departmental budget each year from 2000-2015. The adopted FY2016 budget changed this policy by reducing Clean & Safe by \$200,000, or a 29% reduction.

During that same timeframe (2000-2016), the overall value of real estate assessments in downtown increased while the City share has not, which means the City has leveraged its investment relative to the private sector. In other words, the increase and expansion of enhanced services has been shouldered by the business community and downtown property owners.

This outsourcing contract of \$700,000 per year has not increased for 14 years, while costs have increased. All of the increases in costs have been covered by the business community through the Special Service District tax, not City funding. The City's investment of \$700,000 is leveraged 2.6 times by the business community's investment and represents 23.6% of the total program.

Absent restoration of these funds, the vendor Community Business Group would have to eliminate and reduce the following Clean & Safe services:

- Eliminate the Safety Ambassador program
- · Reduce the sidewalk cleaning program:
  - 1. Reduce frequency of service Monday Friday in Central Business District (Broad, Grace, Franklin, Main and Cary Streets from 1<sup>st</sup> to 18<sup>th</sup>) from twice daily to once
  - 2. Reduce frequency of service around bus stops and the bus transfers to once daily
  - 3. Reduce frequency from outlying areas from daily to twice per week
  - 4. Weed abatement would change from continuous preventative efforts to "as needed" once per month
  - 5. Eliminate Saturday and Sunday sidewalk cleaning
  - 6. Eliminate steam cleaning the sidewalks
  - 7. Eliminate the annual mulching of 450 tree wells
  - Reduce office staff

CBG endeavors to hire individuals who are or have been actively and successfully participating in social service and/or rehabilitation organizations and programs. The reduction in funding would negatively impact a number of employees who would lose their job or have their weekly hours greatly reduced. The reduction will reduce the program by 5 FTEs.

Last year, the Clean and Safe program:

- Provided information to 7,764 individuals and support for 88 events
- Picked up 103,114+ gallons of trash in the 440 block service area
- Steam cleaned 187 block faces and cleaned homeless waste spots
- Removed and controlled weeds on sidewalks and tree wells in the 440 block service area

Having a Downtown that is clean and safe is critical to the success of the area. Downtown competes with suburban office parks for businesses and these parks have fully funded grounds maintenance programs. Clean & Safe is critical to business retention and attraction Downtown, which has 7.8 million sf of occupied space and 1.2 million sf of vacant space. It is important to attracting and retaining Downtown residents, whose numbers have grown from 6,000 in 2000 to almost 20,000 in 2015. It is also important to the 190 restaurants whose customers come from all over the region.
