Engaging impacted families in the immediate aftermath of a firearm injury or death

What is the Trauma Healing Response Network (THRN)?

- **Created in 2021** through a partnership with Richmond City Council, the Richmond and Henrico Health Districts, and the Richmond Behavioral Health Foundation.
- Engages impacted families in the aftermath of a firearm injury or death through an **evidence-based, trauma-informed lens**, but most importantly, a healing-centered way.
- **Convenes 53 community partners** providing resources in housing, food access, mental health support, and education to mitigate violence across all community spaces.
- Provides **direct connection** to community partners, short-term case management, and long-term resource referrals.

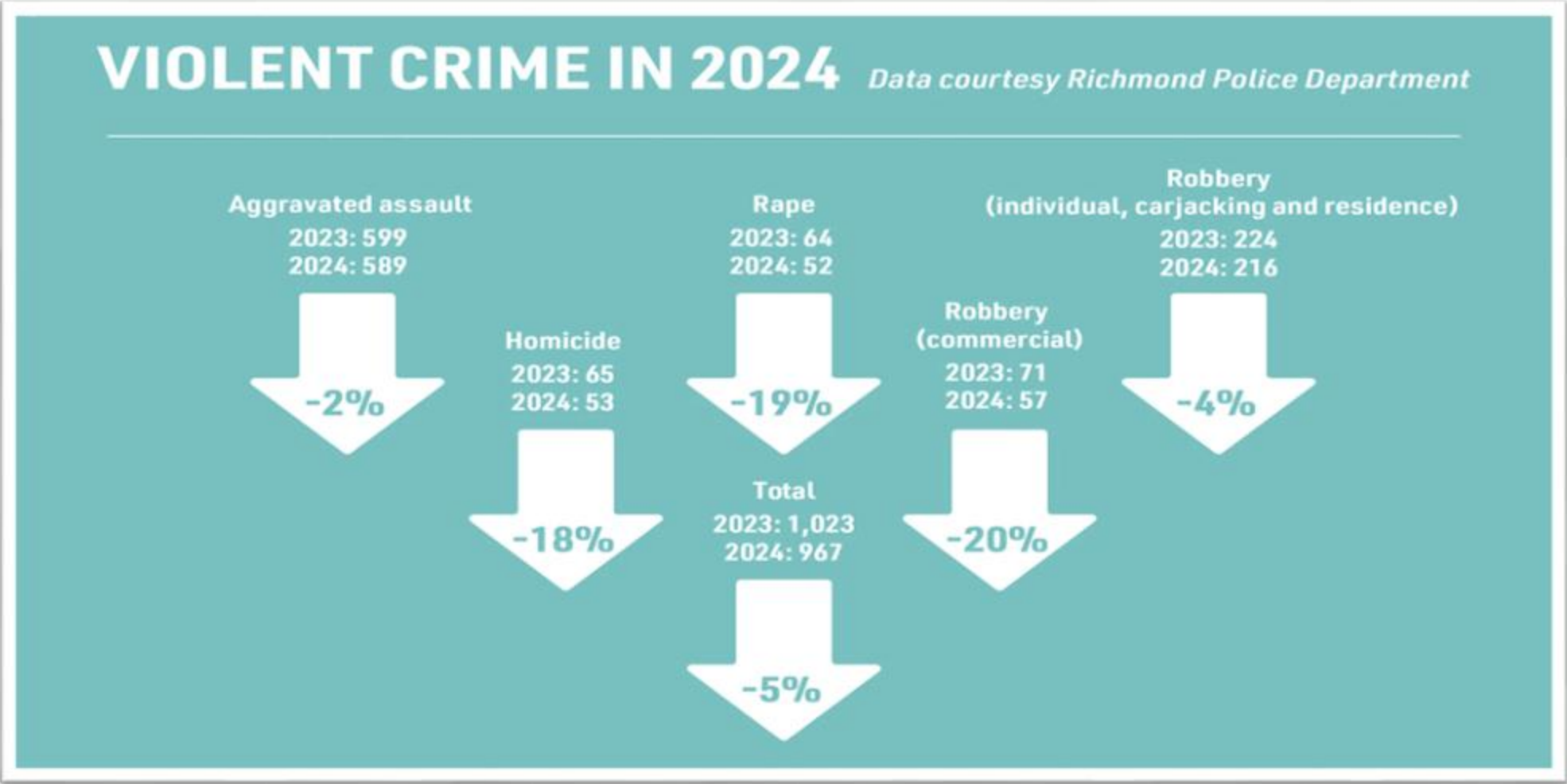
THRN and GVPI in Richmond

THRN supports three pillars of Richmond's Gun Violence Prevention and Intervention Framework:

1. Crisis intervention and wrap around services
2. Intensive case management
3. Credible messengers



Violent Crime continues to Decline in Richmond

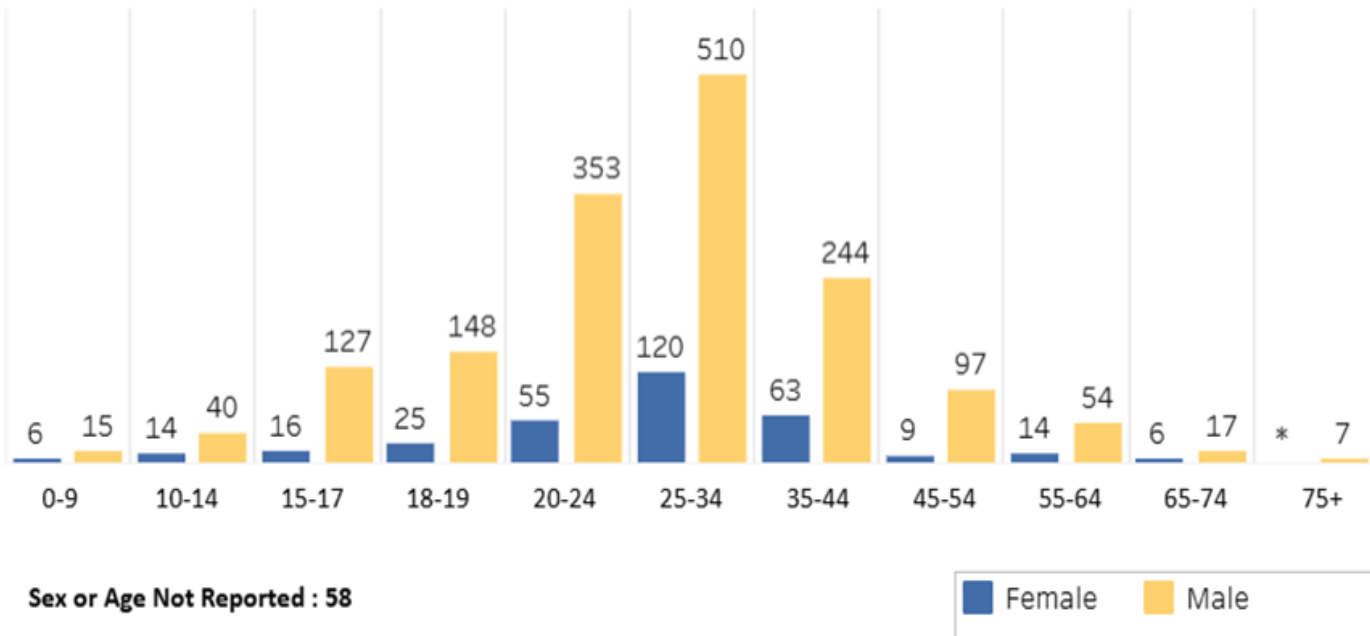


How did THRN help impact those outcomes in FY 2025? With your help...

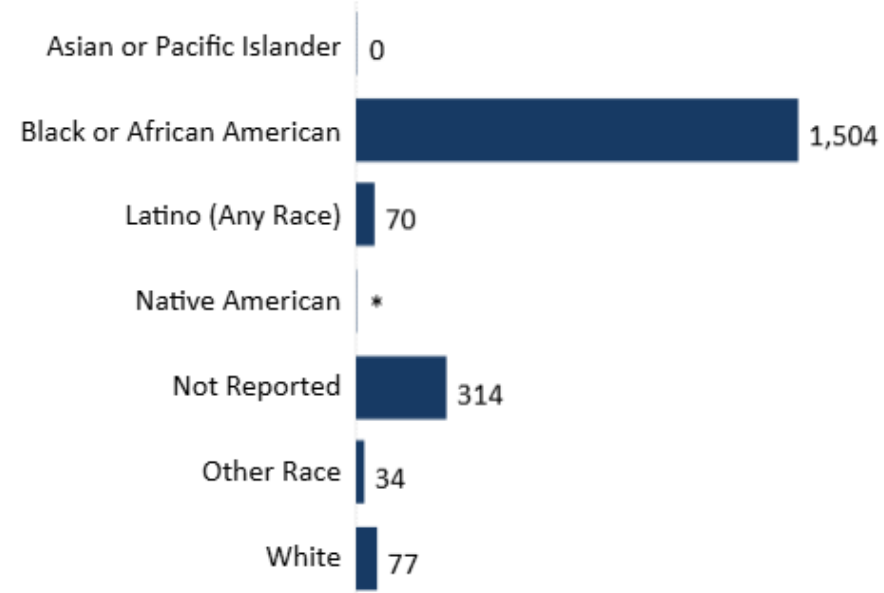
- + **3,490 Community Wellness Checks**
- Reached + **8,741 residents** through mentoring, outreach, support groups, and events
- Disbursed + **\$36K** in emergency funds to support families and communities impacted by firearm violence
- Provided **emergency housing to 16 families** including **4 permanent relocations**
- Engaged **37 high-risk cases** to prevent retaliation-related violence
- Implemented a community-based, trauma-informed, relationship-building curriculum
- Strengthened partnerships with mental health providers
- Deepened collaboration with RPS and students, including new efforts with **MLK, Huguenot, Thomas Jefferson and Armstrong High Schools**

Firearm Injuries by Race/Ethnicity (Counts), ED Visits by Residents of Richmond Health District, 2019 - 2025[^]



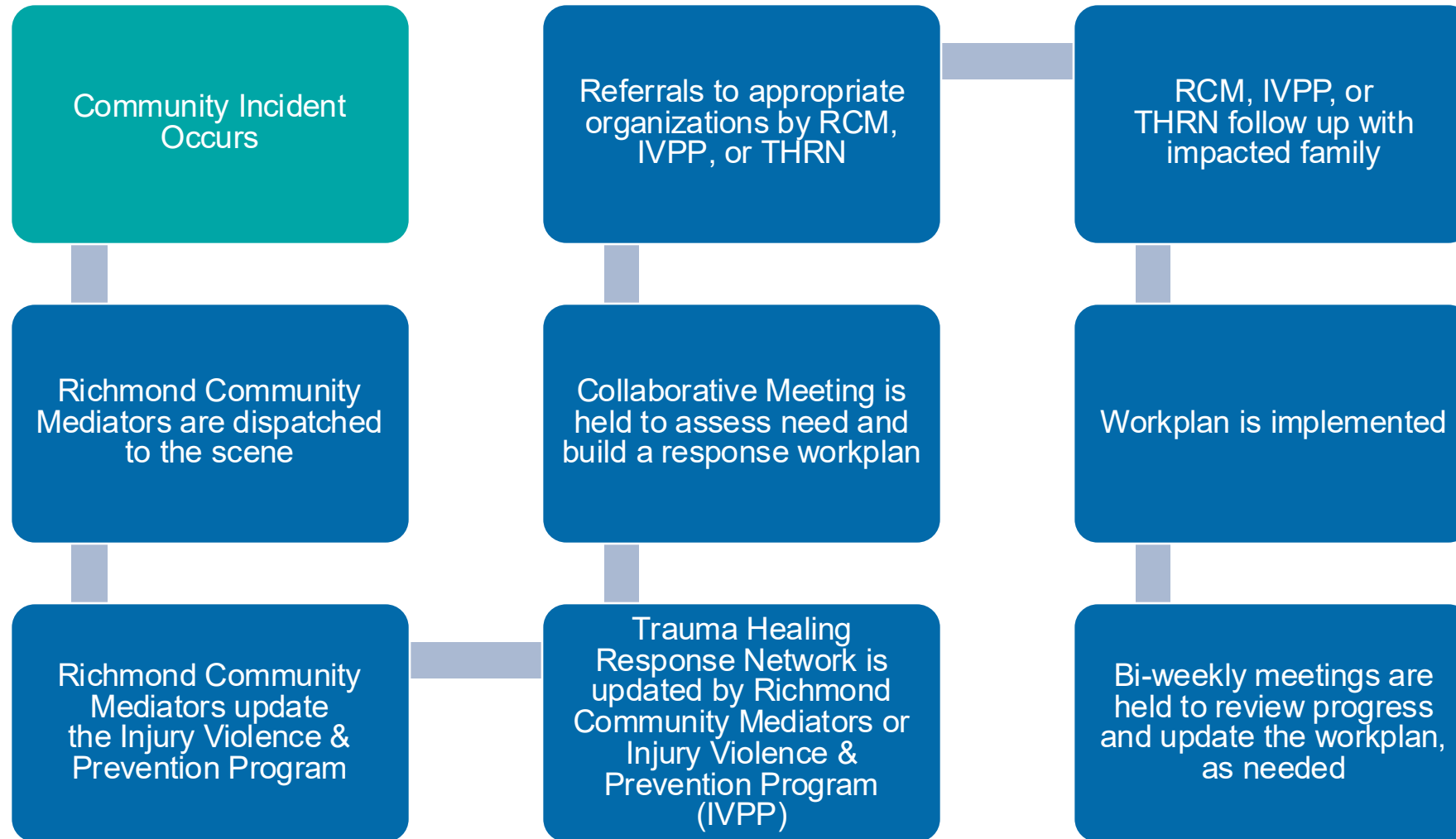

Incident Response Flow Process



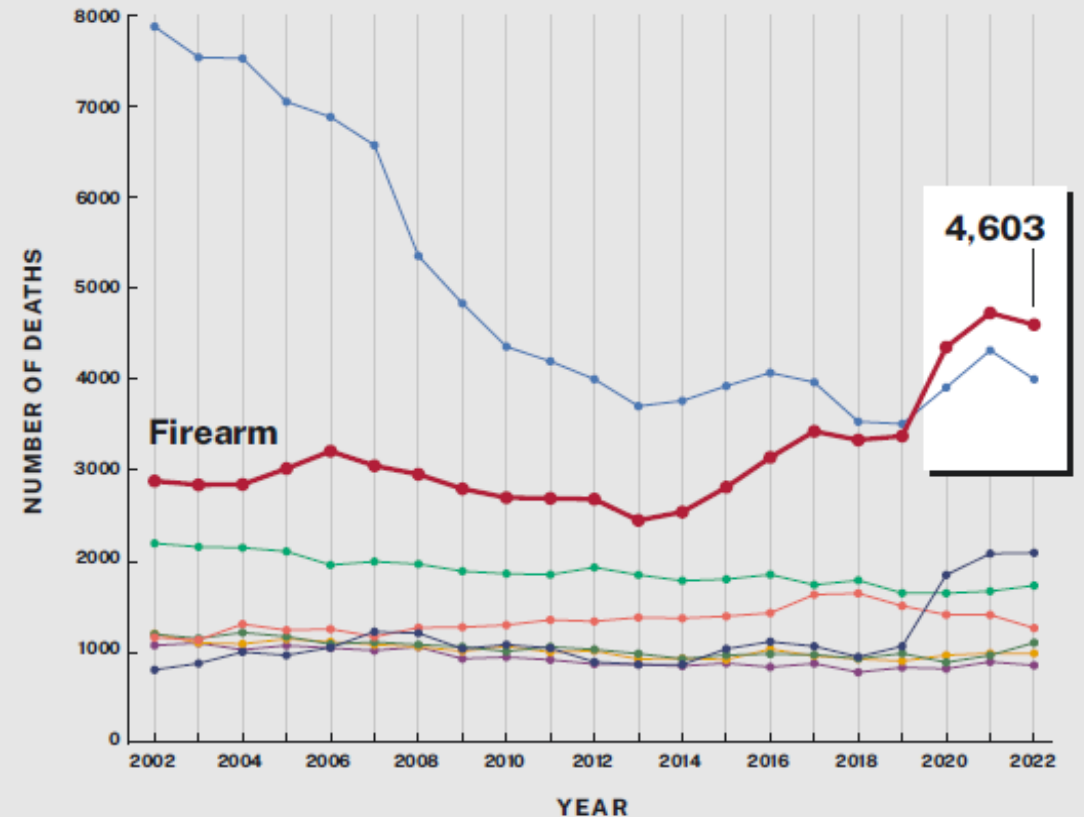
"High levels of exposure to firearm violence for both children and adults give rise to **a cycle of trauma and fear within our communities**, contributing to the nation's mental health crisis."

Firearms are the leading cause of death for children and adolescents

1-19 years of age in the United States, 2002-2022

- Motor Vehicle
- Poisoning (Drug and Non-drug)
- Cancer
- Suffocation
- Congenital Anomalies
- Drowning
- Cardiovascular Disease

- New Relationship Wellbeing Course launches 6/14

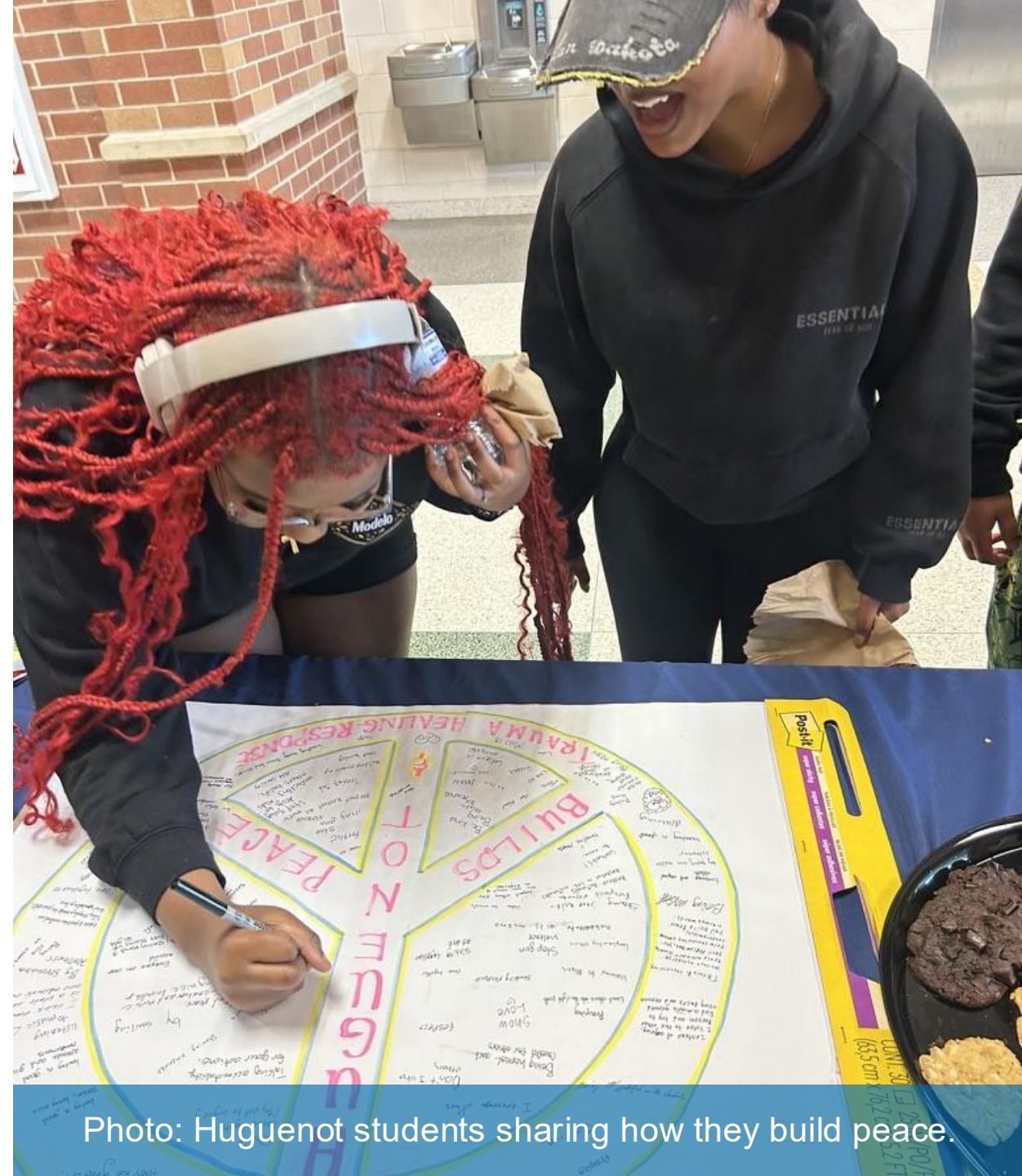

- Just C Community Hub – serving 6th/7th districts

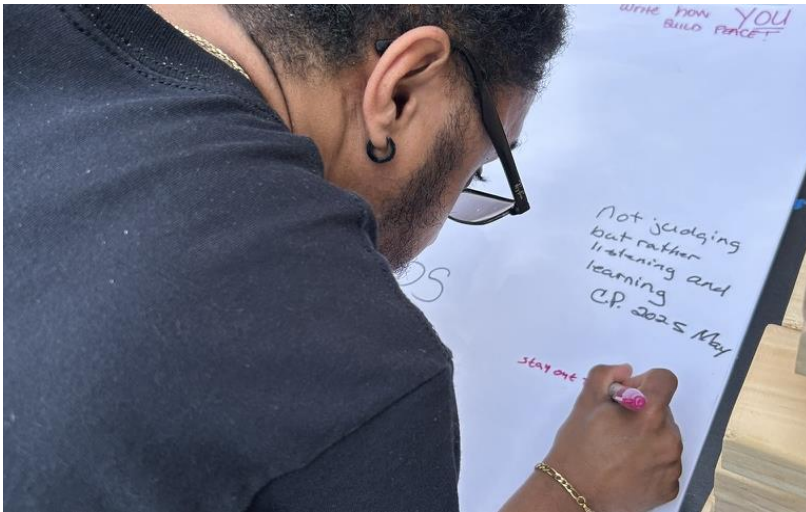

What Makes The THRN Unique?

LEVERAGE

- Coalition of more than 50 partners.
- Healing-centered, integrated approach
- Strength of relationships ensures people receive timely, culturally responsive care and access to resources.

RELATIONSHIP-DRIVEN

- Collaborative process with community members, partners, and city agencies
- Shared protocol ensure transparency, timely coordination, and accountability.

SUPPORT WITHOUT OBSTACLES

- We make healing resources easy to access.
- By addressing barriers like transportation, stigma, or lack of information, we meet people where they are.

WE BUILD PEACE

- Safe Zones were launched in the 6th, 7th, and 8th districts to strengthen local access to support.
- Zones are proactive –not reactive – spaces.

THRN Funding Impacts

**FY26 Proposed:
\$300,000**

- 30+ partners minimally supported
- No funding for public events or outreach
- Less than Year 1 funding

FY24: \$500,000+

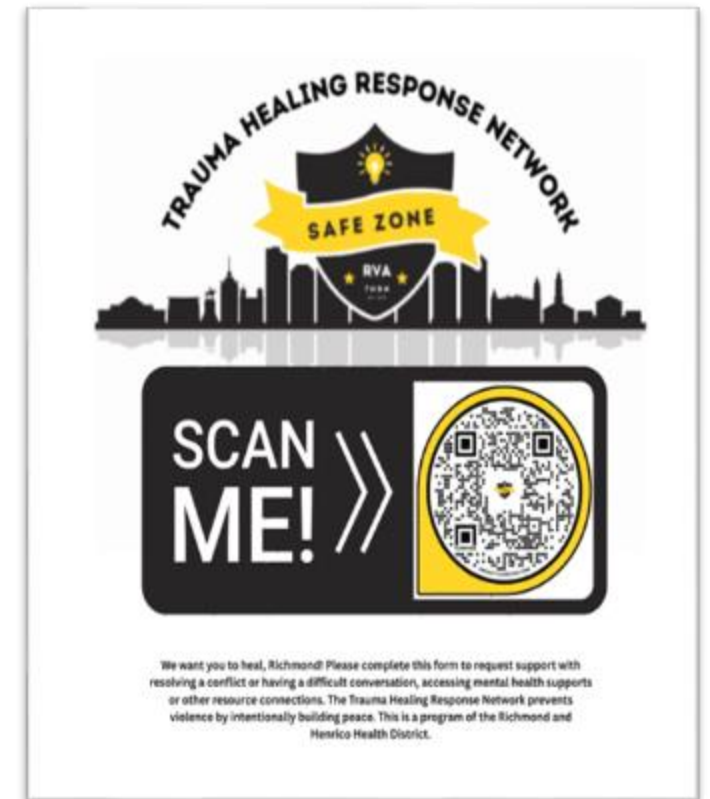
- Expanded reach through new partnerships
- Launched community-focused relationship-building curriculum
- Supported partner programs to focus on high-need areas

FY25: \$700,000+

- Grew network to 53 organizations
- Increased engagement with Spanish-speaking communities
- Increased engagement with parents and mental health providers
- Piloted mobile app for care coordination/data tracking
- Opened Safe zones in the 6th, 7th and 8th districts
- Formalized coordinated response protocol with DJS, VCU, RPD

Why maintain or increase THRN investment?

- THRN unites trusted community partners to deliver **sustainable, coordinated impact**
- Since THRN inception, **homicides in Richmond decreased 41%** (from 91 to 53) in 2024
- The model is **proactive, healing-centered, and results-driven**
- Investing in THRN is investing in the **safety and well-being** of Richmond residents
