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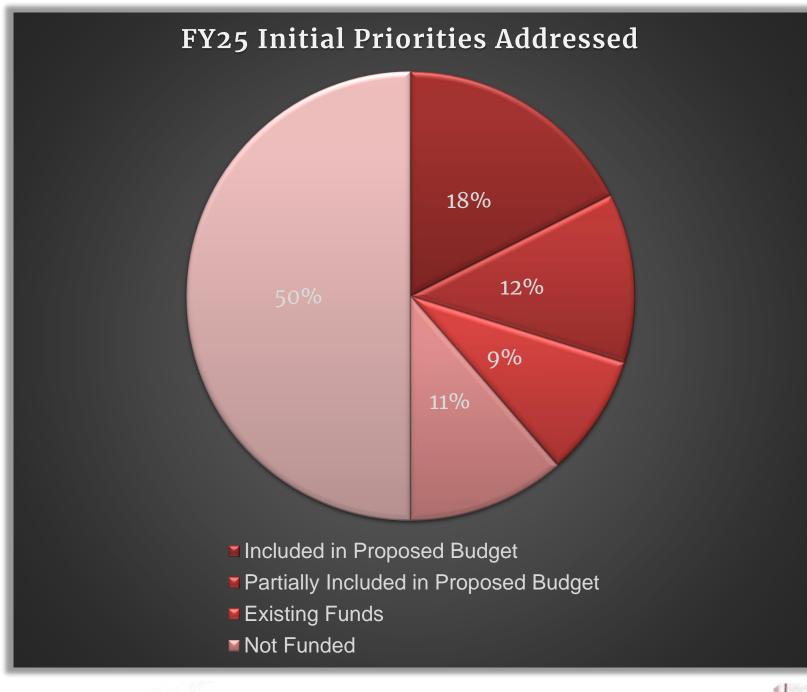

## Balancing Act

Reduction justification to establish a methodology that can be consistently applied across the proposed budget

#### Service Impact

 An initial judgement has been made that this reduction would have limited impact on service levels for Richmond residents. Considerations are given to time to hire or contract, maintenance of service levels over time, etc.

#### **Business Justification**

 A determination has been made that a sufficient business justification has not been provided to support the allocation of funds to this project or business area

#### Prior Funding

 Prior funding has been put towards this project, subject, or business area in the past 3 years and no discernable metrics (qualitative or quantitative) have been provided or shown that adequately demonstrates additional funding will improve outcome
