MOTIONS TO AMEND

1. To amend Ord. No. 2023-068, which authorized the special use of the property known as 3600 Grove Avenue for the purpose of a multifamily dwelling containing up to 260 dwelling units and amenity spaces, with off-street parking, upon certain terms and conditions, to revise the plans and certain terms and conditions.
2. To amend Ord. No. 2023-071, which adopted the annual budget, which includes all of the separate current expense budgets for the general operation of the City government and for each utility as defined in ch. 13 of the City Charter, for the fiscal year commencing Jul.1, 2023, and ending Jun. 30, 2024, and to appropriate the estimated revenues for such fiscal year for the objects and purposes stated in such budget, to revise and reallocate certain funds.
3. To amend Ord. No. 2023-073, which accepted a program of proposed Capital Improvement Projects for the fiscal year beginning Jul. 1, 2023, and for the four fiscal years thereafter; to adopt a Capital Budget for the fiscal year beginning Jul. 1, 2023; and to determine the means of financing the same, to revise and reallocate certain funds.

To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer to accept funds in the amount of \$65,800.00 from the Virginia Office of the Attorney General, and to appropriate the increase to the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Special Fund Budget by increasing estimated revenues and the amount appropriated to the Department of Police's Office of the Attorney General Special Fund by \$65,800.00, for the purpose of supporting gun violence reduction initiatives in the city of Richmond. **{No Committee – Rule VI(B)(3)(c)}**

6. To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer to accept funds in the amount of \$300,000.00 from the Virginia Office of the Attorney General, and to appropriate the increase to the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 Special Fund Budget by increasing estimated revenues and the amount appropriated to the Department of Police's Office of the Attorney General Special Fund by \$300,000.00, for the purpose of purchasing protective equipment for on-duty police officers in the city of Richmond. **{No Committee – Rule VI(B)(3)(c)}**
7. To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer and the Director of Procurement Services, for and on behalf of the City of Richmond, to execute the sixth Contract Modification to Contract No. 16000022041 between the City and Manchester Marketing, Inc. T/A Seibert's Towing for towing-related services and tow lot operation for the purpose of documenting the exercise of the third renewal option of Contract No. 16000022041. **{Public Safety – April 25, 2023}**
8. To repeal City Code § 4-53, concerning supervision and control of the animal shelter and impoundment and release procedures, to repeal City Code § 4-275, concerning impoundment and violation notice and the fee for board and care, to amend ch. 4, art. II, div. 1 of the City Code by adding therein new §§ 4-53.1 and 4-275.1, and to amend City Code §§ 4-1, concerning definitions, 4-55, concerning hindering, molesting or interfering with an officer, 4-243, concerning prohibition on dogs running at large and penalty, 4-244, concerning care and control of animals and penalties, and 4-372, concerning reporting of bites, for the purpose of modifying the policies and procedures for animal care and control in the city of Richmond. **{Governmental Operations – April 26, 2023}**
9. To amend ch. 4, art. IV, div. 3 of the City Code by adding therein a new section 4-401, concerning exotic and wild animals. **{Governmental Operations – April 26, 2023}**
10. To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer, for and on behalf of the City of Richmond, to execute a Covenant of Purpose, Use and Ownership by the Maymont Foundation for the benefit of the United States Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration for the purpose of enabling Maymont Foundation to accept \$8,000,000.00 from the United States Department of Commerce, Economic Development Administration for renovations to the Maymont House Museum and animal habitats. **{Land Use, Housing and Transportation – April 27, 2023}**
11. To designate the 3100 block of Hull Street in honor of Preston Brown and Kirby Carmichael. (Ms. Trammell) **{Land Use, Housing and Transportation – April 27, 2023}**
12. To direct the conveyance of the City-owned real estate known as 3017, 3001, 2909, 2907, and 3101 North Arthur Ashe Boulevard and 2728 Hermitage Road, consisting of 60.966± acres, for nominal consideration to the Economic Development Authority of the City of Richmond. **{Planning Commission – May 1, 2023}**

13. To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer, for and on behalf of the City of Richmond, to execute the Diamond District Redevelopment Project Development Agreement between the City of Richmond, Virginia, RVA Diamond Partners LLC, and the Economic Development Authority of the City of Richmond for the purpose of providing for the financing, construction, maintenance, and operation of public improvements and private development within an area generally known as the Diamond District along North Arthur Ashe Boulevard and Hermitage Road. **{Organizational Development – May 1, 2023}**
14. To authorize the special use of the properties known as 601 West 19th Street and 603 West 19th Street for the purpose of two single-family detached dwellings and two dwelling units within accessory buildings to single-family detached dwellings, upon certain terms and conditions. (Mayor Stoney – By Request) **{Planning Commission – May 15, 2023}**
15. To authorize the special use of the property known as 1700 North 21st Street for the purpose of a single-family detached dwelling and two single-family attached dwellings, with off-street parking, upon certain terms and conditions. (Mayor Stoney – By Request) **{Planning Commission – May 15, 2023}**
16. To authorize the special use of the property known as 1700 West Cary Street for the purpose of one two-family detached dwelling and three two-family attached dwellings, upon certain terms and conditions. (Mayor Stoney – By Request) **{Planning Commission – May 15, 2023}**

23. To amend and reordain City Code § 9-58, which assigns polling places in the city, to relocate the polling places for Precinct 701 and Precinct 705. (Mrs. Newbille) **{Governmental Operations – May 24, 2023}**
24. To erect two additional stop signs at the intersection of Nottoway Avenue and Fauquier Avenue for the purpose of making the intersection an all-way stop. (Mrs. Lambert) **{Land Use, Housing and Transportation – June 22, 2023} (60 – DAY PAPER)**

RESOLUTIONS

25. To repeal Res. No. 2009-R22-30, adopted Mar. 9, 2009, concerning a major snowstorm, Res. No. 2011-R93-92, adopted Sept. 6, 2011, concerning Hurricane Irene, Res. No. 2020-R041, Jun. 8, 2020, concerning civil unrest, and Res. No. 2021-R006, adopted Jan. 11, 2021, concerning potential civil unrest, for the purpose of terminating the respective states of emergency. **{Public Safety – April 25, 2023}**
