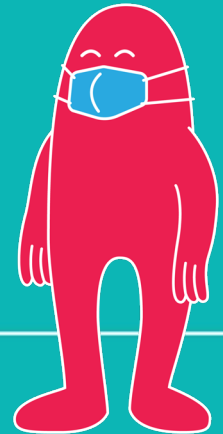

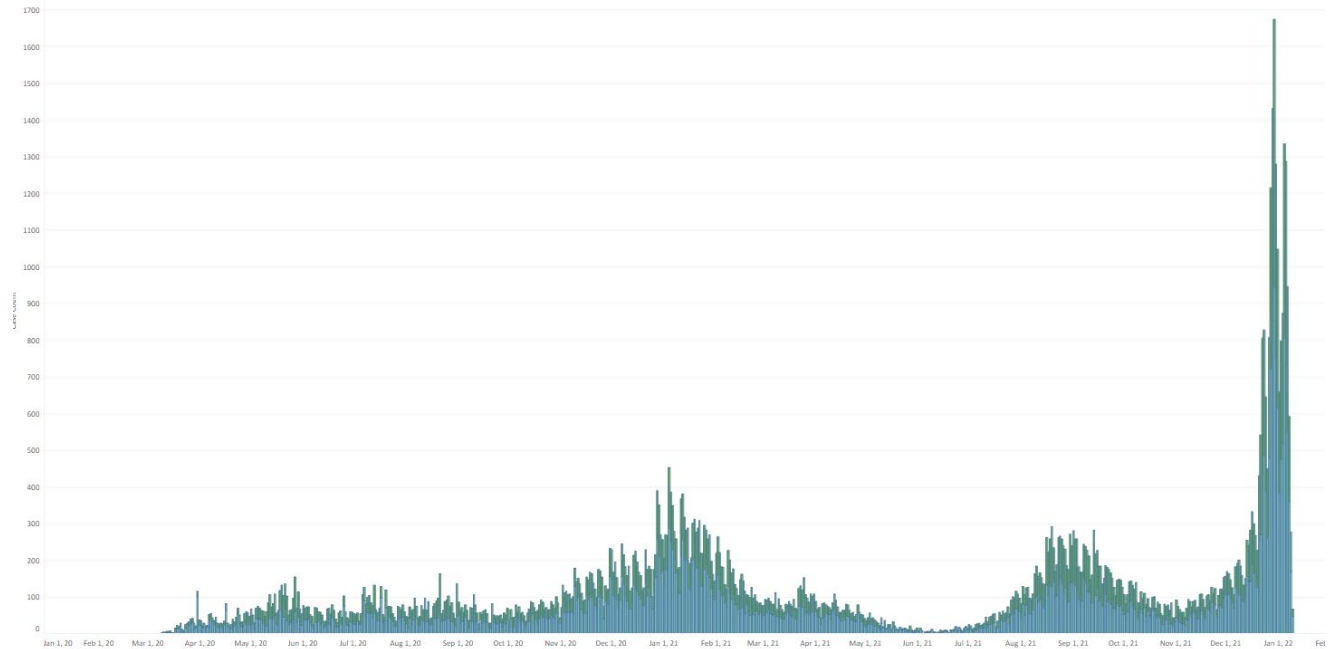

*Dec. 13, 2021—Jan. 9, 2022*

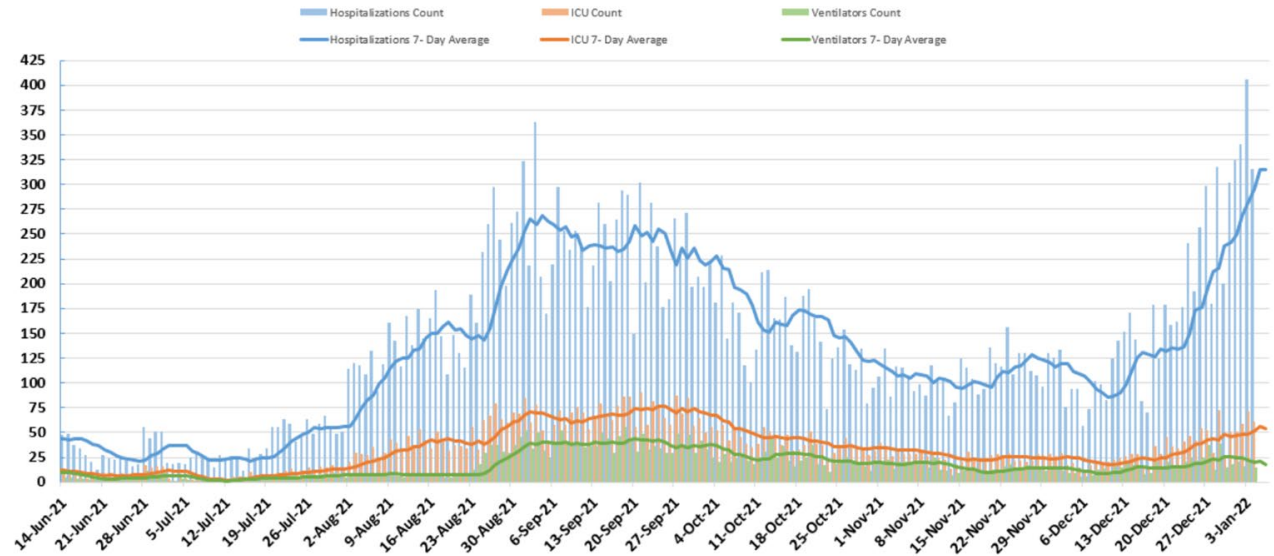
Cases by Date of Event - Richmond City & Henrico County

# Virtually or in-person?

## Consider:

- Ability to maintain distance, individuals' vaccination statuses, how to handle multiple Council members in isolation or quarantine, and how the public can be involved while isolating or quarantining.
- Local COVID-19 transmission levels:
  - 7-day PCR positivity rate in Richmond: **33.5%**
  - 7-day case rate: **1,391.71** per 100,000 (*CDC defines transmission status as High at a case rate of over 100*)

# Virtually or in-person?

## We recommend:

- Vaccination status reporting. Anyone attending in-person be up-to-date with their COVID-19 vaccinations
- Mask wearing during the entirety of the meeting, even while speaking
- Distancing individuals at least six feet apart—both members and the public
- Assuring that the meeting space's HVAC is in good working order; avoid meeting in smaller and less-ventilated spaces.
- Screening. No one should participate in-person if they have symptoms of COVID-19, or, per CDC guidance, should be isolating or quarantining
- Given current test scarcity, it is likely not be feasible to encourage testing before attending public events, but this could be considered once at-home tests becomes more available
