WORK PLAN PURPOSE

The purpose of the PAC Work Plan is to further the City's economic, infrastructural, environmental, and cultural success by judiciously partnering with artists to creatively address City-defined priorities.

BACKGROUND, SUMMARY & RECOMMENDATION

Background

The Public Art Commission first approved its FY21-FY22 Work Plan on June 25, 2020 and received approval of the Plan by the City Planning Commission on July 6, 2020.

Following a tumultuous summer and fall, a number of developments and opportunities (precipitated by the City and State governments) have required the PAC to reassess and modify the Work Plan.

Summary of Changes

- **Voting District Locations:**

Addition of a Voting District Six project (Hillside Court)

Deletion of a Voting District Seven project (Low Line Green)

- **Funding Allocations**

Southside Regional Park & Community Center: from \$175K to \$200K

Community Gardens: from \$75K to \$100K

Shockoe Bottom: from TBD to \$500K

Historic Fulton Memorial Park from \$50K to \$75K

Monument Avenue: from \$1M to TBD

Westover Hills: from \$25K to \$50K

Hillside Court: from \$15K to \$50K

[total new dollar commitment (sans Monument Ave) = \$975K; leaves \$275K from a total budget of \$125M]

Recommendation: Staff recommends approval of these changes to the Work Plan.
