BUILDING BACK AFFORDABLE HOUSING (\$32.3 MILLION)



- \$20 million Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) issued.
- 6 awards made for \$1.9 million for housing related services.
- 23 awards made for \$16.1 million to create 2,104 units.
- A total of \$18 million has been obligated and \$3.1 million has been spent.



Creighton Court

- All agreements have been finalized and the installation of the infrastructure for Phase I is underway.
- Construction is underway. All construction is expected to be completed by July.
- A total of \$6.8 million has been obligated and \$2.8 million has been spent.





BUILD BACK STRONGER: \$8.8 MILLION

Small Business Grants (Allocated: \$1 million, Obligated: \$900,043, Expended: \$858,403)

- Cooperation agreement with EDA for the administration of the grants. Cooperation agreement executed June 2023 for \$700,000.
- \$473,597 in grants disbursed to seven qualified businesses.
- \$199,000 has been committed to 3 additional businesses
- All funds anticipated to be disbursed by June 2024.

Façade and Beautification (Allocated: \$2 million, Obligated: \$858,467, Expended: \$424,775)

- Two façade improvement projects are underway on 1129 & 1433-35 Hull Street and should be completed by the end of May.
- Field visits and design modifications are underway for gateway enhancements at 17 locations throughout the city.
- Contractor also selected to plant over 600 trees citywide within the public right of way and in vacant tree wells.

Build Back Stronger (\$8.8 million – Continued)

Office of Community Wealth Building Workforce Development & Community Ambassadors (Allocated: \$1.5 million, Obligated: \$594,678, Expended: \$469,678)

- Workforce development activities have commenced. Awarded three grant contracts for the following:
- •Guaranteed income pilot program (Help Me Help You Foundation)
- Comprehensive skilled trades and credentialing program (Legacy Nexus Foundation)
- •Comprehensive skilled solar pane training program (Bridging the Gap in Virginia)

Employee First-Time Homebuyers Assistance Program (Allocated: \$1.3 million, Obligated: \$1.3 million, Expended: \$0)

- City Council adopted Ord. 2023-258 on October 10, 2023.
- Responses to the RFP have been evaluated, negotiations finalized, and entered into a final contract.

CDFI Revolving Loan (Allocated: \$3.0 million, Obligated: \$0, Expended: \$0)

• An ordinance was introduced on May 28th to reallocate the funds. The CDFI program is being funded through the 2nd quarter reappropriation paper that was adopted on May 13, 2024.



BUILDING BACK GREENER AND MORE RESILIENT (\$19.2 MILLION)

Climate Risk Assessment

Allocated: \$1,540,000

Obligated: \$49,910

Expended: \$49,910

- Climate Vulnerability Assessment is complete and included in RVAGreen 2050.
- Neighborhood Climate Resilience Grant Program 20 applications for over \$1.3 million in requests. 17 organizations selected for a total of \$865,000. City Council adopted an ordinance in April 2024 authorizing these grants.
- Urban Forest Master Plan RFP drafted anticipated to solicit in May in coordination with the \$6.0 million USDA Black-and Brown Led Urban Greening Grant.

Lead Line

Allocated: \$1,000,000

Obligated: \$989,618

Expended: \$967,578

- As of March 31, 2024, 188 Lead Service Line (LSL) applications have been approved or completed resulting in payments of \$967,578 and obligations of \$989,618.
- It is anticipated that an additional one or two replacements can be completed from the waitlist before funds are 100% obligated.
- Water Utility Enterprise funds used for replacements in right-of-way.
- The LSL Replacement Grant program received funding from the Virginia Department of Health (VDH). Additional VDH funding is pending.



BUILDING BACK GREENER AND MORE RESILIENT (\$19.2 MILLION - CONTINUED)

- Project 1: McGuire & Chapel Drive (\$8.7 million)
 - Utility relocation complete, contract awarded, and construction started in April.
- Project 2: Whitehead Road (\$3.0 million)
 - Construction started in November and is anticipated to be complete by Fall 2024.
- Project 3: Broad Rock Manor (\$0.8 million)
 - Construction completed

Storm Water

Allocated: \$12,500,000

Obligated: \$11,813,896

Expended: \$953,786



- \$2.0 million for moderate repair activities up to \$45,000 per home.
- 120+ applications received and reviewed for eligibility.
- Total of 35 projects: 18 projects completed, 3 under construction, 5 contracted pending constructions, 5 more are pending contracts and 4 waiting for bids to be returned.
- \$2.2 million for substantial rehabilitation activities administered by Project:HOMES up to \$60,000 per home. Working to finalize and execute contract.

BUILD BACK SAFER \$8.5 MILLION

Gun Violence Prevention (Allocated: \$1.5 million, Obligated: \$1,166,585, Expended: \$1,166,585)

- \$500,000 dedicated to prevention measures, such as gun buy back. First buy back event held August 20, 2022. Collected over 450 weapons and distributed \$67,500 in gift cards. In June 2023, Council authorized the second gun buy back event. Second gun buy back event was held on August 12, 2023. Collected 260 weapons and distributed \$51,000 in gift cards.
- In the process of planning the next buy back event.
- Also supporting the Police Department's gun violence prevent efforts, including the purchase of technology for the Real Time Crime Center. The purchase of this technology is anticipated to occur by next quarter.

Enhanced Lighting and Cameras (Allocated: \$2.0 million, Obligated: \$1.2 million, Expended: \$766,501)

- Cameras: Midway through plan development for traffic intersections. Invitation for bid is underway to contract for the installation of the cameras.
- Avigilon camera migration: RPD is partially migrated, with Precinct 3 and HQ coming online in Avigilon soon
- Timmons is finalizing the fourth plan submittal, DPW is overseeing intersection fiber upgrades, and DPU is interfacing with Dominion for many of the lighting priorities.

First Responder Bonus (Allocated: \$5.0 million, Obligated: \$4,625,979, Expended: \$4,625,979)

- Bonuses for city public safety and RAA staff have been provided.
- Total of \$4,625,979 expended for a total of 1,479 full-time and part-time equivalent positions.
