

Firearm Injuries in Virginia: Emergency Department (ED) Visits


Firearm Injuries by Year (Counts), ED Visits by Residents of Richmond Health District 2018 - 2024[^] (Selected Year in ORANGE)






Richmond Firearm Injuries Demographic Disparities


Firearm Injuries by Age and Sex (Counts), ED Visits by Residents of Richmond Health District, 2018 - 2024[^]



Sex or Age Not Reported : 45




Firearm Injuries by Race/Ethnicity (Counts), ED Visits by Residents of Richmond Health District, 2018 - 2024^A



What is the Trauma Healing Response Network?

- Created in 2021 through partnership with Richmond City Council, the Richmond and Henrico Health Districts, and the Richmond Behavioral Health Foundation.
- Engages impacted families in the aftermath of a firearm injury or death through an evidence-based, trauma-informed lens.
- Convenes 38 community partners working in housing, food access, mental health support, and violence prevention.
- Provides direct connection to community partners, short-term case management, and long-term resource referrals.



THRN and GVPI in Richmond

THRN supports three pillars of Richmond's Gun Violence Prevention and Intervention Framework:

- Crisis intervention and wrap around services
- Intensive case management
- Credible messengers





Providing meaningful support...

Comprehensive response and support

- 697 wellness checks
- 110 long-term mental health support connections
- More than \$30,000 in emergency funds disbursed directly to support impacted families
- 12 families provided with emergency housing and relocation support
- 26 cases at high risk for retaliation-related events engaged for intervention.





"We just learn how to cope. Healing is an ongoing process—it's just a lifelong process."





Community healing



Previous events include Healthy Habits in the Garden, Lyrics and Beats, Armstrong Senior Class monthly support, the Young Kings and Queens program at MLK Middle, and trauma workshops.



145 events

Community education, outreach, and listening events hosted since Dec 2023



Partner training and support

- Partners have experience with GVPI programming and close relationships within their communities.
- THRN financial support lifts up the work of grassroots organizations.
- Professional development and training allows partners to expand their impact on violence prevention.



Trauma Informed Care training, Healing the Healers



THRN in action

- Hosted peace-building meeting at Gilpin Community Garden between residents in long-standing community conflict.
- Working to incorporate programming at RCJC to break cycles of violence.
- Provided support groups/mentoring at MLK Middle School & connected families with mental health support after Mosby Ct shooting.
- Provided on-site grief support to those impacted after the Altria shooting.

- Completion of community-based, trauma-informed, relationship-building curriculum.
- Increased partnerships with mental health resources.
- Continued alignment with RPS and the student body.
