CITIZEN COMMENT

Robert McCracken expressed concerns with a lack of cooperation from city staff regarding special use project 9812. Mr. McCracken stated that it has been almost nine months and the project is not complete due to unanswered questions. Mr. McCracken provided a handout to Council referencing his concerns and asked how the situation could be resolved.

President Michelle Mosby recommended that Mr. McCracken meet with Lela Jefferson, executive assistant to the mayor, to discuss his concerns. President Mosby also requested that Ms. Jefferson provide her with an update following their meeting.

Marie Morton Hart expressed concerns regarding trees on her property and requested assistance from the city to remove the trees.

Cheryl Nici-O'Connell expressed appreciation to Council and citizens for their support during her recovery from an injury she sustained while on duty in 1984 and requested that all citizens support law enforcement.

Glenwood Burley thanked Council for its support of the relocation of the Richmond Police Memorial statue and requested that Council keep all the city's statues in pristine condition.

Rikya Taylor, VCU student, informed Council that a human rights commission could assist citizens with research and with claims of discrimination.

There were no further comments or discussion and **the Consent Agenda was unanimously adopted.**

REGULAR AGENDA

The following ordinance was considered:

ORD. 2016-033

To amend ch. 2, art. III, div. 7 of the City Code by adding therein a new section 2-216, concerning the obstruction of inspector general investigations, to provide that certain employees who obstruct inspector general investigations by denying the Office of the City Auditor, when not required by law to so deny, immediate access to information are subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination by their appointing authority. (As Amended)

Councilor Charles Samuels stated that the ordinance does not state that an employee will be terminated if information is denied to the inspector general; however, delaying or hindering an investigation could have consequences of disciplinary action that could include termination.

Human Resources Director Johnny McLean stated that there are several policies and regulations currently in place that cover infractions as specified within the proposed ordinance and that the proposed ordinance is subject to interpretation.

Councilor Kathy Graziano asked the city attorney if the inspector general currently has the authority as specified within the proposed ordinance, and stated that the "immediate response" phrasing could put an individual's position in jeopardy.

City Attorney Allen Jackson responded by stating that the inspector general does not have the authority expressed in the proposed ordinance.

Councilor Cynthia Newbille clarified that the City Charter does not currently codify the inspector general's immediate access to information and asked if the employee disciplinary action is determined by the inspector general or the appointing authority.

City Attorney Allen Jackson stated that the disciplinary action of an employee is determined by the appointing authority.

Vice president Hilbert asked if the patron would consider continuing and/or amending the proposed ordinance.

Councilor Charles Samuels moved to continue ORD. 2016-033 to the December 12, 2016 Council meeting or the next special meeting, whichever occurs first. The motion was seconded and unanimously approved.

The following ordinance was considered:

ORD. 2016-217

To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer to accept grant funds in the amount of \$635,000 from the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality and to appropriate the increase to the Fiscal Year 2016-2017 Capital Budget by increasing estimated revenues and the amount appropriated to the Department of Public Utilities' Stormwater Facilities Improvements project in the Utilities category by \$635,000 for the purpose of constructing the Reedy Creek Stream Restoration project.

Deputy Chief Administrative Officer for Operations John Buturla stated that extensive discussions have occurred regarding the Reedy Creek Stream Restoration project and city administration recommends moving forward with the project as proposed.

OPPOSITION

Dan Mowyer, *archeologist*, expressed opposition to the proposed legislation stating that there has not been a complete study of cultural resources.

David Ridderhoff provided an overall statement describing members of the Reedy Creek Coalition stating that they would be giving additional reasons against the project.

Melvin Ely addressed the argument made at the meeting of the City Planning Commission (CPC) that stated the city could not afford to turn down the grant specified for the Reedy Creek project. Mr. Ely also stated that the city stated that in accepting the grant the project must be completed as specified within the proposed legislation.

Dr. Arthur Butt expressed opposition to the proposed legislation stating that the project will not improve water quality for Reedy Creek, the James River or the Chesapeake Bay, but will destroy valuable habitats that will take decades to recover. Dr. Butt stated that the problem lies with the upstream of Reedy Creek.

Carolyn Paulette of the Forest Hill Designation Committee, stated that she is opposed to the proposed ordinance as an article in the *Bay Journal*, reported that there is little data to back up the need for watershed restoration projects.

Mary Gathji expressed opposition to the proposed legislation stating that the main problem is the concrete channel above the project site which causes algae to grow and eliminates aquatic life downstream because it absorbs oxygen that is needed for wildlife.

Bill McKelway expressed opposition to the proposed legislation stating that the area offers an opportunity for tranquility, peace and calm to an area that has suffered much distress.

Catherine Harold expressed opposition to the proposed legislation due to risk factors of urban stream restoration in addition to the lack of a long-term maintenance program. Ms. Harold stated that the Reedy Creek project is not a restoration project but a relocation project.

Craig Curwood expressed opposition to the proposed legislation stating that he desires preservation of the area's wildlife and vegetation, and if destroyed, it will take years to replenish.

Bill Shanabruch stated that he hoped Council will reject the proposed ordinance so the Reedy Creek Coalition can return to helping restore watersheds.

Corby Faye stated that he is opposed the proposed ordinance as the project will destroy the woodland habitat around the creek.

Suzette Line expressed opposition to the proposed ordinance as maintenance is needed on the creek banks to end erosion and with almost seven acres cleared and trees being replanted, the trees will need watering and the new ground coverings must be controlled as the network of roots is what stabilizes the ground.

James McDonald expressed opposition to the proposed ordinance stating that the Department of Public Utilities needs to consider other sites for restoration and not Reedy Creek.

Alistair Jones stated that he opposed the proposed ordinance as there has been no planning for the restoration project and that it is deforestation through the cutting down of 430 trees.

Peter Mollica expressed opposition to the proposed ordinance by stating that the Reedy Creek runoff is the result of the Army Corp of Engineers saving a stream.

SUPPORT

Judith Warrington expressed support of the proposed ordinance as one litigation project within this watershed is better than none, and once the project is started, it will be easier to acquire funding for another project within the same watershed.

Jackie Jones stated that she was in support of the proposed ordinance as she is in support of reducing pollution in the James River and Chesapeake Bay.

Alex Martin expressed support of the proposed ordinance stating that the benefits of the Reedy Creek outweigh the problems that plague the effected neighborhood. Mr. Martin also stated that this project will reduce pollutants in Forest Hill Park, the James River and the Chesapeake Bay.

Mike Oust of Environmental Quality Resources, stated that individuals need to look at the project in a positive way and noted several similar projects that have been completed.

Mike Rolband, owner – Wetlands Study and Solutions, stated that, to repair a stream there had to be some destruction, but the long-term positive outcome will be the re-growth of trees and the ability to control invasive growth. Mr. Rolband also stated that slowing the creek's water flow would increase habitat values.

Kathy Hoverman, senior stream restoration designer, stated that research shows that stream restoration works. Ms. Hoverman further stated that streams are highly degraded, they do not heal themselves and will continue to erode the water banks. Ms. Hoverman also stated that restoration can eliminate continual pollution.

Councilor Kathy Graziano stated that, despite words to the contrary, the Department of Public Utilities (DPU) has put much effort in selecting Reedy Creek for the restoration project, and without discussion to resolve differences, she must vote yes for the proposed ordinance.

Councilor Charles Samuels stated that, should the proposed ordinance be voted down, the city residents and DPU will have the opportunity to work on a resolution that is satisfactory to all parties.

Vice President Chris Hilbert stated that discussion should include citizen input and postponing consideration of the proposed ordinance would all for that.

Councilor Cynthia Newbille stated that the city needs to review the project and offer additional option to comply with pollution reduction. Ms. Newbille requested that administration consider amending the proposed legislation.

Councilor Cynthia Newbille moved to continue Ordinance 2016-217. The motion failed for lack of a second.

Councilor Ellen Robertson stated that the city has an obligation to be in compliance but the community has voiced strong opinions against the Reedy Creek project; therefore, there should be an opportunity to work toward a reasonable compromise between the city and community residents.

Councilor Parker Agelasto stated that the city should be mindful of the community impact, the grant does not allow for flexibility in redesigning the project and the City Planning Commission failed to recommend approval of the proposed ordinance.

Councilor Jonathan Baliles stated that the proposed ordinance is to meet specified state requirements and rejecting the proposed ordinance would mean losing grant money; however, the city does need time to address specific pollution issues.

ORD. 2016-217 was rejected: Ayes 1, Graziano. Noes 8, Baliles, Samuels, Agelasto, Robertson, Trammell, Newbille, Hilbert, Mosby.

ORD. 2016-257

To amend and reordain City Code § 26-355, concerning the levy of tax on real estate, to establish a tax rate of \$1.20 for the tax year beginning Jan. 1, 2017, pursuant to Va. Code § 58.1-3321(b), and increasing such rate from the Rolled Back Tax Rate of \$1.18 as computed in accordance with Va. Code § 58.1-3321(a).

Councilor Kathy Graziano stated that the proposed ordinance maintains the current real estate tax rate for 2017.

ORD. 2016-257 was adopted: Ayes 8, Baliles, Graziano, Samuels, Robertson, Trammell, Newbille, Hilbert, Mosby. Noes, None. Agelasto was temporarily excused.

ORD. 2016-263
