BUILDING BACK AFFORDABLE HOUSING: \$32.5 MILLION



- 2022, \$10 million Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) issued.
- 5 awards made for \$1.3 million to serve 6,544 people.
- 11 awards made for \$8.7 million to create 1039 units.
- 2023, \$8.0 million NOFA issued for rental units.
- Submissions due February 14, 2023.
- \$2.0 million set aside for homeownership.



Creighton Court

- Cooperation Agreement reviewed by Richmond Redevelopment and Housing Authority (RRHA) for \$6.8 million in infrastructure improvements in Phase A.
- Developer will start the infrastructure work spring 2023.
- Phase A to create 140 new rental housing units.




Highland Grove

BUILD BACK STRONGER: \$8.9 MILLION (\$188,514 EXPENDED)

Small Business Grants

- Scope of work developed with Economic Development Authority (EDA).
- Partners/providers/participants identified.
- EDA will administer the grant.

Façade and Beautification

- Main corridors identified.
- Council approved work with Economic Development Authority in January 2023.
- Consultant completed preliminary review.
- Developing contract for work to begin.



BUILD BACK STRONGER: \$8.9 MILLION CONTINUED

OCWB Workforce Development & Community Ambassadors

• Ambassadors support food distribution in low-income communities and providing resource information in RRHA communities about credit repair, job training, and other program offerings. Expended: \$150,000.

CDFI Revolving Loan

• Loan program not feasible due to the timing of repayment schedules and ARPA expenditure deadline of December 2026. These funds have been identified for reallocation.

COVID-19 Administrative Reserve

- No expenditures to date.
- Holding account to address unforeseen events.



BUILDING BACK GREENER AND MORE RESILIENT (\$188,514 EXPENDED)

Climate Risk Assessment

- Discussion with partners to design a citizen-science led project to monitor air quality.
- Stakeholders will be convened in quarter four of FY 2023 to develop equitable community-led projects addressing neighborhood resilience aimed at reducing greenhouse gas emissions.
- Urban forestry master plan scope of work is complete.

Lead Line Replacement

- 135 grants applications totaling \$634,000 have been accepted.
- 49 Lead Service Line Replacement (LSLRs) completed totaling \$194,000. Many of these projects required replacement of LSL in the public right-of-way.
- Project impact leveraged with additional funding from Virginia Department of Health (VDH) grants and revenue collections.



BUILDING BACK GREENER AND MORE RESILIENT (CONTINUED)

- Project 1: McGuire & Chapel Drive
 - Design underway with construction anticipated late summer 2023.
- Project 2: Whitehead Road
 - Out for bid.
 - Utility relocation underway with construction anticipated summer 2023.
- Project 3: Broad Rock Manor
 - Bid documents being developed, construction anticipated 2023.

Storm Water




- \$2.5 million for moderate rehab to replace hot water heaters and make minor repairs up to \$32,000 per home.
- \$1.7 million for substantial rehab to be administered by Project:HOMES for major repairs for up to \$60,000 per home.
- Targets households at or below 80% of AMI.
- Programs start spring 2023.

BUILD BACK SAFER \$8.5 MILLION (\$6.2 MILLION EXPENDED)

Gun Violence Prevention

- \$500,000 dedicated to prevention measures, such as gun buy back. First buy back event held August 20, 2022. Collected over 450 weapons and distributed \$67,500 in gift cards. Next event planned for summer 2023.
- \$1.0 million for Positive Youth Development Fund at NextUp RVA for older youth and family programming. School year 2022-23 programming underway. Summer 2022 program was successful.

Enhanced Lighting and Cameras

- Using calls for service data a camera needs assessment is being developed for priority intersections. Anticipated field work completion is February 2023.
- Initial plans for intersection lighting has been developed. Review of plans have begun.
- Camera pole installation at 1700 Monument Avenue is progress. Electrical design is expected to be complete in March 2023.

First Responder Bonus

- Bonuses for city public safety and RAA staff have been provided.
- Total of \$4,625,979 expended for a total of 1,479 FTE's.
