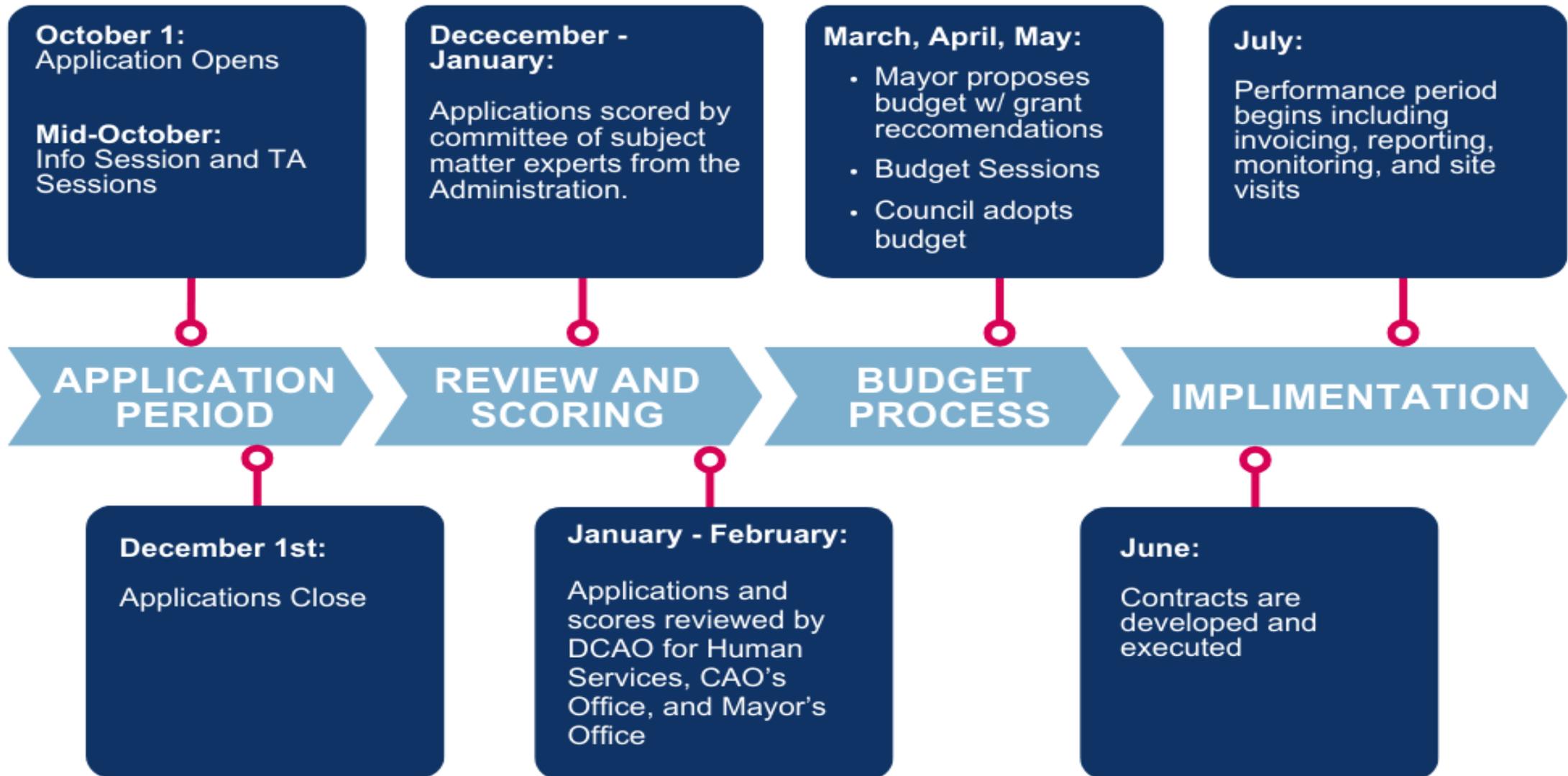

REQUIRED DOCUMENTS FOR ALL APPLICANTS

- Narrative Non-Departmental Application
- Overall Project Budget
- Previous Fiscal Year Audit or Financial Statements
- Current Year Operating Budget
- List of Board of Directors, Members, and Executive Officers
- Federal Tax-Exempt Certification
- Latest IRS 990 Report



REQUIRED CRITERIA FOR ALL APPLICANTS

- Federally approved non-profit certification
- In compliance with federal, state, and local regulations
- No outstanding violations, taxes, or penalties
- Must have a currently active Board
- Agrees to coordinate its projects with the appropriate groups and Departments
- Must disclose any past or pending lawsuits
- Other legal requirements

REPORTING REQUIREMENTS: CHARITABLE ORGANIZATION

- Grant agreement subject to the performance measures and goals.
- The city department responsible for the organization uses reports and/or site visits to monitor performance.
- Reporting generally requires:
 - An overview of scope of services and geography of services
 - Updates on performance measures
 - Narrative update including
 - Activities achieved
 - Major challenges encountered (if any)
 - Any new development that impacted the project
 - Coordination with partners
 - Final reports include summary narrative on outcomes and impact of the project
