Public Hearing

Cynthia Robinson, Richmond Virtual Academy (RVA) President, spoke in support of funding for Richmond Public Schools (RPS) and keeping RVA running for K-12 students.

Jacqueline Johnson Wilson, parent of RVA student, spoke in support of continued funding for RVA, noting that many virtual academy students do not have another option for education.

Dee Winston, parent of RVA student, spoke in support of continued funding for RVA, noting that the virtual academy is not a separate entity from RPS.

Sherlita Salley, parent of RVA student, spoke in support of continued funding for RVA and stated that her child has special needs that make in-person instruction a safety issue.

Sandra Portee, RVA Virtual Learning Coordinator, spoke in support of continued funding for RVA and stated that homebound services cannot replace the virtual academy as they are temporary services.

Tomorrow Lofton-Pickens, RVA Instructional Compliance Coordinator, spoke in support of continued funding for RVA, stating that it is a separate school from RPS.

Kindy Anderson spoke in opposition to Richmond's response to federal budget cuts for immigration and housing, as well as the city's use of FLOCK security cameras.

Narissa Rahaman, Equality Virginia Executive Director, spoke in opposition to any funding cuts for healthcare.

Tyrone Davis spoke in support of regular cost of living adjustments for retirees.

Emma Clark, Richmond Education Association Organizer and former RPS teacher, spoke in support of continued funding for RVA.

Emily Grimes spoke in opposition to the city's use of FLOCK cameras and noted the potential for misuse of the data they collect.

Councilor Nicole Jones arrived and was seated.

Felicia Boney, Service Employees International Union 32 BJ member, spoke in support of funding for the city's collective bargaining agreements and a joint compensation study.

Lisa Delao, Huguenot High School Teacher and Richmond Education Association member, spoke in support of fully funding RPS and in opposition to the city's contract with FLOCK security.

Candace Benn, RVA School Councilor, spoke in support of continued funding for RVA and fully funding RPS.

Egon Shroud, Westover Hills Elementary teacher, spoke in support of full funding for RPS, contingent on an external audit of the RPS budget to address the top-heavy organizational structure.

Aurora Britt spoke in opposition to the city's contract with FLOCK security.

Beth Hosef, RPS teacher, asked that Council support the RPS budget proposed by Superintendent Jason Kamras.

Michael Rafferty spoke in opposition to the city's contract with FLOCK security.

Kai Banks spoke in support of funding for the Office of Community Wealth Building.

Carolyn Pugh, Community Climate Collaborative and Richmond Environmental Justice Coalition, spoke in support of funding for the Office of Sustainability, free public transit, bike/pedestrian infrastructure, and participatory budgeting.

Maria Düster, Community Climate Collaborative, spoke in support of funding for programs to relieve citizen energy bills, as well as a city energy efficiency program.

Wes Smith, Executive Director for Workforce Solutions with the Virginia Manufacturers Association, spoke in favor of continued support for the Richmond Office of Community Wealth Building.

Kasey Miller spoke in support of funding tax relief programs for renters and stated that funds are being cut from valuable city departments to fund constitutional officers.

Anthony Scianni, Laborers International Union of North America, spoke in support of continued funding for the Office of Community Wealth Building.

Emily Yen, Teamsters Local 322, spoke in support of full funding for RPS including the virtual academy.

Selena Jimenez spoke in support of continued funding for the Office of Community Wealth Building.

Almonte Canselo spoke in opposition to funding for the city's use of automated license plate readers.

George Brown spoke in support of the Office of Community Wealth Building.

Chloe Tremper, teacher at Boushall Middle School, spoke in support of an external forensic audit of RPS spending.

Madeline McElgunn spoke in support of fulfilling the full budget request for RPS.

Ms. Reid stated that she would defer to the City Attorney regarding the procedure for making a motion to reconsider without a prevailing side on the original vote, as the only non-affirmative vote was an abstention and any motion to reconsider must be made by a member on the prevailing side.

City Attorney Laura Drewry stated that to reconsider a motion without a clear prevailing side, a motion to suspend Rule V(G) of Council's Rules of Procedure would first need to be approved before a motion could be made to reconsider the item.
