Richmond City Council Official Proclamation In recognition of the anniversary of the Richmond Police Department hiring the first City Police Officers of African American Descent - on May 1, 1946 and the first woman Richmond Police Officer of African American decent on December 16, 1948, Richmond City Council proclaimed May 1 to be Richmond's First Police Officers of

African American Descent Day, on behalf of all genders; and, celebrates this chapter in the advancement of our city's historically progressive narrative

arc on behalf of all its residents.

RICHMOND CITY COUNCIL OFFICIAL PROCLAMATION

By virtue of the authority vested in the United States of America, Commonwealth of Virginia, Virginia Code of Laws, and the Richmond City Charter,

Richmond's First Police Officers of **African American Descent Day**

Whereas, Richmond City Council, the governing legislative institution of Richmond, Virginia, in the United States of America, has officially recognized, honored, and commemorated May 1 as the Richmond Anniversary of Hiring the First Richmond Police Officers of African American descent; and

Whereas, on May 1, 1946, the Richmond Police Department took a leadership role on behalf of service, equality, and social justice when it hired four male police officers of African American descent, which was a first for the city against the backdrop of a racially segregated society at the time; and

Whereas, The first four male Richmond Police Officers of African American descent hired in the city were Howard T. Braxton, Doctor P. Day, Frank S. Randolph, and John W. Vann and were assigned to serve at the Richmond Police Department - First Police Precinct, then located at the corner of Smith and Marshall Streets: and

Whereas, Soon after, Ruth B. Blair was hired as the first woman Richmond Police Officer of African American decent on December 16, 1948, further paving the way for even greater diversity, gender equality, and inclusion within the police force; and

Whereas, Those pioneering efforts are a tribute to the progress of the Richmond Police Department, Richmond residents, and to the individual and collective dedication, determination, efforts, and achievement of each of these trailblazing officers; and

Whereas, Essential to the safety and security of all Richmond residents and visitors is the vital role the Richmond Police Department serves in hiring, staffing, recruiting, and retaining highly knowledgeable, skilled, experienced, and able professional law enforcement officers and support personnel; and

Whereas, Richmond Police Officers and support personnel serve with honor and fortitude in delivery of their duty, which, due to the exceptional nature of their work, puts them in harm's way; and

Whereas, Richmond City Council commemorated May 1, in 2016 and 2019, and 2021, as the Richmond Anniversary of Hiring the First City Police Officers of African American Descent;

Now, Therefore, In veneration, recognition, and commemoration of the first Richmond Police Officers of African American descent, Richmond City Council does hereby officially proclaim and establish the day of May 1 to be Richmond's First Police Officers of African American Descent Day, in perpetuity, in Richmond, Virginia on behalf of all genders; and, celebrates this chapter in the advancement of our city's historically progressive narrative arc on behalf of all its residents.

In witness whereof, this pronouncement was respectfully prepared and hereunto established for effectuation on behalf of the residents of Richmond on the first day of tay, two thousand twenty-four, in the two hundred eighty-seventh year of the City of Richmond, founded in 1737, the two hundred forty-eighth year of the Commonwealth of Virginia, established in 1776, and the United States of America.
