

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
Traditional Department-Centered View of the Budget




The Poughkeepsie Children's Cabinet Fiscal Map is a comprehensive analysis of public and philanthropic investments in youth and children in Poughkeepsie. It is designed to be a resource for city leaders and youth services stakeholders seeking to visualize funding streams and align spending with priorities. In addition, nonprofits, residents, and community groups are encouraged to use the resource to better understand investments in youth and children. Through a data-driven process, the Poughkeepsie Children's Cabinet, in partnership with the national nonprofit Children's Funding Project, worked with public agencies, philanthropic donors, and nonprofits to obtain fiscal data related to youth, children and relevant family services. Fiscal data was organized into different categories to provide a more detailed analysis. For more information, please see the Appendix (Page 4). 

Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)	SNAP provides nutrition benefits to supplement the food budget of needy families so they can purchase healthy food and move towards self-sufficiency.	\$8,287,980	US Department of Agriculture	
TANF Cash Assistance to Families	TANF stands for Temporary Assistance for Needy Families. The TANF program, which is time limited, assists families with children when the parents or other responsible relatives cannot provide for the family's basic needs.	\$6,399,746	US Department of Health and Human Services	
Foster Care - County Funding	This unit provides services to children placed in care through voluntary surrender by parents, court order by Family Court, or removal of a child from his or her home due to abuse or neglect. 


Poughkeepsie Fiscal Map – pg. 3 Funding of Age Ranges

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Children's Funding Project Fiscal Mapping Methodology and Practices



- 1. Start by doing background research of publicly available budget resources: US. Treasury's USAspending.gov, state budget, local budgets.
- 2. Meet individually with budget holders to verify the data we collected in our background research and learn more about the context of the funding landscape.
- 3. We code each line item, or appropriation, from the source (federal, state, city) and not from the program. This is in efforts to not duplicate accounting, since many programs are funded from multiple sources.
 ex. We code WIOA as one line item from the federal government vs. a line for each program in RVA that receives WIOA funds
- 4. We also code the characteristics of each funding stream based on how those dollars are intended to support children. This is the basis of the 'child-centered view' of the budget. So, many of RPS's budget line items will be visualized across other aspects of a child's life, other than education.
 - ex. School based wellness funds will be coded as providing physical, mental, and behavioral health services to students in efforts to support health outcomes. We will note that the service setting is school-based.
 - ex. Funds for attendance services will be coded as providing truancy prevention support in efforts to make sure students are better supported and connected.
 - ex. Classroom instruction funds will be coded as providing K-12 learning services in efforts to support education outcomes.

When: Fiscal Year(s): FY23 and FY24
