THE CITY OF RICHMOND HEREBY ORDAINS:

§ 1. **Designation of Street Block for Honorary Name.** The 2300 block of Rosewood Avenue shall be designated in honor of James “Jimmy Lee” Bracey, pursuant to this ordinance.

§ 2. **Effect of Designation.** The designation of the street block made pursuant to this ordinance shall be honorary only, shall not replace the existing name of the street, and shall have no effect on the address of any property with an address on the designated street block. The sole effect of designation pursuant to this ordinance shall be to authorize the placement of commemorative signs in accordance with this ordinance memorializing the designation in honor of the named person.

§ 3. **Administration of Ordinance.** The Department of Public Works shall implement this ordinance by installing, as soon as practicable after the adoption of this ordinance, and maintaining commemorative signs in accordance with this section. The commemorative signs shall be clearly distinct from the street signs used to identify the street block in question such that a reasonable person could not conclude that the commemorative signs reflect the actual name of the street. The commemorative signs (i) shall be affixed to a sign pole installed at each end of the block designated in section 1 of this ordinance for the purpose of fulfilling the requirements of this section or to any existing sign identifying the road designated in section 1 of this ordinance located at each end of the block designated in section 1 of this ordinance and (ii) shall bear the name of the person set forth in section 1 of this ordinance.

§ 4. **Effective Date.** This ordinance shall be in force and effect upon adoption.

PURPOSE: To designate the 2300 Block of Rosewood Avenue in honor of Mr. Jimmy Lee Bracey.

BACKGROUND: Mr. Bracey devoted more than 50 years to mentoring Richmond’s youth as a coach, father figure, and beloved grandfather figure, and was affectionately known as “Big Poppa.” Born and raised in Richmond’s West End, Mr. Bracey attended Richmond Public Schools and proudly graduated from Maggie L. Walker High School. Following high school, he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force, where he competed on the Air Force Track Team and earned numerous awards for his athletic achievements. After completing his military service, he built a distinguished professional career with the Federal Reserve Bank, Richmond Public Schools, Henrico Public Schools, and Richmond Recreation and Parks.

Mr. Bracey recognized that many children in the West End, particularly those not selected for school sports teams, still needed structured, positive athletic opportunities. Drawing on his track and field experience from the Air Force, he began coaching a small group of boys in his neighborhood. What started as a handful of participants grew steadily, and in 1967 he founded West End Striders, Inc., a nonprofit organization dedicated to enriching the lives of Richmond’s youth through athletics, academic support, and sportsmanship.

Committed to helping young athletes discover their strengths, Mr. Bracey removed barriers to participation whenever possible. If track and field was a child’s passion, he made sure there were no excuses for missing practice, by providing transportation, running shoes, and other necessary resources. Under his leadership, the West End Striders produced athletes who won high school

district, regional, and state championships, earned collegiate athletic scholarships, and even qualified for Olympic trials. Central to his mission was the holistic development of student-athletes and their success both on and off the field.

For more than five decades, Mr. Bracey trained track and field athletes ages five to sixteen throughout Richmond's Near West End and on the grounds of his alma mater, Maggie L. Walker High School. Over the course of his service to the City of Richmond, he received numerous honors recognizing his profound community impact, including the 1992 "Big Shoulders" Award sponsored by Sheila Belle and Ma and Pop Pop Productions, Inc. Mr. Bracey's legacy endures through the countless lives he touched, and he remains a true Richmond icon.

Nomination Form

Nomination Overview

Richmond City Council may designate city streets with honorary street signs to celebrate and memorialize individuals that were a resident of the City of Richmond, Virginia for a significant period of their life.

Nominees are considered based on their historical or cultural significance, including any significant contributions to the Richmond community.

Establishing and dedicating a Richmond City Council Honorary Street Name in a person's name is a rare, limited, and extremely high honor that may be considered and bestowed on Richmond residents. Keeping the official city street name, an Honorary Street Name includes producing, preparing, and installing a specially created sign with an honoree's name on it and installing it at the location designated for commemoration.

Nomination Process

Richmond residents, community organizations, and others interested in nominating a person to be a recipient of a Richmond City Council Honorary Street Name are welcomed to submit them for Richmond City Council consideration.

The nomination process includes completing the Richmond City Council Honorary Street Name Nomination Form and sending it to a Councilmember. It is recommended that a completed nomination, including all associated documents, **be sent directly to the Councilmember representing the Richmond Voter District containing the proposed location.**

The Councilmember may further research, consider, and vet a nomination in determining a proposal of legislation or formal Richmond City Council deliberation or action.

Guiding Legislation

Richmond City Council legislation guiding the Richmond City Council Honorary Street Name process was established by Richmond City Council Resolution # 2025-R016 and includes some of the following:

- Nominations must be for individuals, who may be alive or dead, but must have been a resident of the City of Richmond for a significant period of their life.
- Nominations are to include written documentation of the nominated individual's connection to the City of Richmond, Virginia, a description of their qualifications for receiving such an honor, and a letter from a local civic association, if applicable.
- Nominees are considered based on their historical or cultural significance, including any significant contributions to the Richmond community.

James "Jimmie Lee" Bracey dedicated over 50 years to mentoring Richmond's youth as a coach, father figure, and beloved grandfather figure, affectionately known as "Big Poppa." Born and raised in the West End of Richmond, Bracey attended Richmond Public Schools and proudly graduated from Maggie L. Walker High School. After high school, he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force, where he joined the Air Force Track Team and earned numerous awards for his athletic achievements.

After completing his military service, Bracey built a professional career that included positions at the Federal Reserve Bank, Richmond Public Schools, Henrico Public Schools, and Richmond Recreation and Parks. He recognized that many children in his West End neighborhood, who weren't often chosen for school sports teams, still needed organized, constructive athletic engagement. Drawing on his track and field knowledge from his Air Force days, Bracey began coaching a few boys in his neighborhood. What started with a handful of kids grew into a larger group, and in 1967, he founded the West End Striders, Inc., a non-profit organization focused on enriching the lives of Richmond's youth through athletics, academic support, and sportsmanship.

Bracey was committed to guiding young athletes to find their strengths in various sports. If track and field was their passion, he ensured there were no excuses for missing practice. He provided transportation, running shoes, and any necessary resources to help each child succeed. For Bracey, obstacles were never a barrier to a child's participation in the Striders. Under his guidance, the West End Striders produced athletes who achieved championships at high school district, regional, and state levels, earned athletic scholarships for college, and qualified for the Olympic trials. His unwavering dedication to the holistic development of student-athletes and his commitment to their success on and off the field were central to his mission. For over 50 years, he trained track and field athletes aged five to sixteen in Richmond's near West End and on the grounds of his alma mater, Maggie L. Walker High School.

Throughout his career and years of service to the City of Richmond, Bracey received numerous awards recognizing his community contributions. Notably, in 1992, he was honored with the "Big Shoulders" Award, sponsored by Sheila Belle and Ma and Pop Pop Productions, Inc. Bracey's legacy lives on in the hearts of those he impacted; he is truly a Richmond icon.

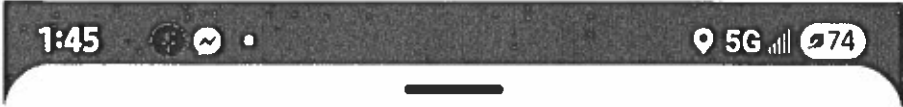

Giving Boys Start Aim of Track Club

Track has been an interesting subject for James Bracey for the last half-dozen years or so. You might say that the special interest intensified when he was embarrassed in the Penna-Relays.

"That was the biggest event I had ever competed

in," he said, "and the worst I was ever beaten. There were so many people, and I had never been up against so much talent."

A couple years before the event, Bracey had never been up against any track talent. "I had never been interested in school," he admitted, "never participated until after I entered service."

"Then, one day they were having a meet at the base and I remarked to a buddy, 'Bet I could outrun all of 'em.'"

"As it turned out, he could. 'I won the quarter-mile and decided I was a quarter-miler.'"

Not much later, Bracey found that there was more to it than just running in the base meets. "They sent me from our base (Delaware) to St. Louis, where I really ran into competition and finished third."

That was one place too low for the air force championships, but he did make the All-AF mile relay team and went to the training at Red

don't just take their word they are in good shape."

That comes down to something Bracey has been working on for the past nine months and will become a reality April 4 on the track at Thomas Jefferson High School.

The event will be the first West End Striders and Merchants Invitational Track Meet in which all the city's junior highs will compete. It will be an all-day affair (10 a.m. start) and trophies will be awarded the first three finishers in each event in each division. Divisions will be seventh, eighth, ninth grades — "We want to keep the competition even."

The merchants have provided the awards — "They have been very nice and next year we may be able to expand."

"I hope this meet will convince people in other sections of the city to form such groups. We would like to see one in each — Southside, North, East End — so we could form a league for competitions. Then, maybe we could choose an all-star team and take the boys to outside meets."

It is going to be necessary, Bracey feels, if the program he started three years ago with four boys is going to continue. The second year he had 35. Now there are 50 Striders.

"We're afraid we'll get to the point of having to turn some of them away," said Bracey, who does all this in his spare time away from his job with the Federal Reserve Bank. "That wouldn't be too good. We would have to try to take the best and you can't really do that."

The April 4 meet is a start and Bracey knows the value of a start, even if it some-

'Big Shoulders' awards to 7

About 300 people spent Father's Day afternoon singing gospel music and celebrating the accomplishments of African-American men.

Backed by drums, tambourines and electric guitars, six area gospel choirs and soloists set the tone for the jubilant program at St. Paul's Baptist Church in Church Hill with such songs as "Speak to My Heart" and "Trouble Don't Last Always."

At the program, seven Richmond men received "Big Shoulders" awards in recognition of their "dedication, leadership and unselfish service to the Richmond community."

The honorees were:

Dr. Walton M. Belle, a local surgeon and member of the

State Board of Medicine; Raymond H. Boone, editor/publisher of the Richmond Free Press;

James Bracey, a track coach at Virginia Union University and founder of the West End Striders Track Club;

Walter S. Burton, a legal assistant in the Virginia Attorney General's office.

Alex D. Erby, director of the J.L. Francis Community Center and 1992 City of Richmond "Employee of the Year;"

John R. "Jay" Williams, North Richmond YMCA youth programs director;

Detective C.T. Woody, a homicide investigator for the Richmond Police Department were honored.

"All seven of these men stand worthy of these awards," said NAACP Special Projects Director Jack W. Gravely, who presented the awards. "They're good men, they're religious men, they're honorable men, they're God's men and they're black men."

State Sen. Henry L. Marsh III, speaking during the affair, said, "All that we have done is because we stand on the shoul-

ders of those who came before us." But that process is not ended, he said in urging greater efforts for black advancement.

Moved to the church from Brown's Island because of the threat of rain, the gospel festival and awards program was the first public event sponsored by Ma & Popop Productions Inc. which is headed by Sheillah Belle.

...experience and training was hard," Bracey remembered. "Even track shoes were a problem."

All this led to the Penn Relays and Bracey's overwhelming interest in track — not for himself, but for youngsters he makes certain will not have to learn about track in service.

Bracey said that he always could run, "But I felt I could have done better with an earlier start."

To give some others an earlier start, Bracey came out of the service and, three years back, organized the West End Striders for junior high age boys. The object is to teach them track fundamentals, as well as other aspects of life. "We try to give the junior high student a reason to go to school," Bracey said. "And, the more we can do for the kids, the more we can keep them off the streets."

Bracey has four men who help, all without pay, like Bracey — "people I knew who know something about track" — John Mitchell, Walter Carter, Louis Evans and James Mayo.

"We also have tutors. Track is not the only thing. We have social activities, also, but it takes money — can you imagine taking 50 boys bowling, what it costs? Or feeding 50 boys?"

There are also the problems of equipment, facilities and "we have trouble getting the boys examined — we

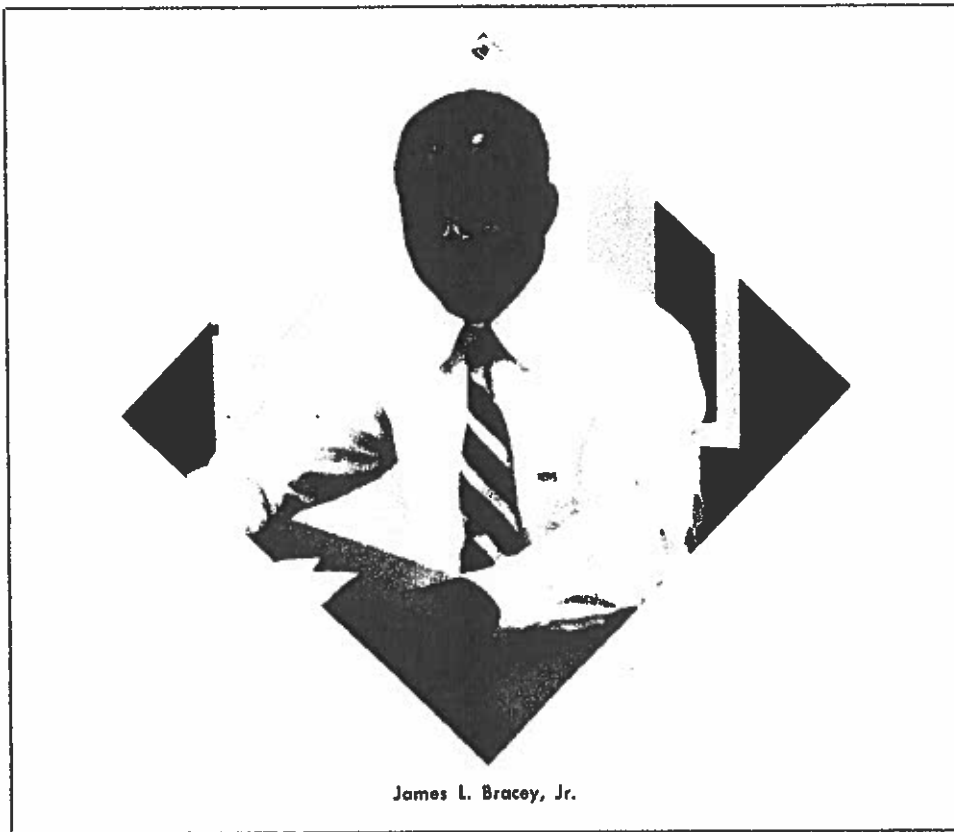

By Example He Encourages Area Youth

They call him Bracey . . . his friends and acquaintances, his fellow employees, the young people he works with after Bank hours. They like him and respect him because James Bracey is one who doesn't have to tell you he cares; it's evident in his involvement with other people—especially the young.

So often we bemoan the world's problems. And so many of us wring our hands and knit our brows

brother, and this lack played a big part in his early years. You see, when a boy went out for sports, the coach asked, "What's your name? Oh, you're Butch Johnson's little brother . . . well, he was sure a good little ball player . . . you're on. . . ." But with no big brother's reputation to rely on, James found that he was one of those who wasn't "on," so he had a lot of idle time to kill. And as he became a

in frustration. A few of us, though, are brave enough to tackle a problem right now, right here where we live. We start small, in what may seem to be an insignificant way; but our beginning catches on and others join in. And one more problem is on its way to a solution.

So it was with Bracey. . . .

James Bracey grew up on Parkwood Avenue here in Richmond. It was a rough neighborhood and there was little to keep a boy occupied in leisure moments. Then, too, James Bracey had no big

teen-ager, with no organized outlet for his energies and no one to encourage his athletic bent, James became increasingly bored. It was only a matter of time, then, before an older boy's suggestion that he "meet a bunch of us guys at ten tonight" sounded like at least something to do. Bracey went, the meeting turned into a let's-break-into-cars adventure, the police spotted them, and Bracey ran and hid in Byrd Park. Scared to death! What in the world would he do if his folks found out?

His folks . . . fortunately, James Bracey comes

from a strong family, and his upbringing is probably what kept him from finding that ten-o'clock meeting an exciting adventure worth repeating, just for kicks, if for no other reason. But Bracey's conscience got the best of him that night and in the days to follow, and there never was a repeat. Instead James Bracey used that encounter as experience and learned from it.

He finished Maggie Walker High School, spent four years in the Air Force, and began work here at the Bank in 1961 as a night cleaner. He's now in the Money department as a Currency Shipping Clerk. Many years have gone by since that hot summer night Bracey had a brush with the law, but he doesn't forget. That's one reason he can identify with young people today. Although the saying goes among the young, ". . . can't trust anyone over thirty," the kids do trust Bracey. They know he was one of them, he was determined to succeed, but he hasn't forgotten how it felt to grow up.

After his service days, where for the first time he ran track, Bracey noticed that several boys in his West End neighborhood who were going out for track didn't have much of an idea about form or technique. Neither did they have equipment. The boys asked Bracey to help, and he was willing. That first spring he worked with five boys, and when they needed a group name for competition, Bracey chose the West End Striders. Good word spreads fast. The second year there were thirty-five boys; now there are fifty, most of junior high school age. That very loosely-knit bunch of boys has now become a fully-organized corporation—West End Striders, Incorporated—non-profit, non-stock, with a Board of Directors and several qualified instructors in various sports. Girls have joined the group, too. The corporation hopes to sponsor its own boys' and girls' track teams this year, plus a swim team (scheduled to practice in a west end city pool), and there are ten boys anxiously awaiting the opportunity to advance in tennis, under the corporation's tutelage. It is an active, thriving organization!

What motivates Bracey? His family is certainly a factor, for they are there to pack the food for day trips to various meets, and, most important, they provide the necessary moral support. But there's something else. Perhaps because he's been there, James Bracey knows it's imperative that a child feel somebody cares, that somebody will listen—and communicate, not preach. So many of these children come from broken homes, so many feel that they don't really matter to anybody, and they need so desperately a guiding hand in their mixed-up teen-

age lives. Bracey and his team are willing to provide that guidance as much as possible; their enthusiasm is matched only by their concern for the city's youth.

What else do we need? Surely, West End Striders, Inc., can't be expected to guide the young from our entire metropolitan area. Naturally we would hope that a child's family could give him training in the way he should go. Oftentimes, sadly enough, family support is non-existent.

What about our schools? A hot subject locally these days! Why aren't they solving some of these problems? Bracey feels that, in the main, they're misguided. They're missing the point, as he sees it. "What these kids need is motivation, something to go to school for. . . . Let's face it, you're not going to sway many of them by telling them they'll need algebra 'one of these days' . . . or English literature. But if you have something to attract them, something they *want* to come for, then you say, 'Keep your grades up and you can participate.' You just have to have that one drawing card."

Bracey feels that sports provide that drawing card for many of today's teen-agers. And if they can feel that they're accomplished at even one thing, then they're more likely to try to excel in another.

What of government programs aimed at the young? With the exception of Head Start, Bracey feels that most of these government programs are wasted. Why? The key ingredient is missing—personnel who *understand* the children, or who really *want* to understand them. It takes empathy—sometimes just naturally there; more often, acquired through careful training—or all the money available won't do the job.

In April the West End Striders, Inc., with the Richmond School Board in hearty agreement, held an Image Day assembly at Maggie Walker High School. They invited successful alumni in many different professions and the sports world to participate, so that the young people could see, in the flesh, some of the people who sat where they are today—and made it. "Other Maggie Walker graduates have done it; why not me!" This was the response hoped for. Whether it caught on for good cannot be determined in a day. But as Bracey approached it in its initial stages, "Image Day may or may not say what the kids need to hear; it's an attempt, though . . . just one more way of trying to reach them in a positive way."

So . . . what have we here? One man who reached out to help a few individuals and in the process inspired many.

Right on, James Bracey . . . we're proud of you!

Bracey's basics

Track club gains lift on life

Either the man didn't hear James Bracey or he ignored Bracey's call.

"Excuse me, sir? Sir? Hey there! Sir?"

The man and his leashed pit bull continued their stroll across the infield of the Maggie Walker track, so Bracey sprinted up and let the man know that his pet was not welcome at the facility, nor would it ever be while the West End Striders track club was practicing.

Bracey's about as protective of his "children" as could be possible. And they are his children, all 62 of them, ages 6-15. They gather twice weekly for track and field instruction but invariably gain considerably more valuable lessons.

Many of Bracey's charges could be termed "at-risk" kids. As Thomas Jefferson track coach Jim Holdren notes: "He does a real service for a lot of these kids who otherwise, well, who knows what road they might take."

Bracey, 53, does, in fact, teach them track and field fundamentals. He also teaches discipline, respect and an appreciation of education.

He lines up tutorial sessions with area teachers for many of them. Each Wednesday night, he invites them to a classroom setting where he drills vocabulary.

The practice began shortly after Bracey began his track program 27 years ago. It seems a Virginia Tech coach had heard about one of his former pupils who'd gone on to excel in high school.

"He asked me what the boy had gotten on his college boards, and I said, 'What's a college board?' It turns out that the boy had never taken them, and he wasn't able to go to college.

"I said to myself, 'That's it. None of my children is ever again going to miss out on a chance like that!'"

Bracey stresses the importance of schooling, but he can stress 'till he's blue in the face and some still don't get it. They also don't last long in his program.

He's a regular watchdog when it comes to what

genuinely can be called his student-athletes. He regularly talks to their teachers, looks at their grades and sees to it that they're making progress.

"This man has the biggest heart in the world," Holdren said. "He does anything and everything for these kids. Lots and lots of kids around here over the years owe a lot to that man."

Bracey had never been exposed to track until he served in the Air Force, and once he was out, he decided to share his knowledge with a few youngsters in his neighborhood. From there, the sessions grew each year.

The club travels to meets in neighboring towns and states, and has been as far south as Florida. Although a majority of the Striders come from low-income families, others come from well-to-do backgrounds in the city, Henrico, Hanover and Chesterfield counties. That's one reason he turns down federal

funding.

"If I did that," he said, "they'd tell me who I could and couldn't have out here."

Since retiring from the federal reserve system in 1978, Bracey has made his hobby virtually a full-time occupation. Among his former Striders are Brenda Brown, who attended the University of Virginia on a track scholarship and was an All-American in 1981; Charlene Hinton, who also won a full ride to U.Va. via track; and Shellah Belle, who attended Howard University on a track grant and holds the school shot put record.

Belle, now a reporter and assignment editor for Channel 8, remembers an instance in the late '70s when she was running for Maggie Walker. Her mother had died, and Belle was having problems coping, much less competing. She was the anchor on the 800 relay, and when she grabbed the baton, her team was far behind.

"But Bracey kept yelling at me. Do it for your mom, do it for your

mom," Belle said. "Well, we won the race, and I was pretty teary-eyed afterward. That's the most memorable race I've ever been in."

"The thing about Bracey is that he always makes you feel important. He always gave me the words I needed to hear."

Hinton's about to enroll at Washington and Lee's law school, but she might never have made it to college were it not for Bracey.

"She used to come up here and sit on that little box over there, just watching," Bracey said. "She never wanted to join us, but finally I got her to give it a try one day. She wasn't bad, either."

Recalls Hinton: "I was sort of belligerent about it. I just went there with a friend of mine to watch — I didn't want to run track, I wanted to be a cheerleader. But he basically pushed me into it."

Not all the Striders are All-Americans to be. Many wouldn't even be able to win an event after reaching high school.

"We've got kids that are not going to be track stars," Bracey said. "But they are going to be men and women."

Bracey has help. His wife, Theresa, attends every practice. So does daughter Adrienne. Other helpers include Jeff Brown, Ethel Cardledge, Sam McCoy, Warren Goldsboro, Bob Andrews and Douglas Hicks. Too, former Striders pop in from time to time to lend a hand.

Rex Atkinson, Thomas Jefferson's athletic director, didn't know much about the Striders until he happened to watch them one day while attending a TJ softball game.

"Just watching all those little kids running around there, that really had an effect on me," Atkinson said. "I'd just been reading in the paper about all those teen-age murders in the city, and sometimes I get to wondering if there's any hope for our young people."

"Well let me tell you. Seeing all those kids out there, and then talking to Mr. Bracey, that made me realize that there is hope after all."

Track Meets Stated

Richmond Newspapers announced yesterday that it is donating profits from its paper reclamation project to sponsor a series of summer track meets expected to involve 7,000 city youngsters.

Five regional meets, overseen by the West End Richmond Striders, a local track club, will begin July 18 and end Aug. 12 at the City Center at Richmond.

Boys and girls 10 through 15, are eligible to participate in one of seven track competitions ranging from run, jump, throw, high jump, discus and shot put. Applications are available at

city playgrounds and must be submitted a week in advance.

A small portion of the profits from the drive will fund the new newspaper plant in New Jersey.

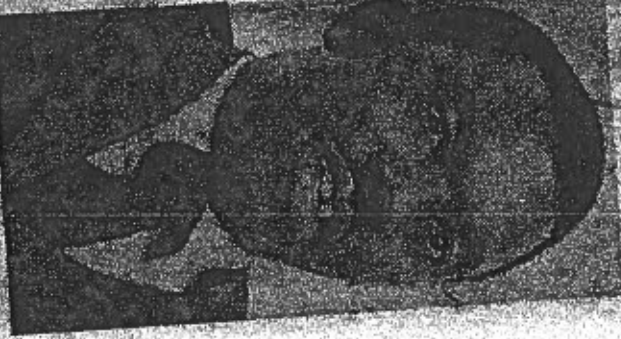
The newspapers have pledged that all profits from the venture will be used to finance youth activities in the city. The project began in April, and to date more than

Striders' Bracey finds right mix for relay team

Gen. Allen's James Bracey, coach of the West End Striders, had a problem as the summer track season opened.

Manchester's Shantrel Houston supplied the answer.

"I needed a short-power runner," said Bracey, 65. "I had only three good runners back from last year's 4x100 relay team in the 11-12 age group.

A friend told me that his niece, while not a runner in school competition, had potential."

That runner turned out to be Houston. Bracey held an audition that was almost like an actor trying out for a play.

"We went over to the school track near my house and I ran for him," said Houston. "I liked to run and fool around, but I'd never done anything serious."

Bracey liked what he saw. The rising sixth-grader at Manchester Middle and a Heming Elementary graduate joined his 50-member track club and practices at Maggie Walker High.

Houston proved Bracey has an eye for talent. He has coached such standouts as Krista Berryman, Charlene Hinton, Aston McCarty and Greg and Stan Grooms through the years.

Shantrel learned all our drills really quickly," said Bracey, a former Walker track standout who put Houston into the pressurized third relay leg. Charisa Napier from Salem Middle and the 11-year-old leads off. Namasha Joyner from Henderson Middle in Richmond, who's a natural quarter-miler, runs second. New Kent sprinter Kamesha Oley runs anchor. Napier is the daughter of former Napier, one of

the great quarter-milers in Thomas Jefferson High history.

The highlight of their season was a second in the East Coast National at George Mason University July 23 and 24. Teams from New York to Florida, plus the Bahamas and Bermuda, were there.

With Oley not quite 100 percent physically because of an injured groin, the Striders ran a 52.1 and lost to the Davon Striders from New Jersey. West End did a season-best 51.2 in the semifinals.

The foursome had several wins earlier this summer. They dropped the baton and were disqualified just once — in a big meet at Durham, N.C.

Running the 100 seems to be the last thing the girls practice.

"We run longer stuff like the mile," said Houston. "We run on stairs and we stretch out 45 minutes. A sprinter can do long stretches. A miler can't because they have to save energy."

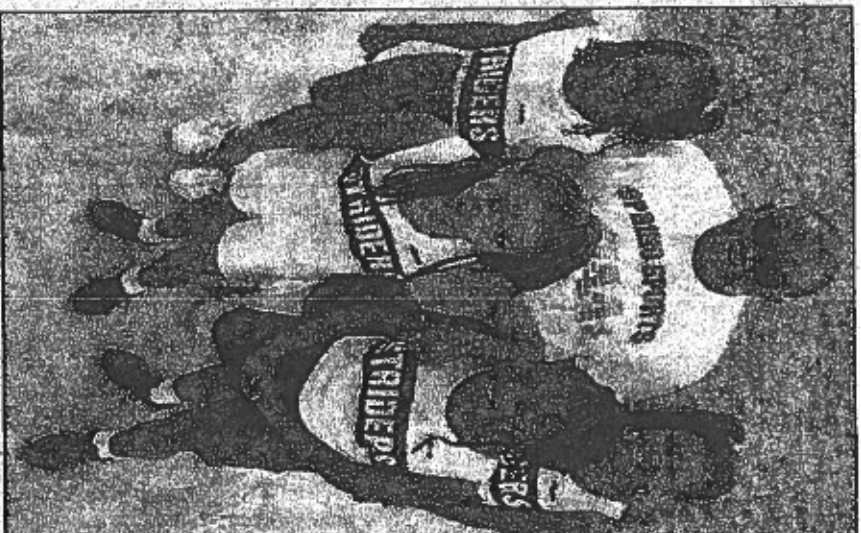
At Fairfax, Houston took the baton in seventh place and moved her team into fourth. Oley, running at 85 percent, according to Bracey, pushed West End up to second at the finish.

Because Oley's not quite healthy, the quartet won't head to Knoxville for the early August nationals. They'll run cross country in the fall and get back to relay work in the indoor season this winter.

In 1962, Bracey picked up a newspaper one night and saw that a youth track meet at the University of Richmond was to be held.

"That intrigued me," he said. "I didn't quite know what it would be. I went. A couple of city kids there asked me to help them and it went from there.

"I told them, 'I can't teach you things right
