

Project Description	<p>Broad Rock Community Garden</p> <p>The vision for this project is an art installation that enhances the functionality and aesthetic impact of this community garden. The objective is to commission a work that simultaneously addresses a pressing infrastructure need for the gardener while also promoting the City’s commitment to public art.</p> <p>The recommended project concept submitted by Taron “Silly Genius” Sparks consists of a shipping container that will serve as a storage unit for tools & materials for the garden. The container will be equipped with solar panels to provide a power source for tools, since there is no electrical source currently available. The container will also have murals painted on it to increase aesthetic appearance of the garden overall. The artist will collaborate with garden organizers about the design for the container murals and seek community volunteers to help with the installation process.</p>

Conditions for Approval	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Meet all terms of the City contract including necessary permits • Incorporate a foundation under the container • Work with community gardeners to determine which functional need should be prioritized in addition to the tool shed: solar panels, water catchment, sunshade or seating; modify design accordingly • Provide a solution for built-up heat in the shipping container during summer; e.g., solar-powered exhaust fan, shade structure or other device

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Taron “Silly Genius” Sparks is a self-taught, Southside artist well known for his wall murals throughout Richmond, although his heart is in Southside. He is the founder of All City Art Club, which mission is “to introduce street art to underserved communities without the goal of tourism or gentrification. . . . Believing that residents should not have to be pushed out in order to make a community beautiful, this art collaborative is bridging the gap between community and citizens. Art makes people feel good about where they live. Giving residents a sense of pride in their community is the first step of rebuilding.”
