# INCLEMENT WEATHER SHELTER FY23 UPDATE

#### Introduction

The following presentation provides an overview of the FY23 IWS and preliminary data on utilization of the congregate sites as well as non-congregate component implemented during the Arctic Blast Weather Event in December 2022.

The City continues to employ a multi-departmental approach, while collaborating with the GRCoC and year-round shelter providers.



#### FY23 IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

#### **RECAP**

Two (2) temporary sites were in operation until December 31, 2022.

In response to a severe weather event, the Arctic Blast, a Non-Congregate (Hotel) component was opened at the Richmond Inn Hotel on December 23, 2022.

This component ended on February 28, 2023. A total of **25** rooms were available under this component. 24 rooms were used to shelter families, the elderly and medically-vulnerable. One additional room was used as an onsite office.



#### FY23 IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

The IWS Initiative was implemented in two (2) funding phases.

- •Phase I of the initiative provided operational funding for a total of **60** beds at one site (*CCC*), along with the renovation of all four (4) sites (*CCC*, RVA Sisters Keeper, United Nations Church and Fifth Street Baptist Church).
- Phase II included funding for operations of the remaining three (3) sites (RVA Sisters Keeper, United Nations Church and Fifth Street Baptist Church).





United Nations Church, 1901 Wall Street 60 beds available Serves single adult males

Serves single adults of all identities

Daily Average: 56.7 persons





Richmond Inn Hotel – RVA Sisters Keepers 6346 Midlothian Turnpike Up to 24 rooms and 1 office

Served families, the elderly, and medicallyvulnerable populations.

A Snap Shot of Persons Served 12/23/2022-2/28/2023:

**Elderly: 13 (unduplicated count)** 

Families: 25 including 57 children (unduplicated

count)

**Medically Vulnerable: 10 (unduplicated count)** 

The Non-Congregate component opened during the Arctic Blast Weather Event.





Fifth Street Baptist Church 2800 3rd Avenue 30 beds proposed Serves single adult males

This location had to secure the approval of the City Council for a Special Use Permit. This location was **not** operational in FY23.



### Proposed Short and Mid-Term Plans

#### Short-Term (FY24 and FY25):

- Contract for emergency shelter capacity for at least <u>150</u> beds for the upcoming winter by August 2023.
- Identify locations and providers this spring.
- Beds available nightly, on a first-come, first-serve, walk-in basis. Provide two (2) meals per day. Other services would be more limited. Participants would be entered into the regional system for housing placement services.
- Provide up to <u>25 rooms</u> through a Non-Congregate setting for families, the elderly and medically vulnerable.



### Proposed Short and Mid-Term Plans Cont'd

#### Mid-Term (FY26):

- Add a minimum of <u>50</u> permanent shelter beds to the current capacity of 260+ in the region. Services will be available 24 hrs/day, 7 days/week, 365 days/year.
- Provided to persons with the most urgent and critical needs, prioritized like existing shelters. Offer a range of services with a goal for permanent housing placement in less than 2 months.

Would enable 350-450 more homeless persons to be served each year.



### Proposed Short and Mid-Term Plans Cont'd

- The Greater Richmond Continuum of Care (GRCoC) recently established a workgroup to address each of these two (2) immediate concerns. Private service providers and funders, public agency staff, and recipients will develop options and recommendations.
- Options identified by the City will be included in the deliberations. The final identified emergency shelter options is anticipated to be ready in 2-3 months.
- The extreme weather response recommendations are anticipated to be finalized in 3-4 months.
  - While the shelters likely would be located in Richmond, this should be a regional solution supported with funding from all the region's localities.
