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### Introduction


Once again, thank you for the opportunity to update the information shared on April 11, 2022.

# Cost Calculation for Continued Operation of the Non-Congregant Shelter

The calculation below is using information from the updated data derived from Commonwealth Catholic Charities:

Total Monthly Costs (31 days) \$ 445,625

Per Day \$ 14,375

Per Household per night\* \$ 125

Total number of rooms 115

The cost of operations for 8 months and 8 days\* \$3,636,875

\*This number includes the following: prorating the month of April to only include 8 days; 5 months with 31 days; 3 months with 30 days, for a total of 8 months and 8 days of operation. The reason for the extension of operations through December 31, 2022 is to be prepared in the event that construction runs longer on the Oliver Hill Way renovation.

### Options Being Assessed by HCD

The following are options being assessed by the City's Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). These strategies are more long-term in focus. All of them are predicated on securing an appropriate location and/or the requisite funding to implement the proposed new initiatives.

- □ Purchase of a hotel or other similar facility to be used to provide permanent supportive housing (PSH). The City is collaborating with Chesterfield and Henrico counties on this initiative. The City will utilize its HOME-ARPA funding of \$5.8M.
- ☐ Purchase a site and implement a tiny home village. HCD staff is still working to identify a site and gather information on the potential cost of this initiative.
- ☐ Implement a "Master Leasing or Rent Buy-Down" Initiative
