### Richmond's "Affordable" Housing Is Fueling Housing Crisis

# Petition to Deny Affordable Housing Definition Changes with Subsequent Zoning Changes to 1401 Hull Street

We, the undersigned neighbors, residents of Blackwell/Manchester, and concerned citizens of Richmond and beyond, hereby petition Richmond City Council to acknowledge that the use of HUD affordability definitions is dangerous to Richmonders and that proposed "affordable" housing project at 1401-1407 Hull Street will have an adverse impact on the Blackwell Community.

#### 1. HUD definitions for affordable housing are unacceptable

- a. The City utilizes HUD's methodology, designed to deconcentrate funding in lower-income areas, like Richmond, and give low-income households access to higher quality public education in wealthier areas, like Chesterfield
- The Richmond metro statistical area (MSA) has an area median household income (AMI) of \$109,400; however, the City of Richmond has a median household income of only \$59,606 (2022)
  - According to HUD, a one-bedroom apartment at 60% AMI is expected to cost \$1,200/month and \$1,600 for 80% AMI; in the case of 1401-1407 Hull, these pricey apartments will be between 500-600 sq ft
  - ii. The City is setting this new baseline; all non-"affordable" housing will be more expensive in comparison
  - iii. Based on Richmond's median income, 60% would be \$654/month and 80% would be \$872
    - 1. This is what would be affordable to the current residents of Richmond
    - There are zero one-bedroom units available for \$654 and 63 at \$872 (no utility allowance considered)
- c. When the HUD affordable housing rates are unattainable by most Richmonders, they're pushed out with nowhere else to go
  - This is not only community-based violence, but incites violence in our homes, schools, and neighborhoods

#### 2. Already an abundance of vacant units "affordable" rates

a. Even with a \$200 utility allowance, there are currently over 1,200 one-bedroom vacant apartment units under \$1400/month in Richmond

- Drains are already clogged from nearby construction and garbage that hasn't been collected
- ix. It takes 45 minutes to get to the closest grocery store by bus; Unlikely that over thirty units (without parking spots) can afford the inconvenience of riding the bus, when they are making as much as 60%-80% AMI
- x. This monstrous building will dwarf the entire block, leaving the true low-income earners literally in its shadow
- xi. Our landlord blames the city for the sewage backup in all the first floor units of our building; any additional pressure from an increase in capacity may force tenants from their apartments with nowhere to go
- xii. Our streets are already torn up from nearby constructions; nails leave us with flat tires and huge potholes destroy our cars
- xiii. The sound pollution and interior air quality is already very poor from the vehicular traffic and our building's single-paned windows
  - The massive scale of this project will cause anyone who works from home or sleeps during the day to leave our well-established community

#### b. Richmond 300 Master Plan

- i. "The plan recommends that future development should generally complement existing context. Uses may be mixed horizontally in several buildings on a block or vertically within the same building. Parking areas are located within the structure and to the rear of buildings. Buildings generally range from two to six stories, based on street widths and depending on the historic context."
  - This proposed structure does not complement existing context whatsoever
  - Replacing one story buildings with a massive five story is antithetical to historic context

We respectfully request that Council Members thoroughly review these concerns and take appropriate action to address them before permitting further harm. Our city's working class survival, our community's wellbeing, and heritage are at stake. We urge Richmond City Council to prioritize the needs and interests of its current residents above all else.
