PURPOSE: To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer to accept \$13,728,600.00 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) as awarded to the Department of Fire and Emergency Services, and to appropriate these funds accordingly for the purpose of hiring and employing additional sworn personnel and the purchasing of associated equipment, goods, and services.

REASON: The Department of Fire and Emergency Services applied for the SAFER grant through FEMA on February 2, 2022 and was given a Notice of Award for this grant on September 21, 2022.

RECOMMENDATION: The City Administration recommends approval of this ordinance and an amendment to Adopted Special Fund Budget Ordinance #2022-056.

BACKGROUND: The Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response Grants (SAFER) was created to provide funding directly to fire departments and volunteer firefighter interest organizations to help them increase or maintain the number of trained, "front line" firefighters available in their communities.

The goal of SAFER is to enhance the local fire departments' abilities to comply with staffing, response, and operational standards. As of September 21, 2022, FEMA has made 118 awards totaling \$360 million.

Acceptance of this grant award will provide funding for seventy-two (72) new firefighter positions to staff four (4) 18-person fire companies. This includes one (1) engine company and three (3) truck companies. The recruitment for these positions will be addressed though the Department's current recruitment process. The performance period for this grant begins March 14, 2023 and ends March 13, 2026.

FISCAL IMPACT / COST: \$13,728,600.00 Revenue Increase over 3-year period. There is no required match for this grant of Federal funds.



Article 1 Assurances, Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, Representations and Certifications

I. Article 10 Copyright

Article 23 Lobbying Prohibitions
