Eliminating parking minimums does not mean eliminating parking.

Repealing parking minimums means repealing an arbitrary and expensive government mandate that increases the cost of housing. One parking spot costs between \$10,000-\$25,000 and the expense is passed onto the renter or homebuyer, driving rent or mortgage payments up \$200-\$500 per month. Furthermore, that parking takes up valuable land that could be used for homes, contributes to the heat island effect, and exacerbates flooding during heavy rain events.
