What Is a "Fiscal Map?"

- An analysis of the funding streams that finance child and youth services
- Can include public (federal, state, local) and private (philanthropy) dollars
- A fiscal map helps answer the question:
 - What are the current investments in our children and youth?

Scope of the Richmond Fiscal Map

Who: Federal, state, city (including school district)


levels of funding

What:

Appropriated investments in direct services and supports for ages 0-24. Does not capital investments or Medicaid. Includes some special revenues.

When: Fiscal Years 2023 and 2024

Foster greater alignment amongst all City of Richmond agencies.







Maximize Opportunities to Secure New Funding

Child Care and Parental Supports - To Be Allocated

Unassigned funds in the Child Care and Parental Supports ARPA project.

\$63,165.42

\$63K in unallocated ARPA funds fund Child Care and Parental Supports. Can these (and other unallocated funds) be used strategically given the timeframe of funding?

SB 14 Sales and use tax, local; additional tax authorized in counties & cities to support schools.

If SB 14 is signed into law, gaining local special districting for school infrastructure would support the school budget deficit.



Other suggestions

Coordinate future advocacy asks

Meet with UVA Equity Center upon completion of their fiscal map. Review your funding landscapes and see if there are any targeted, coordinated asks you can make to the state legislature or state agencies.

Align resources with goals

Compare funding to needs. What is *not* budgeted for that should be based on known needs of Richmond youth? Can recipients of funding meet to discuss provisions for coordinating their funds and maximizing impact?

Plan for future updates

Keep the fiscal map living so it stays a part of your data infrastructure. Use the map to inform new elected officials and staff on what the current investments are. Keep using it as a part of conversation to inform decisions and foster alignment.


