PURPOSE: To add, by Resolution, new properties identified and approved by the Director of Parks, Recreation and Community Facilities, to the existing list of active community gardens and currently non-permitted potential community garden properties.

REASON: Community Gardens build and strengthen neighborhoods, provide health and economic benefits, increase social equity and promote environmental stewardship. Community gardens can also provide environmental benefits including managing storm water runoff by capturing and filtering water in the urban environment.

RECOMMENDATION: Approval is recommended by the City Administration

BACKGROUND: Under the leadership of Mayor Dwight C. Jones, the City Administration developed and approved by Ordinance 2011-50-45 on March 28th of 2011 a Community Garden Program in the City of Richmond. This program was to promote urban agriculture throughout the city.

FISCAL IMPACT / COST: The Code of the City of Richmond Code Section 26-496 states the City will charge an initial \$50 application fee and a \$25 annual fee per parcel to off-set the costs to process the application and issue the permit.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS: This ordinance is beneficial as it will enable vacant and underutilized city-owned parcels to be developed into productive gardens that will be maintained by the community providing excellent leisure experiences, in addition to lowering the City's operational and maintenance costs for the parcels.

PIN – W0000-805-016: 1800 Maplewood Avenue – This site will require raised beds. There are old foundations and the possibility of lead paint from old houses so no lead testing. Beds will require 5 inches of mulch beneath any planting boxes. There have been inquiries from the Oregon Hill civic association looking for a place nearby to start a community garden. No water supply (tanks). – DPR property


BS: "I would like to see lead testing here due to the old housing."


PIN – W00-0700-025: 1907 Texas Avenue (Texas Beach next to proposed skate park) DPR has been working with the neighborhood association for about a year now. Site could be tested for lead and directly farmed, however for aesthetic reasons and to delineate beds for each family that is involved, recommendation is that this site require raised beds. No current water supply (tanks). DPR property Shovel Ready - garden group is organized and ready to raise money to procure lumber and fencing BS: "I support raised beds for this site."

PIN – S000-0799-001: 2813-A Bainbridge Street – (Part of Carter Jones Park) Councilman Agelasto and Tricycle Gardens had inquired about this site as an urban farm location, there may be a possible water source – unused **DPR property**- previously an overgrown wooded lot the city purchased in 1974. Would require soil tests.

Council District 6 – Ellen Robertson

PIN – N000-0803-007: 2600 2nd Avenue – This is a small triangular parcel in Highland Park and Badia Hiott, master gardener and the gardener that has been doing the flowers underneath the Welcome to Highland Park, sign wants to use that site for a large rose garden. This site would require raised beds for vegetable production, being surrounded by roads, we would anticipate higher lead levels. For ornamentals however raised bed planting would not be necessary. DPR property. Shovel Ready. BS: "Being the introduction to the neighborhood, a rose garden might look very nice here."
