MASTER FACILITIES PLAN RECOMMENDED STRATEGY

Phase I

- Renovations as budgeted/planned in CIP
- FY14-17 to complete renovations of branch libraries

Phase II

- FY 18-22 Renovate / modernize the Main Library
- Plan for expansion and/or replacement of current branch libraries over next 15-20 years



RICHMOND PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD of TRUSTEES, FOUNDATION AND FRIENDS

- The Richmond Public Library Board of Trustees is the governing board, appointed by City Council with responsibility for library policies. Management is delegated to the Board-appointed Library Director.
 - The branch library Advisory Councils are established in the Library Board's Governance policy.
- The Richmond Public Library Foundation develops, administers and allocates private funds to provide the extra margin of excellence for the City's library system by enhancing existing public support for the library and its programs.
- The Friends of the Richmond Public Library support lectures, special events and programs at all nine Richmond Library locations. The Friends' biannual Book Sale raises much-needed funds for the continued health of the Library.

Our Numbers

- Over 900,000 visits during a year
- Circulation of library materials of 726,000 items during FY2016, This is down from 785,000 in 2015.
 - Factors for Circulation decline
 - 20% cut to the materials budget. We do not have the books people wish to read in the numbers they desire.
 - Ginter Park closed most of FY2015
 - Since 2013 one of the 9 branch libraries was closed. Only 8 of the 9 were open. In June of 2017 West End construction will be complete.
 We will be
- 205,423 Internet session during 2015-2016. From job searching, to research to looking at Facebook.



Our Challenges

- Budget cuts over the last budget years impact RPL's ability to achieve our mission. We do not have the materials to meet the citizen demand.
- Staff vacancies and cuts have forced the library to reduce hours. More hours offer more opportunity for our users to access the library.
- Richmond is in the middle of a Renaissance an
 - Factors for Circulation decline
 - 20% cut to the materials budget. We do not have the books people wish to read in the numbers they desire.
 - Ginter Park closed most of FY2015 this was an impact to the decline as well
 - Since 2013 one of the 9 branch libraries were closed during the year.
 June of 2017 West End construction will be complete. We will need to operate 9 libraries not 8.
