The Problem:

The poverty rate in Richmond is 25%. That means that thousands of Richmond citizens face economic and financial hardship. In spite of all the years of effort, life conditions for far too many individuals and families have remained the same. Therefore, it is time for a new coordinated approach. Shared Vision for the Community

Our fundamental aim is policy and structural change: building a coherent ladder out of poverty through access to quality employment and related supports, bolstering the community and economic assets of low income neighborhoods, and creating stronger neighborhoods and educational opportunities to improve the life chances of Richmond's low income children.

In order to implement the vision...

We need to Create a system that makes it easier for everyone to build wealth.

We need to facilitate pathways to build wealth in order to change the way people live and create a hopeful future for their children.

We need to CONSTRUCT an economic environment where families have a living wage that provides the ability to earn, save, and meet the unexpected challenges we all face in life.

Community Wealth Building is a community engagement process.

- ⇒ Management tool for programs and agencies to better tailor the type of services being offered to clients and to assess the way those services are delivered
- ⇒ Measurement tool for funders to determine where funding gaps exist and for organizations who receive funding to measure success
- ⇒ Communication and Policymaking tool for demonstrating success and sharing information to the public and policy makers about conditions in Richmond

THE MAGGIE WALKER INITIATIVE

The Office of Community Wealth Building (OCWB) held a Virtual Town Hall meeting in September of 2016. At this meeting a call to action was issued to all service providers, faith leaders, elected officials, policy makers, funders and residents to participate in the creation of a Community Wealth Building model that provides pathways for citizens to move from Crisis to Thriving. The first part of this exercise was to attend focus group sessions related to their interest and work.

The first session we held was focused on jobs, because a living wage job is a critical rung in the ladder to self-sufficiency. To that end, the OCWB played a major role in attracting fast growing and Fortune 500 businesses such as CoStar and Owens and Minor to downtown Richmond that provide living wage jobs. CoStar's Richmond location will employ more than 700 people with salaries ranging from \$30,000 up to \$100,000 plus. CoStar's economic impact on Richmond is estimated at \$250 million. Owens and Minor's Client Engagement Center in downtown Richmond has the potential to create 300 new jobs.
