Department of Housing and Urban Development in the total amount of \$6,368,237; and appropriated \$6,568,237 for various projects, for the purposes of re-appropriating unexpended funds and appropriating additional funds in the total amount of \$691,530 and of reallocating funds for various projects.

- § 1. That the Chief Administrative Officer for, and on behalf of the City of Richmond, be and is hereby authorized and directed to submit a Consolidated Plan for fiscal years 2016-2020 and an Annual Action Plan for fiscal year 2016-2017 to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, in the form of the document attached to Ordinance No. 2016-116, adopted April 25, 2016, and identified as Attachment C, amended to cancel certain activities as shown on Attachment D, a copy of which is attached to and incorporated into Ordinance No. 2016-226, adopted November 14, 2016, and as shown on the revised 2016-2017 annual budget plan, a copy of which is attached to and incorporated into this amendatory ordinance, as an application for the receipt of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) funds, Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) funds and to accept funds in the total amount of \$6,368,237 (\$4,082,806 - CDBG; \$1,096,458 - HOME; \$375,498 - ESG; and \$813,475 -HOPWA) from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, as specified in the revised 2016-2017 annual budget plan [identified as Attachment A], a copy of which is attached to and incorporated into this amendatory ordinance.
- § 2. That the funds in the total amount of [\$6,568,237] \$7,259,767, comprised of such grants from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development in the total amount of \$6,368,237 together with [\$98,535] \$379,765 in prior year surplus from CDBG funds [and \$101,465], \$376,765 in CDBG program income [from 2016], and \$135,000 in prior year surplus from HOPWA funds, are hereby appropriated to the Special Fund Budget for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2016, and ending June 30, 2017, for the purposes set forth [on Attachment A] in the revised 2016-2017 annual budget plan attached to this amendatory ordinance.

- § 3. This ordinance shall be in force and effect as of July 1, 2016.
- II. This amendatory ordinance shall be in force and effect upon adoption.

PURPOSE: To re-appropriate surplus federal funds, appropriate received program income, and adjust certain project activities, thereby amending the City of Richmond's 2016 - 2017 Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan. The City will re-appropriate surplus Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) Funds and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) funds for the 2016-2017 fiscal year. Total funds to be re-appropriated and or appropriated are as follows: CDBG \$556,530.00, HOPWA \$135,000.

In addition amend the City of Richmond's 2016-2017 Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan for the change in Broad National Objective for three CDBG and HOME funded activities.

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SERICE OF CITY ATTORNEY

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BACKGROUND: The City has been the recipient of CDBG funds from the U.S. Department of Housing since 1975 to implement housing and community development programs in the City's neighborhoods. HOPWA funds, addressing the housing needs of individuals affected by HIV/AIDS, were first received in 1997. Federal regulations require the City to amend its Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan when canceled activities have drawn federal funds. Federal and local regulations require that program income and surplus funds be respectively appropriated to CDBG and HOPWA programs. The reprogrammed funds are primarily the result of funds being recaptured from completed activities and earned program income.

Community Development Block Grant funds (CDBG):

CDBG Prior Year Surplus-\$281,230

CDBG Program Income - \$275,300

Total CDBG allocation: Increase budget by \$556,530 from \$4,282,806 to \$4,839,336.

Citywide Critical Home Repair (PH): Increase by \$27,530 from \$350,000 to \$377,530. Per the Voluntary HUD Agreement the City is required to dedicate 10% of its CDBG Program Income for repairs to eligible manufactured housing, (trailers).

Jefferson Davis Mixed Use Development - Add new activity at \$70,000 for the acquisition and development of a mixed use development.

Matthews at Chestnut Hill - Increase by \$350,000 from \$250,000 to \$600,000 for the construction and phase one development of the 32 single family housing project benefitting low and moderate income households.

Neighborhood Stabilization HNP (SCDHC) - Add new activity at \$159,000 for the rehabilitation and completion of a home in Northside under the NSP 1 program to benefit low and moderate income home buyers.

New Clay House II (VSH) - Increase by \$100,000 from \$100,000 to \$200,000 towards the acquisition of property located at 1125 W. Clay Street. The activity will provide permanent affordable housing to income eligible individuals.

R Street Lots (SCDHC) - Add new activity at \$100,000 for the acquisition and construction of four new homes for the infill of R Street and 26th Street.

Section 108 2012 Loan Repayment (Finance) – Reduce by \$250,000 from \$500,000 to \$250,000 for the repayment of the City's Section 108 loan.

Venable Street (BHC) - Cancel the Venable Street project by recapturing \$100,000 on BHC's multifamily housing project.

3200 W. Broad Street (BHC) – Add new activity at \$100,000 for predevelopment cost for a mixed use/mixed income multifamily development.

Housing Opportunities for Persons with Aids Program (HOPWA): HOPWA Prior Year Surplus-\$135,000

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HOPWA Program Income - \$0

Total HOPWA allocation: Increase budget by \$135,000 from \$813,475 to \$948,475.

HOPWA Greater Richmond (CCC) - Increase by \$135,000 from \$479,475 to \$614,475 to provide supportive services and housing assistance to households with HIV in the Richmond MSA.

Change Broad National Objective:

No change in allocation as a result of this amendment.

- CDBG and HOME activities related Swansboro 22nd and Perry project. The project has been redesigned from multifamily housing to the development of 22 single family housing units for home ownership. The national objective to be met will be low and moderate income housing beneficiaries.
- The Low Moderate Area activity related to the construction of an alley in the 1200 block of Catherine Street will be changed from Public Facility LMA activity to Acquisition of Low Moderate Housing activity. Funds will be used to purchase lot at the corner of Harrison and Catherine Street.
- 3. 2618-2620 Nine Mile Road change the national objective to low moderate area beneficiaries.

RECOMMENDATION: Approval is recommended by the Administration.

FISCAL IMPACT / COST: The City has received the following Federal Entitlement, program income and surplus funds in fiscal year 2016-2017: CDBG \$4,839,336.00, HOME \$1,096,458.00, ESG \$375,498.00 and HOPWA \$948,475.00. These funds total \$7,259,767.00.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS: The appropriations and re-appropriations of the City's HUD Entitlement and surplus funding will enable the City to achieve stated goals for blight reduction, increasing homeownership, strengthening neighborhoods, and assisting families and individuals in need. Many of these activities will strengthen the City's tax base over time.
