Richmond City Council met in the Council Chamber on Monday, November 13, 2017, at 6:10 p.m.

Councilor Parker Agelasto stated that the proposed ordinance establishes a competitive process to ensure that unsolicited offers represent the best available transactions, both from financial and public policy perspectives, and allows Council the opportunity to have input into the development of a transaction before its consideration of the sale.

Councilor Ellen Robertson stated that she was concerned about the impact the proposed ordinance could have on the unsolicited offer process.

Councilor Kristen Larson stated that she will support the proposed legislation; however, she was concerned about the impact the legislation will have on the unsolicited offer process, and she would like to work with Councilor Agelasto on possible amendments to the legislation.

President Chris Hilbert expressed his support for the proposed legislation.

Councilor Kim Gray stated that she wanted Council to consider increasing the maximum income level for veterans enrolled in the tax exemption program, during its consideration of the next year's budget. She also stated that she was also working with members of the Virginia General Assembly to develop a homestead exemption program.

To urge the President of the United States of America and the United States Congress to continue funding the federal Historic Tax Credit program at the current funding levels.

Patrons: Ms. Robertson and Mr. Agelasto

Vice President Cynthia Newbille requested to be added as a co-patron to the proposed resolution.

Councilor Ellen Robertson introduced RES. 2017-R081 and stated that the federal historic tax credit program has generated more in federal tax revenue than credits allocated, and has spurred private investment in neighborhoods across the city. Councilor Robertson asked all members of Council to consider being added as co-patrons of the proposed legislation in order to convey to the federal government that the city is united in the request.

Councilor Parker Agelasto reported that the city has been one of the largest recipients of the federal tax credit program in the state of Virginia, and reducing or eliminating the program will negatively impact plans to revitalize historic structures in the city.

Councilwoman Reva Trammell stated that she plans to send a letter to President Donald Trump to express her concerns with proposed cuts to the federal tax credit program and asked Council to consider a similar measure before adopting the proposed resolution.

Vice President Newbille urged Council to support the proposed resolution.

President Chris Hilbert stated that cuts to the federal tax credit program will be detrimental to the city, as the program is essential in the city's ability to rehabilitate and maintain historic neighborhoods. President Hilbert requested to be added as co-patron to the proposed resolution.

Councilwoman Trammell stated that she does not oppose the proposed legislation and asked President Hilbert whether or not he was willing to send a letter to President Trump, on behalf of Council.

Councilor Michael Jones and Councilor Kim Gray requested to be added as co-patrons to the proposed legislation.

Support

Cyane Crump, executive director of Historic Richmond, spoke in support of the proposed legislation stating that the federal and state tax credit programs have been critical to the city's revitalization efforts. Ms. Crump stated that the revitalized projects have acted as a catalyst to attract new businesses to the area. Ms. Crump reported that state representatives have expressed their intent to participate in a Dear Colleague Letter of support for the federal tax credit program.

Mercer May, director of government affairs of Home Builders Association of Richmond, spoke in support of the proposed legislation stating that the tax credit program has been essential in redeveloping and revitalizing neighborhoods in the city.

There were no further comments or discussions and RES. 2017-R081 was unanimously adopted.
