Councilor Parker Agelasto stated that he supports the special use permit requested in ORD. 2017-231; Councilor Agelasto also stated that he supports proposed ORD. 2017-215 and thanked his Council colleagues who signed on as co-patrons.

Councilor Kim Gray expressed gratitude to the owners of the property at 508 St. James Street for restoring the historic dwelling once considered a blighted property.

There were no further comments or discussions and the Consent Agenda was unanimously adopted with the exception of ORDS. 2017-228 and 2017-233 which were also adopted: Ayes 8 – Jones, Robertson, Larson, Agelasto, Gray, Trammell, Addison and Newbille. Abstentions 1 – Hilbert (Conflict of Interest on ORDS. 2017-228 and 2017-233).

REGULAR AGENDA

The following resolution was considered:

RES. 2017-R075

To express the sense of the City Council that the General Assembly of Virginia should grant the City Council the authority to cause the removal of memorials and monuments such as the statues commemorating J.E.B. Stuart, Robert E. Lee, Jefferson Davis, Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson, and Matthew Fontaine Maury located on Monument Avenue between its intersections with Belmont Avenue and Lombardy Street so that the City Council may take such action as may be necessary to cause these statues to be removed.

Councilor Michael Jones stated that the proposed resolution would allow Council the authority to control the city's own destiny by removing the historical and moral wrongs of the Confederate statues.

Opposition

H. V. Traywick, Jr., spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation and stated that the controversy over the Confederate monuments is based on a myth that the Civil War started because of slavery.

Bill Gallasch, president of the Monument Avenue Preservation Society, spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation asking why a governing body would want to destroy a vibrant neighborhood that attracts tourists and has the highest value of real estate in the city.

Patrick Sweeney spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation stating that he has been fighting for historic preservation since 1968 and there are no reasonable grounds upon which to remove the statues.

A copy of the information provided has been filed.

Ron Warren spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation stating that he rejects any attempt to alter or remove the historic statues.

Michael Fan, spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation noting that the monuments represent history and everyone should be allowed to see and know the history of the statues.

G. William Thomas spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation and stated that lives end the day people stop talking about the things that matter and everyone should work together to save the monuments.

Helen Marie Taylor spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation stating that removing the statues is unlawful and we should be building up the city's history instead of tearing it down.

Ned Ruffin spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation stating that the unique thing about Richmond is it was formerly the capitol of the Confederacy and tearing down the statues is not going to solve the city's problems.

Whitney Kramer spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation stating that tourists from around the world come to see the statues and suggested that the city use resources to restore and maintain the city's African American cemeteries.

Teresa Roane spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation stating that the Monument Avenue statues are part of a 1.7 million-dollar tourist industry and asked how the city expects to make up the revenue loss if the statues are removed.

Support

Mary Atkins spoke in support of the proposed legislation stating that the monuments are a symbol of hate and should be moved elsewhere.

Ashley Collier spoke in support of the proposed legislation and stated that the monuments represent white supremacy and intimidation and she supports their removal.

Earl Bradley spoke in support of the proposed legislation stating that the legislation begins a much needed dialog within the community.

Joseph Rogers spoke in support of the proposed legislation stating that it has allowed for open dialog and without considering every available option, the conversation cannot move forward.

Nathaniel Rebney spoke in support of the proposed legislation noting that he is in support of any dialog that will remove the monuments as they represent slavery and hate.

Rebecca Turner spoke in support of the proposed legislation stating that the monuments should be located in a place where contextual discussions about them can occur.

Omari Al-Qadaffi, Leaders of the New South founder, spoke in support of the proposed legislation noting that he agrees that the Confederate monuments should be removed.

LaShawn Green spoke in support of the proposed legislation and stated that turning cemeteries into tourist attractions does not take away the feelings some African Americans have when they see the monuments.

Austin Ross spoke in support of the proposed legislation stating that the statues were erected during the Jim Crow era, not immediately following the Civil War, and the monuments mean something negative about the city if they continue to stand.

Arthur Lewis Burton spoke in support of the proposed legislation and stated that, to have a just and equal city, the statues need to be removed.

Phil Wilayto, editor of the Virginia Defender Newspaper, spoke in support of the proposed legislation stating that many Richmonders have been calling for the removal of the Confederate monuments since 2006.

Shana Rapallo spoke in support of the proposed legislation and thanked Councilor Jones for drafting the resolution.

Marty Jewell spoke in support of the proposed legislation and thanked Councilor Jones for having the courage to put the proposal before Council.

Councilor Kim Gray stated that the evening's citizen input was meaningful and she is going to vote against the resolution to allow for additional dialog that will include many different perspectives on the matter.

Vice President Cynthia Newbille stated that the Monument Avenue statues represent a tragic and horrific history for many and asked Councilor Jones to consider continuing the resolution to allow for more discussion and a larger public hearing.

Councilor Andreas Addison requested that Council allow the mayor's Monument Avenue Commission to complete its mission and to continue the proposed resolution in the meantime.

Councilor Kristen Larson thanked citizens for their comments and stated that the proposed resolution is not the answer, and she would like more constructive dialog to understand the request of citizens and how it will impact the city.

Councilor Ellen Robertson thanked those in attendance and stated that she asked Councilor Jones, if the statues are removed, will their removal positively impact schools, poverty and affordable housing in the city. Councilor Robertson also stated that she appreciates Councilor Jones' courage and determination to move the resolution forward and will support it.

Councilor Parker Agelasto stated that he believes the Monument Avenue Commission was formed to start an important conversation and he is looking forward to reviewing the commission's recommendations.

Councilwoman Reva Trammell stated that the statues have been up for over 100 years and Council should be more concerned with creating jobs and facilitating economic development in the city. Councilwoman Trammell also stated that she cannot support the resolution until there is more community engagement.

President Chris Hilbert stated that he believes the true monuments of slavery are the segregated school system and the wealth disparity in the city. President Hilbert also stated that Council needs to work on bettering the school system, lessening crime, spurring economic development and creating wealth for all Richmond citizens.

Councilor Michael Jones remarked that he appreciated the discussion and whether the Monument Avenue Commission recommends that the city add context to the monuments or that it removes the statues, the city would still need approval from the General Assembly.

There were no further comments or discussions and **RES. 2017-R075 was rejected:** Ayes 2 – Jones, Robertson. Noes 6 – Larson, Agelasto, Gray, Trammell, Addison, Hilbert. Abstentions 1 – Newbille.

The following ordinance was considered:

ORD. 2017-214

To authorize the issuance of general obligation public improvement bonds of the City of Richmond in the maximum principal amount of \$4,900,000 to finance the cost of school projects and general capital improvement projects of the City for the following purposes and uses: construction, construction, improvements and equipment for public schools; construction, reconstruction, improvement and equipment for various infrastructure needs, including traffic control facilities, streets, sidewalks and other public ways, bridges, storm sewers, drains and culverts, and refuse disposal facilities; participation in redevelopment, conservation and community development programs, including the construction, reconstruction, improvement and equipment for targeted public facilities included in these programs; construction, reconstruction, improvements and equipment for public institutional, operational, cultural, educational and entertainment buildings and facilities, including but not limited to the theaters, parks, playgrounds, cemeteries, libraries and museums; acquisition of real property therefor as appropriate; borrowing Section 108 Loan Program funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for the business of capitalizing a business loan as part of the City's Department of Economic and Community Development's Section 108 Loan Program; and the making of appropriations to the City's Economic Development Authority ("EDA") to be used by the EDA to finance capital expenditures or to make loans or grants to finance capital expenditures for the purposes of promoting economic development; to authorize the Director of Finance, with the approval of the Chief Administrative Officer, for and on behalf of the City, to sell such bonds for such capital improvement projects, to provide for the form, details and payment of such bonds; to authorize the issuance of notes of the City in anticipation of the issuance of such bonds; and to authorize the issuance of taxable bonds, for the same purposes and uses, in the same maximum principal amount and payable over the same period as such general obligation public improvement bonds.

Deputy Chief Administrative Officer for Economic and Community Development (ECD) Lee Downey introduced ORD. 2017-214 noting that ECD is requesting to invest \$4.9 million into a housing development project underway in the city's East End.

Opposition

Earl Bradley spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation noting that ECD is asking for an additional funding knowing that it is has not fulfilled contractual obligations; therefore, the contact should be voided.

Omari Al-Qadaffi spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation noting that relocating residents from public housing does not fight poverty and asked that Council investigate ECD and not provide additional funding for the development.

Lynnetta Thompson spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation stating that, if Council votes to provide ECD with additional funding, the body does not represent its constituents because the Richmond Redevelopment and Housing Authority (RRHA) has a history of money mismanagement and fraud.

Arthur Lewis Burton spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation and noted that, for communities to be transformational, the city must change its economic face and transfer wealth.

Marty Jewell spoke in opposition of the proposed legislation stating that RRHA mismanages funds and there should be more accountability for its usage of funding.

Support

Robert Adams, RRHA Board of Directors chair, spoke in support of the proposed legislation and asked for Council's support stating that the project has been in the works for four years and the project requires many sources of capital.

Juan Powell, The Community Builders director of development for the Mid-Atlantic region, spoke in support of the proposed legislation stating that the city previously committed to providing the referenced funds.

T. K. Somanath, RRHA chief executive officer, spoke in support of the proposed legislation stating that the project has been ongoing for over four years and asked Council for its support to move it forward.

Earl Bradley commented that, if the proposed ordinance is approved, Council should ensure federal compliance and that the project is feasible for the targeted community.

Councilor Kim Gray expressed concerns regarding ORD. 2017-214 and the upcoming proposed expedited resolution requesting \$6,000,000; she asked for additional time to review all finances associated with the project.

T.K. Somanath and Anne Saunders, bond counsel for McGuire Woods, answered questions regarding ORD. 2017-214.

Councilor Kim Gray moved to continue ORD. 2017-214 to the Monday, January 8, 2018, Council meeting, which was seconded.

Councilor Parker Agelasto requested an updated project evaluation showing the various financial resources and how those resources are being used.

Councilor Ellen Robertson asked what the impact would be if the proposed legislation is continued.

Lee Downey responded that continuing the proposed ordinance would be detrimental to the project as there are deadlines.

Mr. Somanath noted that the project received federal low income housing tax credits from the Virginia Housing Development Authority and deadlines must be met or it will lose funding and face penalties.

Vice President Cynthia Newbille stated that it is critical that Council approve the proposed ordinance noting that the body was provided with information answering many of the questions raised. Ms. Newbille also stated that, for future similar projects, detailed budgets for each phase should be provided to Council in advance.

Grace Washington, Department of Housing and Urban Development Section 3 coordinator for the project, stated that there has been much community involvement and outreach related to the East End development.

Following debate on Councilor Gray's motion, **the motion failed:** Ayes 2 – Gray, Agelasto. Noes – 7 Jones, Robertson, Larson, Trammell, Addison, Newbille, Hilbert.

Chief Administrative Officer Selena Cuffee-Glenn was present to answer questions regarding ORD. 2017-214 and stated that the development is very important to the city and to the citizens who will be impacted by it.

There were no further comments or discussions and **ORD. 2017-214 was adopted**: Ayes 7 – Jones, Robertson, Larson, Trammell, Addison, Newbille, Hilbert. Noes – 1, Gray. Abstentions – 1, Agelasto.

The following resolution was considered:

RES. 2017-R090

To request the Richmond delegation to the General Assembly of Virginia to introduce and support the enactment of legislation to amend various provisions of the Charter of the City of Richmond.

Councilor Parker Agelasto stated that the proposed resolution requests that the General Assembly amend the Richmond City Charter to reflect separate offices and functions of the city auditor and the inspector general.

Councilwoman Reva Trammell inquired if the request could be delayed until after Council appoints a permanent city auditor.

President Hilbert responded that the request could not be delayed and noted that the charter amendment would separate the duties of the Office of Inspector General and the Office of the City Auditor after July 1, 2018.

It was requested that all members of Councils be added as co-patrons to the proposed resolution.

There was no further discussion and RES. 2017-R090 was unanimously adopted.

MOTIONS

Councilor Ellen Robertson moved to expedite consideration of the following resolution:

RES. 2017-R095

To approve the issuance by the Richmond Redevelopment and Housing Authority of its multifamily housing revenue bonds in an amount up to \$6,000,000.00 for the acquisition, construction, renovation, rehabilitation and equipping of an approximately 45-unit multifamily residential rental housing project to be known as Church Hill North Phase 1B located at 1611 North 31st Street in the city of Richmond.

Patron: Vice President Newbille

The motion was seconded and approved: Ayes 8 – Jones, Robertson, Larson, Agelasto, Trammell, Addison, Newbille, Hilbert. Noes 1 – Gray.

Vice President Cynthia Newbille introduced Res. 2017-R095 and noted that the funding request will not max out the city's debt ceiling in any way.

Councilor Kim Gray stated that she supports the efforts of the proposed resolution and wishes it great success; however, without seeing the entire project budget, she cannot support it.

There were no further comments or discussions and **RES. 2017-R095 was adopted**: Ayes 8 – Jones, Robertson, Larson, Agelasto, Trammell, Addison, Newbille, Hilbert. Noes 1 – Gray.
