

Considered one of Richmond's highly cherished natural treasures, Forest Hill Park is a beloved 105-acre city park owned by Richmond residents that rests on gently rolling forested bluffs in the heart of the city, just south of the powerful James River. It's area includes a western boundary of 42nd Street extending eastward to 32nd Street, and from the northern boundary of Riverside Drive southward to Forest Hill Avenue and Semmes Avenue.

A tremendous asset, Forest Hill Park is managed, preserved, and cared for by the Richmond Department of Parks, Recreation & Community Facilities, which has been instrumental in conserving and restoring this beautiful and historic sanctuary with additional assistance and support provided by Richmond residents, visitors, and groups and organizations like Friends of Forest Hill Park.

Dedicated to serving the park, the Friends organization has been very involved in the removal of invasive plant species and has provided educational workshops and guided walks in the park to identify common invasive plants versus native species. Each month, the group holds a volunteer event to pull and remove non-native plants from the park. As a sterling example of their efforts, in 2017 the group dedicated more than 446 hours in the park's azalea garden removing invasive species.
