PURPOSE: To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) to amend the FY2019 Special Fund Budget by accepting \$30,000 from the Virginia Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) for the purpose of supporting the RVA League for Safer Streets.

REASON: VA LISC received funding from the Walmart Foundation to support the RVA League for Safer Streets. This funding will be utilized to cover expenses for the 2018 Summer and Fall Leagues. Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) was adopted in the 2019 Special Funds Budget; therefore, \$30,000 must be added to the proposed grant funding from VA LISC. The grantor is listed as LISC – Midnight Basketball in the Adopted Biennial Fiscal Plan: Fiscal Years 2019-2020.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that this funding is accepted and appropriated to the Richmond Police Department FY 2019 Special Fund Budget for the RVA League for Safer Streets.

BACKGROUND: In 2017, VA LISC awarded \$13,327 in grant funding to the City of Richmond Police Department to support the Midnight Basketball League (MBL) program model. The MBL program model was incorporated into the RVA League for Safer Streets basketball program which provides a safe, productive and fun

outlet for inner city young adults residing in the City of Richmond. Young adult's ages, 17 to 24, residing in some of Richmond's targeted crime areas participate in the basketball league and informative workshops. The basketball league culminates with a Championship game.

The RVA League for Safer Streets has proven to be successful. The league is approaching its third full season. It is safe to report that while the league was/is in session, there were no shootings in Richmond's public housing communities.

FISCAL IMPACT / COST: These funds will increase the FY19 Special Funds Budget.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS: The addition of these funds (\$30,000) will allow the Richmond Police Department an opportunity to financially support the RVA League for Safer Streets.

VDEM/Homeland Security

The purpose of this fund is to assist local, state, and federal partners with prevention and response to acts of terrorism within the Richmond region. Funding will provide training and equipment to RPD to assist local, state, and federal partners in proactive security efforts and response to acts of terrorism in the Richmond region thru. mutual aid agreements/Equipment includes bomb detection and disposal equipment, mobile command vehicles, etc. RPD and its partners have identified both hard and soft targets that may be prone to an attack.

Project Safe Neighborhood (OAG)

Funds are used to address drug-related issues by supporting and collaborating with prevention partners, treatment, and law enforcement.

Department of Criminal Justice Services

The purpose of this special fund is to support needed law enforcement equipment, leadership development, community outreach, and gang reduction and intervention programs.

COPS
