Unity Ride for Sickle Cell

Whereas, The Honorable Members of Richmond City Council, the governing body of Richmond, Virginia, in the United States of America, do hereby unite in solidarity and common purpose to recognize, honor, and celebrate the annual Unity Ride for Sickle Cell; and

Whereas, Established in 2009, the Unity Ride for Sickle Cell is an organized motorcycle ride held each year on the first Saturday in May to fundraise and increase awareness regarding Sickle Cell Disease; and

Whereas, Proceeds from the event are used to help support various health and Sickle Cell Disease related entities in the Greater Richmond Region; and

Whereas, Sickle Cell Disease is a life threatening illness that is a clear and present danger to the life, health, and happiness of children, women, and men living in our community; and

Whereas, Sickle Cell Disease represents a group of inherited blood disorders that can lead to a number of severe and chronic complications, which include intense pain, heart attacks, infections, and significantly reducing an individual's life expectancy to about 40-60 years; and

Whereas, Sickle Cell Disease is the most common genetic blood disease found in the United States of America, affecting as many as 100,000 individuals in our country and millions more worldwide; and

Whereas, Sickle Cell Disease is found to primarily affect people of African ancestry and some of Mediterranean, Hispanic, Indian, and Middle Eastern descent; and

Whereas, Sickle Cell Disease is an hereditary blood disorder that leads to a tendency of red blood cells to, rather than be rounded and move easily through blood vessels, form into abnormally rigid and sticky cells that resemble a crescent shape similar to a curved farmer's tool called a sickle, which can get stuck and block blood flow and oxygen in the body; and

Whereas, Richmond City Council is a strong supporter, champion, and advocate of the life, health, and safety of all Richmond Residents and the devastating personal losses, costs, and consequences to our community as a result of this disease are tragic, profound, and far-reaching; and

Whereas, Coordination and support of the Unity Ride for Sickle Cell includes the leadership of the Ladies of Elegance Social Club, Sickle Cell Association of Richmond-OSCAR, and many other groups, organizations, and individual riders;
