President Cynthia Newbille called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m., and presided.

Invocation was offered by Reverend Tyel L. Banks, Sr. of Pure Apostolic True Holiness Church.

Members of Council and the audience recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

President Newbille requested a moment of silence in memory of Darcy Oman, former president and CEO of the Community Foundation, and honored philanthropic leader.

CHAMBER EMERGENCY EVACUATION PLAN AND CITIZEN SPEAKER GUIDELINES

Upon the President's request, Assistant City Clerk Lisa Braxton provided information on the appropriate manner in which the Council Chamber is to be evacuated in the event of an emergency along with citizen speaker guidelines.

APPOINTMENTS AND REAPPOINTMENTS

There were no appointment or reappointment items for consideration.

AWARDS AND PRESENTATIONS

President Cynthia Newbille and Chief Administrative Officer Selena Cuffee-Glenn on behalf of City Council and Mayor Levar Stoney, re-proclaimed the second full week of April each year as Richmond Public Safety Emergency 9-1-1 Telecommunicators Week and thanked the city's telecommunicator professionals for their endeavors in helping to make the city a safer and healthier place to live, work, learn, play, visit, and raise a family.

Councilor Michael Jones, on behalf of Richmond City Council, recognized Malik Mujahid and D'Jermaine Layne for their compassion in aiding a family experiencing a residential fire.

Councilor Parker Agelasto arrived and was seated.

CITIZEN COMMENT

L.A. Phipps addressed Council with a request for beautification efforts in Carytown.

Barbara Brown addressed Council with concerns regarding the proposed tax increase, and alleged that Virginia Commonwealth University doesn't pay its fair share in taxes.

Earl Bradley addressed Council with a request for a forensic audit to occur, as well as increased transparency and oversight.

Jamie Brunkow, James River Association riverkeeper, addressed Council in support of the mayor's proposed budget, which provides for healthy water quality and enhancements to the James River Park System.

Doug Allen, American Institute of Certified Planners member, addressed Council in support of the mayor's proposed budget investments in transit equity as well as improved pedestrian and bicycle accessibility within the city.

Janae Craddock, Central Virginia Legal Aid Society housing law outreach attorney, addressed Council with information concerning the impact of evictions on children and families within the city.

Ravi Perry, Ph.D., addressed Council in support of the mayor's proposed budget to fund Richmond Public Schools.

Councilor Kim Gray requested Dr. Perry to provide data comparing the city's real estate tax rate to that of other cities within the United States.

Eric Tinsley addressed Council with frustration concerning city administration's removal process for deceased animals.

To close, to public use and travel, a portion of Northumberland Avenue located between the south line of West Roberts Street and the southern terminus of Northumberland Avenue, consisting of 16,355± square feet, upon certain terms and conditions.

ORD. 2018-245

To authorize the special use of the properties known as 2009 Brook Road, 2011 Northumberland Avenue, and a portion of Northumberland Avenue for the purpose of multifamily dwellings containing up to 224 dwelling units, upon certain terms and conditions. (As Amended)

ORD, 2019-020

To erect all-way stop signs at the intersection of West 43rd Street and Stonewall Avenue.

ORD. 2019-031

To authorize the special use of the property known as 521 Craigie Avenue for the purpose of a dwelling unit within an accessory building, upon certain terms and conditions.

No. 2011-211-2012-6, adopted Jan. 23, 2012, which authorized the special use of the properties known as 535½, 537, and 541 North 2nd Street, now known as 537 North 2nd Street, for the purpose of waiving parking, building height, maximum residential floor area, and setback requirements for the construction of a mixed-use building with up to 31 dwelling units and uses permitted in the underlying zoning district, to remove a condition requiring a non-commercial mural, upon certain terms and conditions.

ORD. 2019-080

To authorize the special use of the property known as 326 East Broad Street for the purpose of permitting signs with an aggregate area exceeding that permitted by the underlying zoning regulations, upon certain terms and conditions.

ORD. 2019-081

To authorize the special use of the properties known as 1809 and 1815 East Franklin Street for the purpose of uses allowed in the B-5 Central Business District, including dwelling units on the ground floor without the application of certain requirements of City Code § 30-442.1(6), upon certain terms and conditions.

ORD. 2019-082

To amend Ord. No. 2017-194, adopted Nov. 13, 2017, which authorized the special use of the property known as 3138 Grayland Avenue, now the properties known as 3136 Grayland Avenue and 3138 Grayland Avenue, for the purpose of two single-family detached dwellings, to modify the setback requirements pertaining to 3136 Grayland Avenue, upon certain terms and conditions.

ORD. 2019-083

To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer, for and on behalf of the City of Richmond, to accept a marker, valued at approximately \$2,700.00, from Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated, to be installed at the Hull Street Library located at 1400 Hull Street to commemorate the life of Dorothy Height, a Richmond native and nationally recognized civil rights activist.

ORD. 2019-084

To declare that a public necessity exists and to authorize the acquisition of certain fee simple interests and easements for the public purpose of constructing multimodal transportation and drainage improvements along Hull Street Road between its intersection with Hey Road and its intersection with Warwick Road.

Support

Whit Clements, Forest Hill Neighborhood Association member, spoke in support of ORD. 2019-020 stating that additional stop signs will slow the speed of traffic and improve the safety of those who travel through the intersection.

Doris Bey, Richmond Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Inc. member, spoke in support of **ORD. 2019-083** stating that the marker will honor Dorothy Height as a catalyst for change and Richmond native.

Opposition

Anita Hackett, Edgehill - Chamberlayne Court Civic Association member, spoke in opposition to ORD. 2018-245 stating that the developers should consider limiting all traffic entering and exiting the property to Brook Road exclusively, to decrease potential traffic and parking issues.

Harrison Wheeler, Edgehill - Chamberlayne Court Civic Association president, spoke in opposition to ORD. 2018-245 stating that residents in the immediate vicinity of the properties will experience significant traffic and parking issues.

Support

Oscar D. Thomas spoke in support of ORD. 2019-031 stating that the dwelling is an apartment located above a garage, to be occupied by his children.

Brian Jackson, **W. Brook Road**, **LLC representative**, spoke in support of **ORD. 2018-243** and **ORD. 2018-245** stating that many of the community concerns have been addressed, and that the economic impact of the property is beneficial to the city and Virginia Union University (VUU).

Maurice Campbell, *VUU senior vice president*, spoke in support of ORD. 2018-243 and ORD. 2018-245 stating that VUU is in need of sufficient housing and jobs for students.

Vice President Chris Hilbert stated that since amendments and negotiated changes were made by the developers to satisfy community concerns, he will support **ORD. 2018-243** and **ORD. 2018-245**.

Councilor Kim Gray expressed support for **ORD. 2018-243** and **ORD. 2018-245** with reservations due to potential traffic, school and public safety implications.

Councilor Parker Agelasto expressed support for **ORD. 2018-243** and **ORD. 2018-245** and advised that while the property is currently zoned as M-1 Light Industrial, the VUU/Chamberlayne Neighborhood Plan recommended the property for a multifamily development.

Councilor Kristen Larson thanked Mr. Clements for speaking in support of **ORD. 2019-020**, and stated that the ordinance is warranted due to the close proximity of the Good Shepherd Episcopal School.

Councilwoman Reva Trammell requested Mr. Brian Jackson to clarify whether the concerns of the opposing citizens have been addressed by the developer.

Mr. Jackson advised that the developers have placed a road underneath the building to deter large trucks from disturbing the surrounding areas and ensured that the sidewalks will be publically accessible.

Councilor Michael Jones expressed support for ORD. 2018-243 and ORD. 2018-245.

There were no further comments or discussions and the **Consent Agenda was unanimously adopted.**
