PURPOSE: To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) to accept \$49,499.00 from the Office of the Attorney General (OAG) and appropriate the same to the Richmond Police Department FY2019 Special Fund Budget for the purpose of supporting the purchase of police equipment to include a Mobile Video System, Pole Cameras, Safety Shields, and Medical Go Bags.

REASON: The Richmond Police Department submitted a proposal to the OAG to address violent crime and issues that negatively affect the quality of life in the City's public housing neighborhoods such as Creighton Court, Mosby Court, Gilpin Court, and Whitcomb Court. The OAG received funds to redistribute to law enforcement entities in the state of Virginia.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that this funding is accepted and appropriated to the Richmond Police Department FY 2019 Special Fund Budget for State Asset Forfeiture (OAG).

BACKGROUND: On May 7, 2012, Abbott Laboratories ("Abbott") entered into a plea agreement with the United States, pleading guilty to one count of violating Title 21, United States Code, Sections 331(a), 333(a)(1), related to the introduction and delivery into interstate commerce the misbranded drugs Depakote, Depakote ER, and Depakote Sprinkle. United States v. Abbott Laboratories, Case No. 1:12-CR-00026 (W.D. Va.) (Judgement entered October 2, 2012). These funds are part of a redistribution of the returned funds from law enforcement entities in the state of Virginia to be used for law enforcement purposes as outlined in a July 8, 2018 letter from the Department of Treasury Executive Office of Asset Forfeiture.

FISCAL IMPACT / COST: These funds will increase the Richmond Police Department FY19 Special Fund Budget.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS: Acceptance of this award will allow the Richmond Police Department an opportunity to financially support the purchase of police equipment to include a Mobile Video System, Pole Cameras, Safety Shields, and Medical Go Bags.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA, OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL AND CITY OF RICHMOND POLICE DEPARTMENT

THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING ("MOU") is made this 3rd day of November, 2018, by and between the COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA, OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL ("Commonwealth" or "OAG") and the CITY OF RICHMOND POLICE DEPARTMENT ("Department").

- 1. PURPOSE: This MOU sets out the terms of an understanding between the OAG and the Department for the use of funds to be administered on a reimbursement basis for the purpose of providing supplemental financial support in the amount of \$49,499 for the Departments immediate law enforcement equipment needs as outlined in the proposal submitted to the OAG.
- 2. TIME FRAME: These funds shall be spent in no more than 6 months from the execution of this MOU. Reimbursements will be made within 30 days of receipt of a valid invoice.
- 3. BACKGROUND: On May 7, 2012, Abbott Laboratories ("Abbott") entered into a plea agreement with the United States, pleading guilty to one count of violating Title 21, United States Code, Sections 331(a), 333(a)(1), 352(a), and 352(f)(1), related to the introduction and delivery into interstate commerce the misbranded drugs Depakote, Depakote ER, and Depakote Sprinkle. United States v. Abbott Laboratories, Case No. 1:12-CR-00026 (W.D. Va.) (Judgment entered October 2, 2012). These funds are part of a redistribution of the returned funds from law enforcement entities in the state of Virginia to be used for law enforcement purposes as outlined in a July, 8, 2018 letter from the Department of Treasury Executive Office of Asset Forfeiture.
- 4. PARTIES: The OAG's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit was the lead investigative agency in the Abbott case. As a result of the plea agreement, the OAG was awarded an equitable share of asset forfeiture funds.

The Richmond Police Department submitted a proposal to the OAG to address violent crime and quality of life issues that are having a negative effect in the City's public housing neighborhoods. The items and the proposal are a law enforcement purpose on October 2, 2018.

5. TERMS AND CONDITIONS:

a. The OAG will reimburse the Department up to \$49,499.00.



b. Mobile Video System – Street level gun violence and illegal narcotics trafficking is an ongoing issue in public housing communities. A covert mobile video system that is housed in an undercover vehicle is needed to address community complaints and support police operations. These cameras provide valuable evidentiary support for police investigations. Mobility is important as offenders often change locations to circumvent police activity.

Pole Cams (mobile) - The Richmond Police Department utilizes fixed video cameras in many public housing communities. The ability to rapidly deploy and change camera locations currently does not exist and a mobile system would allow

the Department to better combat crime as offenders move into locations that they believe are not being surveilled. This type system is needed in support of the requested covert vehicle camera as many times a vehicle cannot be parked in the concerned areas and the height of the camera provides a better vantage point (as well as a better cellular signal). A self-charging battery system for each camera will allow for deployment of the cameras over a longer period of time.

Safety Rescue Shields – As noted, gun related violence is a major concern of the Richmond Police Department. The ability of officers to safely enter these communities is important for responding officers as well as victims. The shields are needed to provide increased ballistic safety when entering an area where there is the potential for addressing armed suspects or there is a need to rescue injured citizens.

Medical Go Bags: These mobile trauma kits provide officers with the ability to administer immediate lifesaving aid. These bags will only be issued to officers who are basic emergency medical technicians or paramedics. One bag will go to each precinct and IPU will receive more.

- c. The Department agrees to at all times be in compliance with the Agreement, Certification and Audit provisions of the joint Guide to Equitable Sharing for Foreign Countries and Federal, State, and Local Law Enforcement Agencies ("Guide").
- d. Invoices shall contain a remittance address, contact information, an invoice number, date, amount requested, Tax ID, a description of expenses and supporting documentation as necessary. State travel regulations must be followed.
- e. The Department shall submit a progress report if requested by the OAG and only if providing such report would not compromise any criminal investigations and is not overly burdensome on the Department.
- 6. SUPPLANTING: The Department agrees that funds made available under this transfer will not be used to supplant state or local funds, but will be used to increase the amounts of such funds that would be, in the absence of these funds, made available for law enforcement activities. Federal asset forfeiture funds must be used to supplement existing funds for program activities and must not replace funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose.
- 7. RECORDKEEPING AND AUDITS: The Department will maintain complete records concerning all requests for disbursements from the federal asset forfeiture fund, and all payments made from the fund, and report on the covered activities on an annual basis. The Department shall retain all books, records, and other documents relative to expenditures permitted by this MOU in accordance with record retention policy and or Federal and State Auditing Guidelines. The OAG, its authorized agents, and or state auditors shall have full access to and the right to examine any of said materials during said period. The Department will cooperate in any audit of the fund by the Virginia Auditor of Public Accounts or the United States Department of Treasury.
- 8. PREVAILING LAW: This MOU shall be construed, interpreted and enforced according to the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia.

9. MODIFICATIONS: Any amendments to or modifications of this MOU must be in writing and signed by the parties.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT REVIEW

Description

Permitting and Inspections Technology Renewal Fund

This program is funded through a 5% permit fee for the purpose of upgrading and/or replacing applications and other relevant technology to improve business processes to enhance customer service, as well as plan and project review and approval.

POLICE

Description

Federal Asset Forfeiture

This fund was established to permit the Richmond Police Department to participate in the United States of Justice Program to share assets seized as a result of investigations of drug related crimes. Funds are distributed on a percentage basis to the Richmond Police Department, federal law enforcement and any other local or state agencies participating in the investigations.

State Asset Forfeiture

This fund was established to permit the Richmond Police Department to participate in the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Service Program to share assets seized as a result of investigations of drug related crimes. Funds are distributed on a percentage basis to the Richmond Police Department, federal law enforcement and any other local or state agencies participating in the investigations.

Internet Crimes Against Children

These funds are used to assist local, state and federal partners with locating, arresting and prosecuting those who commit crimes against children. Funds will be used for equipment purchases and overtime as they directly relate to the apprehension and persecution of crimes against children through the internet.

Edward Byrne Justice Assistance Grant (JAG)

The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program (JAG) allows states, tribes, and local governments to support a board range of activities to prevent and control crime based on their own local needs and conditions. Grant funds can be used for state and local initiatives, technical assistance, training, personnel, equipment, supplies, contractual support, and information systems for criminal justice for any one or more of the following purpose areas: 1) law enforcement programs; 2) prosecution and court programs; 3) prevention and education programs; 4) corrections and community corrections programs; 5) drug treatment programs; and 6) planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs.

TRIAD

The Department of Criminal Justice Service provided funding to RPD for crime prevention activities. The activities include monthly meetings, field trips, training and dissemination of literature for seniors.

Washington/Baltimore HIDTA

Funds from the Washington/Baltimore High Intensity Drug Traffic Area (HIDTA) program are used to address drug-related issues by supporting and collaborating with prevention partners, treatment and law enforcement.

Cal Ripken

The Cal Ripken, Sr. Foundation provides grant funding for the Badges for Baseball program. Youth and volunteers (RPD personnel) meet for six to eight weeks to learn baseball fundamentals and the Healthy Choices program curriculum. Funding is also provided to purchase baseball equipment, team apparel and pay overtime for officers.

SPECIAL FUND DESCRIPTION BY AGENCY

POLICE

Description

VDEM/Homeland Security

The purpose of this fund is to assist local, state, and federal partners with prevention and response to acts of terrorism within the Richmond region. Funding will provide training and equipment to RPD to assist local, state, and federal partners in proactive security efforts and response to acts of terrorism in the Richmond region thru mutual aid agreements/Equipment includes bomb detection and disposal equipment, mobile command vehicles, etc. RPD and its partners have identified both hard and soft targets that may be prone to an attack.

Project Safe Neighborhood (OAG)

Funds are used to address drug-related issues by supporting and collaborating with prevention partners, treatment, and law enforcement.

Department of Criminal Justice Services

The purpose of this special fund is to support needed law enforcement equipment, leadership development, community outreach, and gang reduction and intervention programs.

COPS

The purpose of this special fund is to provide prevention and intervention services, resources, and programs to assist in the diversion of youth from the criminal justice system and to support youth programs and initiatives.

VA Rules Camp

The Virginia Rules Camp is a law-themed summer day-camp experience for youth hosted by Virginia Law enforcement agencies. Virginia Rules camps offer young people a fun, healthy way to spend a summer week, interactive instruction on Virginia law, and the opportunity to build positive relationships with law enforcement officers that serve their communities.

LISC - Midnight Basketball

Funds are used to support local basketball tournaments in an effort to reduce crime in some of Richmond's target areas.

Technology Innovation for Public Safety (TIPS)

Funds Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, and Bureau of Justice Assistance are used to support innovative technology implementation to address increases in crime.

LIFE Program

Funding provided to support ongoing partnerships with the Richmond Police Department. Funding includes but is not limited to the LIFE Program, Research and Program Evaluation and Community, Youth and Intervention Services programs and projects.

PUBLIC WORKS

Description

Urban and Community Forestry

This special fund will provide resources for the Urban Forestry Division to undertake projects throughout the City of Richmond.

Litter Control Grant

The purpose of this grant is to address the problem of litter in the city. Funding is based on city population and used for in-school education, citywide promotional activities and neighborhood cleanups.

Employee Trip Reduction Program

Grant funds provide GRTC transit passes as well as vanpool subsidies for City of Richmond employees in an effort to reduce congestion and the need for parking. Employee participation is 19%. The program is funded 100% by grants until the last quarter of FY13 which accounts for the local request.
