- Began in 1973 as 501(c)3 non-profit with 8 beds
- multi-phased expansion to 120 rooms in 2010
- \$11M total investment by the owner
- \$1M Invested by Bd. Of Directors since 2015

Who is Saint Francis Home?

- Licensed Home to 120 seniors & disabled
- Mission to serve those of limited means
- Volunteer Board of Directors
- \$2.5M Budget, 50 employees
- Full time fundraising staff
- Intentionally created in traditionally underserved part of Richmond
- District 5, Swansboro neighborhood, on Clopton Street at Bainbridge
- Built and owned by Catholic Church but 90% of residents are not Catholic

- Dedicated program space with Community Programming Director
- 24 Hour Emergency Assistance and licensed Med Techs on duty

The Community of St. Francis Home



- 120 Individual residents
- Admitted from across the U.S.
- 32 from the City of Richmond
- 52% paid for by the State*
- 32% pay what the State pays
- 16% pay our Stated Rate

*The Challenge



- Va. DSS Auxiliary Grant program
- Growing gap between revenue and expense:
 - Monthly Cost \$1900
 - State pays <u>\$1275</u>
 - Deficit \$ 625
- SFH Annual Deficit: \$900,000
- For 32 City of Richmond Residents, the deficit is \$240,000


