President Cynthia Newbille called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m., and presided.

Invocation was offered by Samuel Patterson, Holy Rosary Catholic Church, 3300 R Street, Richmond, VA.

Members of Council and the audience recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

CHAMBER EMERGENCY EVACUATION PLAN AND CITIZEN SPEAKER GUIDELINES

Upon the President's request, Deputy City Clerk RJ Warren provided information on the appropriate manner in which the Council Chamber is to be evacuated in the event of an emergency along with citizen speaker guidelines.

APPOINTMENTS AND REAPPOINTMENTS

There were no appointment/reappointment items for consideration.

AWARDS AND PRESENTATIONS

There were no awards or presentations.

CITIZEN COMMENT

Ashley Lewis Jones, Office of the Public Defender assistant public defender and Richmond Transparency and Accountability Project (RTAP) member, shared several personal and professional experiences with the Richmond Police Department (RPD), and requested Council to hold a public hearing regarding the Soma Global predictive policing system (RPD's records management system).

Princess Blanding informed Council of her frustration with a proposed but unscheduled community meeting to address the death of her brother, Marcus-David Peters. She expressed her concern about city government accountability and how RPD captures and shares information with the public.

Elizabeth Coston, Ph.D., Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) assistant professor and RTAP member, informed Council of the findings in the Our Streets, Our Say: Policing in Richmond report. Dr. Coston highlighted community concerns regarding RPD's records management system and requested Council to hold a public hearing.

A copy of the report provided has been filed.

Stephanie Rizzi addressed Council regarding racial disparities, policing in Richmond, and potential issues with RPD's records management system.

Wanda Stallings addressed Council with concerns about gentrification and requested the consideration of a bicycle tax.

Nathan Land, VCU student and Amnesty International outreach coordinator, addressed Council with concern regarding the expansion of VCU Police Department's jurisdiction, provided statistical information regarding officer complaints and spoke in opposition of predictive policing.

Matthew Perry, Richmond Community Bail Fund co-director, expressed support for increased police accountability and quality data that is publically accessible. Mr. Perry spoke in opposition of predictive policing and requested the Council to hold a public hearing.

Councilor Parker Agelasto requested that the Public Safety Standing Committee Chairwoman Reva Trammell consider discussing the new records management system during a future committee meeting, and informed the audience of the citizen comment opportunities at said meetings.

Councilwoman Trammell advised that the Police Department and Emergency Services are willing to work with the community, and invited all to attend the Public Safety Standing Committee Meeting on June 25, 2019, at 12:00 p.m., in the Council Chamber.

President Cynthia Newbille thanked the members of RTAP for sharing their analysis of data and reiterated that Council, city administration and RPD plan to work to address the concerns brought forth.

CONSENT AGENDA

ORD. 2019-119

To amend Ord. No. 2018-297, adopted Dec. 17, 2018, which created the Navy Hill Development Advisory Commission and announced the Council's intent to hold public hearings, all for the purpose of providing for the Council's consideration of a development proposal in the area generally bounded on the west by N. 5th St., on the north by E. Leigh St., on the east by N. 10th St., and on the south by E. Marshall St, to provide that the Commission shall furnish the Council with a final report no later than 90 calendar days following the date of introduction of the relevant ordinances instead of 90 calendar days following the date on which a majority of the Commission's members are appointed. To authorize the special use of the property known as 511 West Marshall Street for the purpose of a multifamily dwelling containing up to three dwelling units, upon certain terms and conditions.

There were no comments or discussions and the Consent Agenda was unanimously adopted.

REGULAR AGENDA

The following resolution was considered:

RES. 2018-R092

To declare a public necessity to amend the City's zoning ordinance and to initiate an amendment to the City's zoning ordinance to require that certificates of zoning compliance and letters of zoning confirmation be reviewed by the City Attorney prior to issuance.

Councilor Parker Agelasto introduced **RES. 2018-R092** informing Council that the resolution's purpose is to assist with resolving City Code and Master Plan discrepancies, transparency concerns, and issues with prospective buyers. Councilor Agelasto stated that without an opinion from the city attorney, the zoning administrator makes a ruling on a first impression basis, which sets a precedent for properties city-wide.

Councilor Kristen Larson inquired about the review process if **RES. 2018-R092** were approved and whether the zoning administrator currently works with the Office of the City Attorney.

City Attorney Allen Jackson advised Council on the legislative process regarding **RES. 2018-R092**. He stated that certificate and confirmation letter reviews will be treated akin to other requests for legal services, and that the review process is unknown until the first letters are received.

Mark Olinger, Planning and Development Review director, spoke in opposition of **RES. 2018-R092** stating that it will add a significant layer of review to the process, burdening the zoning division's staff of twelve who process roughly 1200 letters annually. Mr. Olinger advised that it is unknown how the resolution will be implemented without further clarification.

Councilor Ellen Robertson voiced concern regarding issues with the execution of legislation, and stated that retracting implementation has become a recurring issue in the Council's legislative process that needs to be addressed.

Councilor Agelasto stated that **RES. 2018-R092** addresses non-routine matters, such as when there are gray areas within the code that require close scrutiny and there is no precedent.

Councilor Robertson expressed that the City's ability to properly execute legislation needs to be known prior to passing legislation.

Councilor Agelasto advised that **RES. 2018-R092** is non-binding and information regarding the execution of the resolution would be released prior to the development of an ordinance for Council's consideration.

President Cynthia Newbille advised that she has been in contact with city administration regarding the permitting process, and that they are working to assure that the process does not deter entities from investing within the city. She voiced concern about the impact of **RES. 2018-R092** and the unknown number of letters and certificates that would fall into the category of non-routine.

There were no further comments or discussions and **RES. 2018-R092 was rejected:** Ayes 3, Robertson, Agelasto, Trammell. Noes 5, Jones, Larson, Addison, Hilbert, Newbille.

Councilor Kristen Larson questioned why **RES. 2019-R019** was before Council for consideration.

Council Chief of Staff Meghan Brown advised that the total amount of funds allocated to the referenced vendor had exceeded five thousand dollars.
