That, pursuant to section 15.2-2286 of the Code of Virginia (1950), as amended, the City Council hereby initiates an amendment to the City's zoning ordinance by requesting the Chief Administrative Officer to cause to be conducted a study to determine whether and, if so, how the City's zoning ordinance lawfully may be amended to permit, to the extent permitted by law, permit shelters in all nine Council districts within the city of Richmond and to provide the Council with a report concerning the results of the study and the recommended changes to the zoning ordinance based on such study as soon as practical after the adoption of this resolution.

That the City Planning Commission is hereby directed to hold a public hearing on any such proposed changes to the zoning ordinance and submit its recommendation and any explanatory materials to the City Council as soon as practicable.

# ORDINANCE/RESOLUTION SUMMARY

The Patron requests that the Department of Planning & Development Review and the Planning Commission review the City's zoning code in order to determine the best method of amending the zoning code to allow for single occupancy homeless shelters in all nine districts.

## BACKGROUND

#### **Summary:**

- Currently, for a homeless shelter to be established or built the organization must complete the Special Use Permit (SUP) process.
- The SUP process requires the organization to make a presentation before Council and allows for feedback from the community in which the shelter will be placed.
- The SUP process also allows the City the flexibility to make zoning constraints unique to that particular location. This flexibility is not available with any other zoning process currently used by the City.
- Frequently what occurs during community feedback regarding homeless shelters is that concerned individuals supporting the shelter are drowned out by individuals opposing the shelter due to NIMBY-ism. NIMBY stands for "Not in My Backyard".

- While most agree there is a need within the City for homeless shelters, specifically ones
  with wrap around services, it is common for people to oppose locating shelters in their
  district.
- Currently, only 50% of the homeless within the City are from the City.
- Moving forward the City and the Administration should work towards a regional approach to homelessness.
