Mark Baker, Baker Development Resources, LLC, addressed Council regarding ORD. 2020-140, ORD. 2020-144 and ORD. 2020-150. Mr Baker informed Council he represented the

applicants referenced in the proposed ordinances and was available to address any questions members may have.

There were no further comments or discussions and the **Consent Agenda was unanimously adopted.**

REGULAR AGENDA

The following resolution was considered:

RES. 2020-R039

To request that the Mayor introduce such budget amendments to the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget as may be necessary to restore funding for the Affordable Housing Trust Fund and the Eviction Diversion Program to the amounts proposed in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget introduced on March 6, 2020, in the event that City revenues exceed current projections for Fiscal Year 2020-2021.

Councilor Ellen Robertson provided an introduction of RES. 2020-R039. Councilor Robertson stated the proposed resolution would address a potential crisis in the city regarding impending evictions.

Citizens were provided an opportunity to offer comments in writing regarding Res. 2020-R039 prior to the Formal City Council meeting. All written comments received by the Office of the City Clerk were provided to members of the Council prior to the meeting and are included as an appendix to the July 27, 2020 Formal City Council meeting minutes.

Public Hearing

Allan-Charles Chipman stated Council should direct funds towards eviction diversion regardless of funding availability. Mr. Chipman requested that additional revenue recently identified by the city be directed towards anti-poverty concerns and not towards businesses recovering from recent social unrest in the city.

Councilor Kristen Larson stated that RES. 2020-R039 would circumvent the COVID-19 Relief Fund previously established by Council. Councilor Larson also stated the COVID-19 Relief Fund could allocate funds towards affordable housing and eviction relief without the need of RES. 2020-R039.

Councilor Michael Jones addressed the number of evictions in the city and stated the issue required an annual dedicated revenue source.

Councilor Stephanie Lynch expressed her support for directing funds towards rental assistance and stated she supported the proposed resolution.

Councilor Kim Gray stated Council should take a holistic view of all issues facing the city due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

President Cynthia Newbille stated a comprehensive housing strategy was being developed to address housing needs in the city. President Newbille also stated she believed the strategy, COVID-19 Relief Fund and RES. 2020-R039 could work together to address housing issues in the city.

There were no further comments or discussions and **RES. 2020-R039 was adopted:** Ayes 5, Robertson, Lynch, Addison, Hilbert, Newbille. Noes 2, Larson, Gray. Abstentions 2, Jones, Trammell.

President Newbille requested that the referenced housing strategic plan be submitted to Council as soon as possible.

Councilor Andreas Addison requested that city administration provide Council with information regarding city owned assets in opportunity zones and the city's response to the Regional Affordable Housing Framework.

The following ordinance was considered:

ORD. 2019-320

To reduce the speed limit on Patterson Avenue between Willow Lawn Drive and Pepper Avenue from 35 miles per hour to 25 miles per hour.

Councilor Andreas Addison provided an introduction of ORD. 2019-320 and stated the proposed ordinance would address pedestrian and vehicle safety.

Travis Bridewell, Department of Public Works (DPW) operations manager, informed Council that DPW did not support the proposed ordinance. Mr. Bridewell provided statistics regarding traffic within the area and stated the information indicated that a speed limit of 35 miles per hour was appropriate.

Vice President Chris Hilbert stated his support for the proposed ordinance.

Councilor Ellen Robertson expressed her concerns with speeding vehicles in the city and stated her support for the proposed ordinance. Councilor Robertson requested a report be provided to Council regarding different speed limits in the city and the need for more uniformity.

There were no further comments or discussions and **ORD. 2019-320 was unanimously adopted.**

The following ordinance was considered:

ORD. 2020-041

To amend and reordain Ord. No. 2017-129, adopted Oct. 9, 2017, which authorized the special use of the property known as 1704 Arlington Road for the purpose of illuminated canopy signage, to modify the permitted uses, upon certain terms and conditions.

Mark Olinger, Department of Planning and Development Review director, provided information regarding the proposed ordinance and stated the City Planning Commission recommended the applicant's request referenced in ORD. 2020-041 be denied.

Public Hearing

Citizens were provided an opportunity to offer comments in writing regarding ORD. 2020-041 prior to the Formal City Council meeting. All written comments received by the Office of the City Clerk were provided to members of the Council prior to the meeting and are included as an appendix to the July 27, 2020 Formal City Council meeting minutes.

Henry Moore, applicant, addressed Council and stated the ordinance was necessary to increase business by allowing the construction of additional signage directed towards potential customers.

Vice President Chris Hilbert expressed his concerns with surrounding counties' ability to advertise gas stations towards travelers and diverting potential customers away from city

businesses. Vice President Hilbert stated he would vote to override the City Planning Commission's recommendation for denial.

Councilor Kim Gray informed Council the proposed ordinance had general support from businesses within the referenced area. Councilor Gray stated the additional signage would allow for additional revenue to be collected through increased business in the city. Councilor Gray also stated she would vote to override the City Planning Commission's recommendation for denial.

Councilor Ellen Robertson stated the lack of signage in the area was detrimental towards local businesses.

There were no further comments or discussions and **ORD. 2020-041 was unanimously adopted.**

ORD. 2020-145

To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer to submit a Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan to the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as an application for the receipt of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) funds, Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) funds; to accept funds from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in the total amount of \$8,224,401.00; and to appropriate \$8,224,401.00 for various projects.

Daniel Mouer, Department of Housing and Community Development project development manager, provided additional information regarding ORD. 2020-145.

There were no further comments or discussions and **ORD. 2020-145 was unanimously adopted.**

The following ordinance was considered:

ORD. 2020-146

To amend Ord. No. 2020-050, adopted May 11, 2020, which adopted the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Special Fund Budget and made appropriations pursuant thereto, by increasing estimated revenues from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the amount appropriated to the Department of Housing and Community Development's Special Fund by \$418,767.00, for the purpose of funding housing, community and economic development activities, and assistance for low-and moderate- income persons and special needs populations.

Daniel Mouer, Department of Housing and Community Development project development manager, provided additional information regarding ORD. 2020-146.

There were no further comments or discussions and **ORD. 2020-146 was unanimously adopted.**

The following ordinance was considered:

ORD. 2020-155

To establish a Task Force on the Establishment of a Civilian Review Board to review and provide recommendations concerning the creation of such a board.

Councilor Stephanie Lynch provided an introduction of ORD. 2020-155, and stated the proposed ordinance would begin the process of establishing a civilian review board (CRB).

Councilor Andreas Addison stated the proposed ordinance was a bold step forward and informed Council of discussions held at the July 23, 2020 Governmental Operations Standing Committee meeting regarding ORD. 2020-155.

Councilor Kristen Larson stated she appreciated the discussions held at the July 23, 2020 Governmental Operations Standing Committee meeting and informed Council of her support of ORD. 2020-155.

Citizens were provided an opportunity to offer comments in writing regarding ORD. 2020-155 prior to the Formal City Council meeting. All written comments received by the Office of the City Clerk were provided to members of the Council prior to the meeting and are included as an appendix to the July 27, 2020 Formal City Council meeting minutes.

Public Hearing

Benson Smallie spoke in support of Ord. 2020-155, and stated a CRB was a crucial step towards equality for all under the law. Mr. Smallie also stated a CRB would reestablish trust between citizens and police.

Allan-Charles Chipman spoke in support of ORD. 2020-155, and stated the establishment of a CRB was required to provide accountably.

There were no further comments or discussions and **ORD. 2020-155 was unanimously adopted.**

The following resolution was considered:

RES. 2020-R045

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be established a work group including certain employees of the City and a member of the City Council to develop a plan and recommendations for the implementation of a "Marcus Alert" program by October 1, 2020.

Councilor Stephanie Lynch provided an introduction of RES. 2020-R045, and stated the proposed resolution would help better respond to members of the community experiencing mental health issues.

Citizens were provided an opportunity to offer comments in writing regarding RES. 2020-R045 prior to the Formal City Council meeting. All written comments received by the Office of the City Clerk were provided to members of the Council prior to the meeting and are included as an appendix to the July 27, 2020 Formal City Council meeting minutes.

Public Hearing

Support

Allan-Charles Chipman spoke in support of RES. 2020-R045, and stated a *Marcus Alert* would benefit individuals suffering from substance addiction, as well as those experiencing a mental health crisis.

Nicole Spangenberg spoke in support of RES. 2020-R045, and stated a *Marcus Alert* needs to be implemented as a safety issue. Ms. Spangenberg addressed her experiences with panic attacks and stated she feared how a situation involving a panic attack would be handled by police rather than a mental health expert.

Councilor Ellen Robertson requested to be added as a co-patron of RES. 2020-R045.

Councilor Kristen Larson expressed her support for RES. 2020-R045, and stated the implementation of a Marcus Alert will take a lot of work in order to bring several different entities together.

Councilwoman Reva Trammell requested to be added as a co-patron of RES. 2020-R045, and stated she believed the Marcus Alert could be successful with the Richmond Police Department (RPD) and other agencies working together.

Councilor Kim Gray stated she was informed that RPD officers would prefer mental health experts address mental health interventions.

Councilor Andreas Addison expressed his support for RES. 2020-R045, and stated mental health experts should be the first responders regarding incidents involving a mental health crisis.

Vice President Chris Hilbert stated it was unrealistic to expect police officers to respond to every situation and expressed his support for RES. 2020-R045.

President Cynthia Newbille stated the establishment of a Marcus Alert was important for the city, but suggested Council encourage the General Assembly of Virginia to take similar action to address the issue.

There were no further comments or discussions and **RES. 2020-R045 was unanimously adopted.**

The following resolution was considered:

RES. 2020-R047

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be prepared and submitted to the Council and the Mayor a report identifying funding in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget and the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Special Fund Budget appropriated to the Department of Police for mental health, substance abuse, and social service functions and that provides recommendations, to the extent permitted by law, for the re-appropriation and transfer of such funding from the Department of Police to other City departments and to community mental health, substance abuse, and social service programs designed to perform such functions.

Councilor Michael Jones provided an introduction of RES. 2020-R047, and stated the proposed resolution would help identify potential funds for the civilian review board and Marcus Alert.

Councilor Stephanie Lynch provided additional information regarding RES. 2020-R047, and stated the proposed resolution was necessary to identify funds to create systemic change.

Police Chief William Smith stated Council should increase funding for the Richmond Police Department (RPD) to establish change, rather than looking to defund the department. Chief Smith informed Council that defunding would have a negative effect on officer morale. Chief Smith also stated that the proposed resolution would prohibit him from fully implementing changes that Council had requested within the RPD. Chief Smith further stated he would examine the RPD budget in the spirit of improvement, but he must first change the misconception that the RPD budget should be defunded.

Councilor Kristen Larson inquired if funding cuts were implemented on the RPD budget, would it require RPD to initiate layoffs of employees.

Chief Smith informed Council that insufficient funding would decrease the number of RPD officers and decrease available officer training. Chief Smith stated the lack of training would lead to more police misconduct.

Citizens were provided an opportunity to offer comments in writing regarding RES. 2020-R047 prior to the Formal City Council meeting. All written comments received by the Office of the City Clerk were provided to members of the Council prior to the meeting and are included as an appendix to the July 27, 2020 Formal City Council meeting minutes.

Public Hearing

Support

Naomi Isaac, Virginia Student Power Network student organizer, spoke in support of RES. 2020-R047, and asked Council to act with urgency to fund needed change. Ms. Isaac stated the defunding of RPD was necessary to reinvest money into social services that address affordable housing and mental health.

Ceilidh Garten spoke in support of RES. 2020-R047, and shared her experiences with the RPD. Ms. Garten informed Council about incidents of racism she witnessed amongst probation officers and within the city's justice system. Ms. Garten also stated the RPD was not equipped to handle incidents of individuals suffering from a mental health crisis or substance addiction.

Allan-Charles Chipman spoke in support of RES. 2020-R047, and stated police violence could not be ignored. Mr. Chipman also stated that the police were not the best solution to address mental health and substance addiction. Mr. Chipman further requested Council divest from the police and invest in community systems of care.

Erika Misseri spoke in support of RES. 2020-R047, and requested a meaningful divestment from the RPD with funds being directed towards social work.

Mera Carle spoke in support of RES. 2020-R047, and addressed RPD's use of tear gas and its handling of protesters. Ms. Carle suggested a plan to defund the RPD budget by 50 percent within five years and to reallocate funds towards community services. Ms. Carle requested that RPD officers be required to live in the city and be prohibited from participating in an officer union.

Alisha Eversole, Virginia Commonwealth University Center for the Study of Tobacco Products student, spoke in support of RES. 2020-R047, and stated substance addiction should be addressed as a disease and not as a moral failing to be dealt with through punishment.

Kalia Harris, Virginia Student Power Network student organizer, spoke in support of RES. 2020-R047, and informed Council that some of the protesters arrested by RPD were suffering from mental health crises while awaiting release. Ms. Harris requested the defunding of RPD and for the investment of Black futures. Ms. Harris also requested a comprehensive review of the RPD budget.

Councilor Kristen Larson stated Council had a fiscal responsibility regarding the city's budget and that conversations regarding the cutting of RPD's budget and the funding of new social programs should take place during the budget review process. Councilor Larson expressed concern that a decreased RPD budget would lead to fewer available officers to respond to issues in the city. Councilor Larson also stated she believed change within the RPD was necessary, but the reallocation of funds should be done in a responsible way.

Councilor Kim Gray stated a holistic approach was necessary to review the overall budget for ways to fund social programs needed in the city. Councilor Gray also stated Council should wait to see the COVID-19 pandemic's impact on the city's budget before taking action on departmental funding. Councilor Gray informed Council she would vote no to adopt RES. 2020-R047.

Councilwoman Reva Trammell stated many citizens had shared with her their requests that Council not defund the RPD. Councilwoman Trammell expressed her concerns that a decreased RPD budget would increase the number of homicides in the city.

Councilor Andreas Addison stated Council was facing an unknown budget due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Councilor Addison requested that Council examine budget priorities in relation to issues facing the city, such as affordable housing and mental health. Councilor Addison also stated the proposed resolution should be included within a larger discussion about city priorities and city-wide budgeting. Councilor Addison recommended Council work with the General Assembly of Virginia to address necessary funding for city priorities.

Councilor Ellen Robertson addressed illegal drug activity and gun violence in the city. Councilor Robertson stated many African Americans in the city did not understand the reasoning behind requests to defund the police, because many African American communities would receive a less responsive RPD as a result of the defunding. Councilor Robertson also stated it was wrong to request police officers to address mental health issues in the city and that additional funding should be provided to address mental health issues facing minority communities.

Vice President Chris Hilbert stated that all city departments were facing an uncertain budget due to the COVID-19 pandemic and that he anticipated that all city departments would require budget cuts. Vice President Hilbert also stated citizens had informed him of concerns regarding gun violence in the city and the need for public safety.

Councilor Stephanie Lynch stated she understood the poor messaging behind the phrase "defund the police" and that some were reluctant to progressive change. Councilor Lynch also stated RES. 2020-R047 was necessary to properly fund the civilian review board and Marcus Alert previously addressed by Council.

Councilor Michael Jones stated RES. 2020-R047 was an opportunity to fund change. Council Jones expressed his belief that increased police budgets did not decrease crime and that reallocating RPD funds would benefit Black lives.

President Cynthia Newbille stated she believed that there was unanimous agreement between Council and Police Chief William Smith for a comprehensive review of the RPD's budget. President Newbille also stated she believed that Council was in agreement that a review of all departmental budgets was necessary to identify funds available to address racial and social issues in the city. President Newbille further stated she did not believe that the responsibility to provide potential reallocated funds should be placed on a single department.

There were no further comments or discussions and **RES. 2020-R047 was rejected:** Ayes 2, Jones, Lynch. Noes 7, Robertson, Larson, Gray, Trammell, Addison, Hilbert, Newbille.

President Newbille requested that legislation be introduced at the August 10, 2020 Special Council meeting to address the identification of available funds.

Councilor Kristen Larson requested that a third party audit of the city budget and more information related to the COVID-19 pandemic's impact on city revenue be made available for review in any discussions regarding identification of available funds.

We will not back down. This has to change and you will hear from us every step of the way until it does.



Dear Members of City Council,

As a lifelong Richmond resident. I would like to express my concerns about the proposed ordinances regarding regulation of short-term rentals in the city of Richmond. My husband and I own two properties in the city: one is our full-time residence and one is a full-time rental. The proposed ordinance on short-term rentals would eliminate our ability to let our property out on a short-term basis, as this is **not our full-time residence**. Additionally, we would be **limited by the number of nights** we're able to rent our property out. We support regulation and taxation on short-term rental properties, but I would like to see both of these restrictions removed from the ordinance for a number of reasons:

- 1. **Tourism:** Short term rentals are quickly becoming a preferred means of travel offering a more affordable and spacious option to travelers. With the current trajectory of Richmond as a desirable travel destination, it seems unfortunate to place such restrictions on tourist accommodations.
 - -Travelers are more likely to stay in Richmond with short-term rentals as an accommodation option (current ordinance cuts many of these out).
 - Short term rentals encourage visitors to integrate into the neighborhoods where the listings are located in ways that hotels do not. Local businesses in the surrounding areas can benefit from the existence of short-term rentals as well.
- 2. Increased Visibility + Neighborhood Beautification: For a homeowner, short term rentals provide a way for the owner to have increased visibility on the condition of the property and reduce issues with tenants not taking care of the residence. As a property owner, this is one of the most attractive elements of a short term versus long term rental. Our long-term tenants have damaged our building and let it fall into various states of disrepair. Long-term rentals in my neighborhood (Museum District) don't have a positive history of keeping up with building and yard/garden maintenance and curb appeal. In order to attract new guests, short-term rentals keep our neighborhoods clean and contribute to neighborhood beautification efforts.
- 3. **Source of income:** Short term rentals currently provide middle class income to many Richmond residents. Proper and thoughtful regulation and taxation would

be an opportunity to allow both middle class residents and the city of Richmond to prosper.

- 4. Lack of data supporting the proposed ordinances: We've attended all the public meetings throughout the course of this discussion and listened to Mark Olinger's presentation. There is a striking lack of data available regarding the current use and impacts of short-term rentals in Richmond. The only impetus cited for these proposed ordinances:
 - The reported four (4) complaints in 2018. This seems to suggest a low amount of impact.
 - The personal opinions on Air BNB operating in the neighborhood of the presenter
 - Aside from these comments, Mr. Olinger was unable to answer questions from attendees about the criteria for arriving at these regulations

I'd like to reiterate that I am not opposed to the regulation of short-term rentals. I would just like to caution adopting measures without appropriate research, community input, and analysis of data. Please consider voting against the proposed ordinance, as it is currently written, by removing the stipulations for 1) owner occupancy and 2) limiting the number of nights it can be let.

I am a resident of the 5th District and have made Richmond my home for the last 10 years.

In the last 23 days Richmond Police have behaved violently, brutalized residents, attacked the press multiple times (there is video footage of this) and lied on their Twitter platform and in press releases about their actions. I was personally gassed in broad daylight before curfew on June 1st and have ample video footage of this event. I see no leadership right now. The Mayor chose an interim police chief who murdered a resident in 2002. The city is being failed by our police, our city council, and our mayor and it is devastating to watch the same brutal tactics being deployed on non-violent protestors and the press night after night with zero accountability. Chemical agents that are not legal in warfare are being deployed against residents of our city in broad daylight, at night, and even at Father's Day celebrations. The mayor makes claims of outside forces coming in to create violence in our city - remind me, what percentage of RPD officers live in Richmond? I think the mayor might be right here - RPD, an outside force made primarily of officers that do not live here, is invading and violating the rights of residents. Don't get me started on the council rep for the 2nd district comparing bike marshalls that are trying to protect protestors from police violence to the KKK. How dare you!

I am calling for the immediate removal of the confederate monuments these police so dearly defend over any concern for resident's actual safety. I am calling for the removal of School Resource Officers from Richmond public schools and a reallocation of those funds to hire social workers, careworkers, support staff and other materials that will benefit students more than any SRO ever could. I call for the dropping and dismissal of all charges brought against people involved in demonstrations in Richmond since the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis.

While we march for George Floyd and Breonna Taylor Richmond has our own story of injustice and police brutality; the murder of Marcus David Peters. When people travel with family or friends, they want to be able to rent a home where they can spread out and have access to a kitchen, and they are willing to spend a lot of money to rent these kinds of homes. This ordinance would take many of those homes off the Richmond market.

The proposed legislation prevents owners from making money on an investment property for no clear reason. Where is the Richmond-specific data that shows that STRs are a problem that are changing the fabric of our neighborhoods? You haven't seen it because this data does not exist. Rather, this new ordinance is being driven by close-minded neighbors who enjoy complaining and their powerful lobbying group, the Fan District Association. I am a resident of the Fan, and this organization's stance does not represent my beliefs or many of my neighbors. I welcome STRs.

STRs are, in fact, a better use of rental properties than long-term rentals because they are better maintained and stand to bring in taxable income for the city. A better use of council's time would be to write and approve legislation that enables the city to benefit financially from all STRs.

It is incredibly short-sighted to approve this ordinance. If anything. **Richmond should be** doing more to develop STRs during times of Covid since many people need to travel but do not feel safe staying in a hotel. Staying in a STR is a much better option for protecting one's health and peace of mind.

The fact that I am going to sign this letter and ask that my name not be published for fear of retribution should give you some idea of the fear and anxiety that I live with as a fan resident since 1984.

During the day, our neighborhood has been enriched by beneficial tourism, attracting diverse visitors from all over Virginia and the world, including a film crew from a Japanese news station! We are proud to have the positive energy and welcome it. Contrary to what has been quoted from some in the news, I believe that one day it could actually *increase* the value of our homes.

At night, things turn in a very sinister direction. Our nights are filled with windows rattling from blaring music, loud fireworks set off close to nearby houses until dawn, people shouting obscenities and taunts, engines revving, police helicopters and incessant cars honking. We are now on our 22nd consecutive night of this "new normal." I was grateful that no one had been seriously hurt, but we now have armed vigilantes. **This is not a peaceful protest.**

I met a woman this morning as we were both picking up trash and liquor bottles from last night's revelry. She said, "I come down here a few times a day to pick up after people. This is not what the Black Lives Matter movement is about, and it is not helping us".

I visited a suburban grocery store and overheard two women talking. They were making plans to visit a restaurant. My heart broke when I heard one of them say, "We can never go back into the city of Richmond again. It's a mess down there." How long will it be before businesses say the same thing, and pack up for the suburbs?

I would like to specifically ask Ms. Lynch and Dr. Jones how they have helped our city work together to encourage communication and cooperation. Rather than promoting a dialogue between our police and the protesters, it looks like they have chosen to promote themselves by making public accusations and governing through twitter posts. Ms. Lynch and Dr. Jones, what are you doing to **unite** our city in this time of unrest? Have you been outside my house

at 3:00 AM to respectfully ask that people not set off fireworks, tag my sidewalk with graffiti, cut down tree limbs or pee on my lawn? Even our own police department feels that is a confrontation that would incite violence, and so our pleas go unheard.

In closing, thanks to each of you, and to all of our city employees who are working diligently everyday to find a solution to work together to make Richmond a better place.

2) DEFUND THE POLICE- Reallocate funds from the Richmond Police Department's extremely large budget to fund the Marcus Alert System and Civilian Review Board, as well as human services addressing health care, employment, our public education system, the environment, and general community welfare.

3) A MARCUS ALERT SYSTEM— The Marcus Alert System would mandate that mental health professionals be the first responders in a suspected or confirmed mental health crisis, with police only as their "back up" in the event that NON-LETHAL force is needed.

4) An independent CIVILIAN REVIEW BOARD, with subpoena power, to receive and investigate claims of police abuse. We do not trust the police to police themselves.

5) The DROPPING OF ALL CHARGES of those members of our community who have been arrested in connection with the recent protests against the police murder of Mr. George Floyd.

6) IMMEDIATE REMOVAL OF THE FIVE CONFEDERATE STATUES ON MONUMENT AVENUE and all other statues and memorials to Confederate leaders in the city.

Dear President Newbille and members of the Council:

The failed Navy Hill development process earlier this year made clear that public participation and transparency is of utmost importance for decisions regarding large-scale redevelopment of city-owned properties in Richmond. Regardless of how valid an offer may seem to members of the Administration, city law must be followed, a Request for Proposal (RFP) must be issued to attract any competing bids, and transparency must be maintained throughout the process. Should the Mayor and Council decide to forgo the RFP process in favor of entering directly into negotiations with the developer, such a decision would disregard the need for transparency and inclusion, as well as fail to provide the city with the benefit of evaluating competing bids and winning the best deal for the city.

In withholding the appraisals from City Council and the public, the Administration claims that they are strengthening their negotiating position, and that releasing the numbers will undermine their hopes of getting the best deal possible. We disagree. Since developers will certainly have completed their own independent appraisals, the only people being kept in the dark about the true value of the property are the members of City Council and the taxpayers they represent. If the taxpayers know the true value of the property, the Administration and developers know that this will prompt great scrutiny, which will strengthen the city's hand, not weaken it.

Earlier this year, a majority of the City Council <u>adopted a resolution</u> calling for new appraisals of the properties formerly included in the Navy Hill proposal, a small area plan, and a "robust, citywide input" process to determine the future of the site. While we strongly agree with the need for a small area plan, we are prepared to accept competitive, negotiated redevelopment of this site with the mix of uses that has been proposed, along with the reconnection of Clay Street, however there must still be the opportunity for public input and review. The short city survey referred to by the economic development director cannot be a substitute for real public input. In addition, given that it was not a scientifically controlled survey, it should not be cited as representing support for the proposal.

It is not at all clear that the Council ordinance of June 22nd, approving the surplusing of the Public Safety building site, authorized the Administration to forgo the RFP process, therefore

the Partnership for Smarter Growth asks that Council ensure that the Administration issues an RFP and conducts a competitive process. In addition, Council should require the release of both the City's appraisal and the results of the survey. The Council should ensure the Administration conducts a transparent and inclusive public process for the RFP and subsequent review of project proposals and bids. Finally, the Council should ensure the Administration initiates a small area plan for the remaining parcels.

For the record, my name is Bryce Carter. I am a resident of the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Mayor Stoney's resolution to expedite the removal of statues in the City of Richmond is illegal according to both VA Senate Bill 183 and Virginia House Bill 1537. The citizenry respectfully asks that you, elected public officials, follow the letter of the law.

Both Senate Bill 183 and House Bill 1537 require a public hearing, not less than 30 days AFTER publishing a PUBLIC notice prior to removal or relocation of monuments.

Language from SB 183 passed 10 APR 2020:

Prior to removing, relocating, contextualizing, or covering any such publicly owned monument or memorial, the local governing body shall publish notice of such intent in a newspaper having general circulation in the locality. The notice shall specify the time and place of a public hearing at which interested persons may present their views, not less than 30 days after publication of the notice. After the completion of the hearing, the governing body may vote whether to remove, relocate, contextualize, or cover the monument or memorial. If the governing body votes to remove, relocate, contextualize, or cover the monument or memorial, the local governing body shall first, for a period of 30 days, offer the monument or memorial for relocation and placement to any museum, historical society, government, or military battlefield.

I respectfully ask that the Members of Council <u>REJECT</u> Mayor Stoney's resolution to expedite the removal of statues from The City of Richmond.

Madame Council President Newbille and Members of the Richmond City Council:

My name is Sean Baskerville. I am a voter and resident of the 7th District. I am also a Registered Behavior Technician (RBT) certified to implement behavior interventions, and I have a Masters Degree in Applied Behavior Analysis.

I am proposing the following measures to address the de-escalation of police behaviors which often result in the death of Black men and women during police interactions.

First, I propose that a team be developed to work with the Police Department to develop appropriate social interactions with citizens and define mandatory training goals for all officers. The team should meet on a regular basis and consist of the following personnel: a community relations person, a social worker, a mental health person, a conflict resolution specialist, a board certified behavior analyst (BCBA), and Precinct Psychiatrist/Psychologist, and Representative from the officers assigned Precinct

Secondly, as a way to use non-violent intervention strategies, I propose that 911 calls go to social services first response teams to assess mental health, behavioral health or substance abuse issues, instead of those calls going directly to the Police. Those citizens needing a mental health representative or consult should have immediate contact with a therapist. An individualized conflict resolution plan for the citizen would then be directly coordinated with officers. All de-escalation strategies and measures

must **first** be used be used and **no** life threatening holds can be used. Efforts should be increased for the community to know who community officers are and not see police only in times of conflict. This strategy would need to be implemented during the times before and during detainment.

Thirdly, the previously mentioned team should develop behavioral contracts with officers and recommendations in collaboration from the qualified individuals along with the officer to achieve reasonable and measurable behavior goals as deemed by the city, community, and police department. This Behavioral contracts would be created by the officer's previously mentioned team.

Fourth, family members of the person detained will have direct contact with social services team members to receive updates on behavior changes, and on whether or not the officer has mastered community social interaction goals. The Team will discuss and formalize incentive and disciplinary actions, I recommend individualized service plans (ISP) for officers as well as Behavior Intervention Plans(BIPs) identified by the team and for any departments where the team deems necessary.

Fifth, to change the negative perception and increase positive relations with the local police departments, police representatives should provide random "safety checks" or "coupons" available for licensed drivers or residents redeemable by merchants for goods or services. In addition, programs for kids 5 to 17 with parents consent can have a police escort to their proms, birthdays, or family special event, or they can participate

in police ride a long programs. Programs geared to mentor students and increase gender diversity for those who want to become police officers should be developed. There will be a police officer unit trained and available for individuals with disabilities. The officers in this program will assist officers in the needs of dealing with citizens with disabilities when the event of a violation of the law. Topics from behavior strategies and protocols to helping other officers in how to interact with people with mental health issues should be covered.

These are my broad recommendations. I would be happy to give further details or answer any questions.


My name is Brad Hemp, I am an owner of two restaurants in Richmond: Brenner Pass in Scott's Addition and Metzger Bar and Butchery in Church Hill. I would like to request that the City Council adopt an ordinance that would require the Richmond City Department of Finance to apply all ALM tax payments as specified by the taxpayer business in their monthly return, whether submitted online or by hard copy. In other words, if a restaurant makes a \$5000 tax payment for July 2020 Meals Tax liability, the Department of Finance would be required to apply that tax payment only to July 2020 Meals Tax liability.

I am requesting that such an ordinance be created because the Department of Finance currently applies tax payments in a manner that can create thousands of dollars of tax penalties and fees without the knowledge of the business that is subject of these penalties. This happens in the following manner. On occasion the Department of Finance may assess a tax liability against a business, then fail to notify to business of that liability (there appears to be no requirement that businesses be notified of an assessment in a timely manner). After the assessment, subsequent ALM tax payments will be applied first to the assessment, then to ALM tax liability for the month submitted. The result is that business will unknowingly underpay its ALM tax liability and incur a 10% penalty for underpayment immediately. For instance, the Department of Finance might assessment a \$100 tax liability against a business and not notify that business. When that business submits its \$5000 ALM tax payment for July 2020, \$100 will go to pay the assessment first, then \$4900 will go to pay for the July 2020 ALM tax liability. Since the tax liability for July was \$5000, the Department of Finance will then assess a \$500 penalty against the business. In turn, the Department of Finance will not notify the business of this assessment so that the business can pay (or dispute) the tax penalty prior to the next ALM payment. As a result, when the business makes its next ALM tax payment, the Finance

Department will apply the payment to the assessment first and the business will again unknowingly incur a penalty for 'underpayment' of their ALM tax liability. This can continue month after month without the knowledge of the business owner. I recently fell victim to this flaw in the ALM tax payment system, and incurred about \$10,000 of penalties and fees without my knowledge or the opportunity to prevent the accumulation of penalties.

The Department of Finance claims that they apply tax payments in this manner per the Code of Virginia 58.1-3913, which directs that tax payments will be first applied to the oldest liability. This section of the Code of Virginia does allow for modification by local ordinance, so I know of no legal impediment to an ordinance requiring the Department of Finance to apply ALM tax payments to the month specified in the tax return. This would prevent the creation of exorbitant fees without the knowledge of the business. If the Department of Finance makes a tax assessment, they can still notify the business and collect it in the usual manner.



I would like to share my support for RES 2020-R048 and thank you to Delegates Lynch and Jones for this important legislation. All over the nation, we have seen protestors gather daily to protest police brutality and violence; and they have been met with - police brutality and violence. Our medical community has repeatedly shared that tear gas is incredibly harmful - especially during a pandemic. We have seen the impact of non-lethal rounds and the injuries they cause.

I am a social worker of 20+ years. In the beginning of my career I worked in multiple residential settings with youth with mental health and behavioral needs who were deemed unsafe to live in the community. I worked primarily with teenage boys. They were often several inches taller than me and had at least 50lbs on me. They became angry. They would sometimes act in aggressive ways towards others or property (heaven forbid). I came to work everyday armed with...... NOTHING. I did not carry pepper spray. I did not have a weapon or wear any protective gear. I wore casual clothes and sneakers. No one suffered serious injuries and no one was murdered. I share this personal experience because I feel it demonstrates that we can interact with others and support safety without weapons or escalating violence. The secret to success every single time was relationship. I genuinely liked those kids - and believed in their goodness - and they (most of the time) liked me. I know that there are better ways to create and sustain safety. Behaving violently and using tactics of intimidation and fear escalate violence, they do not stop it.

Marcus Alert Program

RES. 2020-R045 (item 32)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be established a work group including certain employees of the City and a member of the City Council to develop a plan and recommendations for the implementation of a "Marcus Alert" program by October 1, 2020.

Once implemented, this program will potentially save lives of people going through mental health crises. This will divert people away from prison and instead provide them with the mental health care that they need. It also will reduce the case load on the police and instead allow for mental health professionals to care for people who need their services.

Civilian Review Board

ORD. 2020-155 (item 30)

To establish a Task Force on the Establishment of a Civilian Review Board to review and provide recommendations concerning the creation of such a board.

We need an oversight board with citizens (not other police) to review the actions of the police and hold them accountable for their behavior. Any system without outside checks and balances is vulnerable to negligent behavior.

Affordable Housing and Eviction Diversion

RES. 2020-R039 (item 22)

To request that the Mayor introduce such budget amendments to the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget as may be necessary to restore funding for the Affordable Housing Trust Fund and the Eviction Diversion Program to the amounts proposed in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget introduced on March 6, 2020, in the event that City revenues exceed current projections for Fiscal Year 2020-2021.

In this time of COVID-19 our community needs more funding to support eviction diversion and affordable housing. Families should not be put out on the street because of city revenue projections.

Oversight of Civil Asset Forfeiture Special Funds

RES. 2020-R046 (item 33)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be prepared and submitted to the Finance and Economic Development Standing Committee a quarterly report that provides certain data relevant to the City's five civil asset forfeiture special funds for the purpose of increased oversight of the sources and uses of civil asset forfeiture special funds.

Police are allowed to seize private property during the course of arresting/prosecuting for drug crimes through a federal program, and sell these assets to fund Special Funds - we should have access to detailed information on from whom these assets are seized or how the special funds are used. Again, power without checks and balances can easily be

corrupted. The incentive to seize personal property for departmental gain is too enticing and should be mitigated by oversight.

Re-Appropriation & Transfer of Funds from Police to Community Providers RES. 2020-R047 (item 34)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be prepared and submitted to the Council and the Mayor a report identifying funding in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget and the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Special Fund Budget appropriated to the Department of Police for mental health, substance abuse, and social service functions and that provides recommendations, to the extent permitted by law, for the reappropriation and transfer of such funding from the Department of Police to other City departments and to community mental health, substance abuse, and social service programs designed to perform such functions.

As I mentioned in the Marcus Alert program, I believe mental health crises should be handled by mental health professionals, not police officers. I also believe substance abuse issues should be handled by substance abuse counselors and professionals and that social services should be handled by professionals in that field. The police should not be catch-all for community issues. **We don't need more arrests - we need help!** Please re-direct funds from the police to fund city and community programs that specialize in these fields.

I believe that the adoption of these resolutions and ordinances will benefit our community and I urge you to support these items in Monday's City Council meeting.

Right now, they are feared. They are the other. They are an anonymous force of destruction. Reallocating these funds enables communities to take care of their most vulnerable members. Equitable access to healthcare, housing, nutrition, employment, and education will eliminate the need for criminal pursuits. By providing more possibilities for people to choose, they are less inclined to fall into illegal actions. It's basic Maslow's pyramid. Right now, some members of our city are struggling to survive. How are they supposed to make healthy, informed decisions? How are they supposed to access their best selves? Redistributing the resources from the police into community programs will make a tremendous difference.

I believe that the adoption of these resolutions and ordinances will benefit our community and urge you to support these items in Monday's City Council meeting.





Marcus Alert Program

RES. 2020-R045 (item 32)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be established a work group including certain employees of the City and a member of the City Council to develop a plan and recommendations for the implementation of a "Marcus Alert" program by October 1, 2020.

Once implemented, this program will potentially save lives of people going through mental health crises. This will divert people away from prison and instead provide them with the mental health care that they need. It also will reduce the case load on the police and instead allow for mental health professionals to care for people who need their services.


corrupted. The incentive to seize personal property for departmental gain is too enticing and should be mitigated by oversight.

Re-Appropriation & Transfer of Funds from Police to Community Providers RES. 2020-R047 (item 34)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be prepared and submitted to the Council and the Mayor a report identifying funding in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget and the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Special Fund Budget appropriated to the Department of Police for mental health, substance abuse, and social service functions and that provides recommendations, to the extent permitted by law, for the reappropriation and transfer of such funding from the Department of Police to other City departments and to community mental health, substance abuse, and social service programs designed to perform such functions.

As I mentioned in the Marcus Alert program, I believe mental health crises should be handled by mental health professionals, not police officers. I also believe substance abuse issues should be handled by substance abuse counselors and professionals and that social services should be handled by professionals in that field. The police should not be catch-all for community issues. **We don't need more arrests - we need help!** Please re-direct funds from the police to fund city and community programs that specialize in these fields.

Councilmembers,

I'm writing today in support of ordinance 2020-155 To establish a Task Force on the Establishment of a Civilian Review Board to review and provide recommendations concerning the creation of such a board. I'm a longtime resident of the 5th district and a citizen of Richmond for 21 years.

Over the past two months I've watched our city's police act with the professionalism and grace of fraternity boys on spring break. They have brazenly and repeatedly taunted, assaulted, and used disproportionate force on citizens of the city, including press. I will not recount the stories, as I know you have heard them many times. However the fact that RPD officers are doing this openly, while being filmed, goes to the heart of the callous and narcissistic authoritarianism that has broken our community's trust. If Richmond Police believe they can act with impunity on camera, I shudder to think what they are doing when they are not being actively monitored on their beats. When an organization designed to protect and serve the community misuses its authority, and when that same organization has demonstrated an unwillingness to provide transparency to its actions and hold accountable those who do not uphold the highest bar of professional conduct, it is imperative to create direct accountability to the community.

In debating civilian review boards, the arguments against generally fall into three categories:

- 1. Some form of "it's simply not needed" (they can monitor themselves, that's the chief's job, that's Internal Affairs job, the Commonwealth's Attorney provides governance). We have seen clearly that the police are **not** monitoring themselves effectively. They are **not** providing transparency. They are **not** acting professionally. And they are not being held accountable. Providing checks and balances to power in situations where the citizenry cedes authority is the essence of who we are as a country
- 2. Such boards will somehow create a means for individual citizens to politicize and act upon personal grudges. Any such concerns are resolvable through implementation details (how long people may sit on the board, who the board ultimately recommends action to / how much influence it has, etc.)
- 3. Creating this level of accountability may make it harder to recruit officers to the city.

On this point I say loudly, Good. If the argument against creating accountability is that it will be harder to find people who are confident their actions will withstand scrutiny, then let it be harder. We should be trying to hire the best, most committed, and most empathetic talent we can find

I see no rational argument against voting in favor of this ordinance. Arguments to the contrary amount to little more than noise created by a system that understands that if they were subjected to scrutiny and held to account for their behavior, they would have to behave differently, more carefully, more morally - ie better. This ordinance is basic common sense; and moreover, creating simple accountability is really the least we can do to start to reform policing in Richmond in this moment of time.

ORD 155 - Civilian Review Board. I think that it will be vital to have no police, prosecutors, or judges serving on this task force, or the final board. This ensures a truly independent body that can create structures to provide adequate checks and balances in our criminal justice system. Please directly involve local Richmond activists such as those involved with the Richmond Transparency and Accountability Project as well as Princess Blanding of the Justice and Reformation Project. These folks have been workshopping ideas related to community-police accountability for a long time and there is every reason to begin with the experience and blueprints they already have for our city. Subpoena power is a necessary part of a working civilian review board. And also, I was happy to see that you have some criteria for task force and review board members. Please include at least 50% voices from the outlined marginalized groups in both the task force and the eventual board.

RES R045 - Marcus Alert. Please use the same criteria outlined above for the civilian review board to help create the Marcus Alert. Initial voices should be fully independent from the Richmond Police Department. It is very important to me that organizers and activists from the Richmond Transparency and Accountability Project and the Justice and Reformation group are involved in this project, which is their brainchild and for which they have a clear blueprint ready for the city.

3. RES R047 - Defund the Police. Our police just spent over \$2 million to enforce temporary curfews; to use chemical weapons on protestors; to militarize our streets; to arrest city residents and members of the press; and to stifle free speech and assembly in less than 60 days. This, while city tenants are threatened with eviction; people are unhoused; families are struggling with food insecurity; and students and educators struggle to prepare for virtual learning. Let's get our priorities straight! Reduce the police budget immediately and fund Black futures; fund Richmond futures. This resolution can go further; please push for a demilitarization of our department. I want to see a sell-off of equipment like LRADs and MRAPs that do not ever belong in our neighborhoods.

My name is Hannah McHugh. As a disturbed Richmond citizen who has witnessed a complete lack of leadership in my elected officials over the last few months—I am commenting on today's City Council meeting in order to refocus your attention to some key concerns. Echoing the public demands of many other Richmond citizens and protesters, I strongly encourage you all to:

- 1. Re-open the Marcus-David Peters Case, and <u>vote in favor of RESOLUTION No.</u> <u>2020-R045</u>, which would almost immediately implement the "Marcus Alert" program.
- 2. **Defund the Richmond Police and Sheriff's Office.** Please help revitalize a Care Economy in a city that so desperately needs it. *Please vote in favor of RESOLUTION*No. 2020-R047, which would begin to better utilize our taxpayer dollars, allowing for the reallocation of funds from the RPD to other, far more important city departments—namely those focused on community mental health, substance abuse, and social service programs.
- 3. **Drop all charges against every protester, regardless of the charges' nature.** There can be no rightful or even lawful arrests when our officers have in-mass brutalized and agitated the general public so severely over the last few months. They cannot be trusted, and therefore, you cannot punish citizens for their unique responses to these terrorizers and the wrongful legislation that further condoned their gestapo-esque behavior.
- 4. Establish a Civilian Review Board with subpoena powers, separate and completely independent of the Richmond Police Department and Sheriff's Office. It goes without saying that these officers are trained to be afraid, violent, and essentially useless at their once core-duty: to protect and serve the community. Therefore, we need complete community oversight of their policing. Please vote in favor of ORDINANCE No. 2020-155 to get this done.
- 5. Give complete and total rent amnesty to those facing evictions, and suspend all future rent/mortgage payments for the duration of this global pandemic. Despite popular belief, the coronavirus is not over. There is no vaccine. Going forth with any evictions right now, and forcing clearly vulnerable people into even more precarious financial and living situations during an epidemic is a health-risk to everyone. Please protect the people of Richmond. Stop punishing citizens who cannot even afford to live right now.

All that being said, there are a few other items on this meeting's docket which vaguely intersect with the demands above:

I am also strongly <u>urging that city council oppose ORDINANCE No. 2020-117</u>, which would allow VCUPD to become an operational user of the RPD's records management system for the input, retrieval, and storage of records and facilitating interoperability between the two departments. There is obviously already a dangerous lack of civilian oversight on RPD. It is completely unnecessary, and a violation of public trust, to share records and tax-funded resources with what is essentially a private police agency that is almost entirely unaccountable to taxpayers - and which employs unknown, private contract security officers who are unregulated by city government. I vehemently oppose city council allowing RPD to share taxpayer funded resources and information on our city's citizens with a private police force over which we have no control and which is not required to operate transparently.

Similarly, I am urging council to oppose ORDINANCES No. 2019-275 and No. 2019-276—establishing a Technology Zone and giving bizarre tax breaks to these future tech workers—essentially outsourcing Richmond's current economy to profithungry businesses that have absolutely no interest in bettering our communities. It feels redundant to say that this is a sloppy, quick-fix attempt at economic revitalization. Public Comment -

My name is Thalia Hernandez and I am a resident of the 5th district in Byrd Park. I would like to express my support ORD 2020-155. I support the demand of countless community organizations and the family of Marcus-David Peters for the creation of a civilian review board, with subpoena power, that is fully independent from law enforcement and prosecutors, and run by the community, particularly those who are most impacted by over-policing. It should receive adequate funding to run its operations that come from the pre-existing budget of the Richmond Police Department, with at least 1% of RPD's current budget. We know the police cannot police themselves and it's time to entrust and empower the community, which the police are supposed to serve and protect, with the power of accountability.

I would like to express my support for 2020-R045. The Marcus Alert, which would shift the decision-making authority during a crisis call to trained mental health professionals is crucial to ensuring everyone receives help not harm. Currently, law enforcement officers decide which de-escalation interventions to use during a crisis. The Marcus Alert proposal would require law enforcement and behavioral health authorities to establish policies that put behavioral health clinicians in charge in these complex situations. Law enforcement may be present to secure the scene and only use non-lethal force if advised by the mental health clinicians. Black, brown, low-income and LGBTQ+ people experience higher rates of mental health distress due to structural barriers to care and stress of living with a marginalized identity, they are also more likely to be targets of police violence. This model recognizes that public health is public safety in times of behavioral health crises.

I would like to express my support for RES 2020-R047. I support defunding the Richmond Police Department (RPD) by reallocating funds from RPD's large budget to the Marcus Alert, Civilian Review Board, and human services addressing healthcare, employment, public education, and general community welfare. Too many live in poverty, lack adequate access to healthcare, employment, and affordable housing as well as face unique barriers in education. This is especially true for Black and Latinx adults and youth. Last year, RPD's total general fund was 95 million dollars, while

Housing & Community Development's was 3 million dollars. Additionally, Richmond Public Schools have been in crisis - as of 2018, only 19 out of 44 Richmond Public Schools were fully accredited by the state. In order to cultivate a high quality of life and increase public safety, Black communities' futures must be fully funded.

Richmond Transparency & Accountability Project Policy Statement: Ordinance Number 2020-155

Background

Civilian oversight remains of paramount importance in Richmond, without which RPD will continue to police itself without any meaningful accountability. Although there is no one-size-fits-all type of civilian oversight, RTAP advocates for a system which helps to enhance public safety, broadly understood; provides meaningful responses to civilian complaints; includes access to and analysis of policing data; the ability to recommend changes to police department policies; authority to access financial information and make budgetary recommendations; promotes trust through continued transparency and open communication between RPD and the Richmond community; and other systemic proactive activities.

Partners

The Richmond Transparency & Accountability Project has worked with numerous community organizations, including New Virginia Majority, Southerners on New Ground, Justice & Reformation for Marcus-David Peters, Legal Aid Justice Center, and many others. We have knocked on hundreds of doors and spoken to countless community members in our most over-policed neighborhoods. As City Council developed Ordinance No. 2020-155, we provided consultation to Councilmembers Stephanie Lynch, Mike Jones, Andreas Addison, Kim Gray, and Kristen Larson. Additionally, we provided two public comments to outline our position at the City Council meeting on June 22, 2020.

Policy Position

As written, Ordinance No. 2020-155 provides adequate time to gather broad based community input that will inform recommendations, a funded task force and the ability to make a budgetary recommendation for the subsequent mechanism of civilian oversight, and is established independently from the police. The ordinance does not fully reflect RTAP's commitment to racial equity. RTAP recommended that the task force include members of communities who are most impacted by policing, as evidenced by RPD data; for example, Black people, members of public housing communities, and those communities that experience the highest rates of policing in the city. The qualifications for the task force do not ensure that these community members will be leading the conversation.

Recommendation

RTAP recommends that § 1-B-2 read as follows: "Qualifications for the task force include members of groups who have experienced historically disparate policing, including Black and Latina/o/x people, people living with disabilities, people who are unhoused, public housing residents, members of the LGBTQ community, and persons under the age of 18."

I am writing in advance of the City Council meeting that will be held on Monday, July 27th at 6pm to express my support for the following ordinances and resolutions.

Marcus Alert Program

RES. 2020-R045 (item 32)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be established a work group including certain employees of the City and a member of the City Council to develop a plan and recommendations for the implementation of a "Marcus Alert" program by October 1, 2020.

Once implemented, this program will potentially save lives of people going through mental health crises. This will divert people away from prison and instead provide them with the mental health care that they need. It also will reduce the case load on the police and instead allow for mental health professionals to care for people who need their services.

Civilian Review Board

ORD. 2020-155 (item 30)

To establish a Task Force on the Establishment of a Civilian Review Board to review and provide recommendations concerning the creation of such a board.

We need an oversight board with citizens (not other police) to review the actions of the police and hold them accountable for their behavior. Any system without outside checks and balances is vulnerable to negligent behavior.

Affordable Housing and Eviction Diversion

RES. 2020-R039 (item 22)

To request that the Mayor introduce such budget amendments to the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget as may be necessary to restore funding for the Affordable Housing Trust Fund and the Eviction Diversion Program to the amounts proposed in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget introduced on March 6, 2020, in the event that City revenues exceed current projections for Fiscal Year 2020-2021.

In this time of COVID-19 our community needs more funding to support eviction diversion and affordable housing. Families should not be put out on the street because of city revenue projections.

Oversight of Civil Asset Forfeiture Special Funds

RES. 2020-R046 (item 33)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be prepared and submitted to the Finance and Economic Development Standing Committee a quarterly report that provides certain data relevant to the City's five civil asset forfeiture special funds for the purpose of increased oversight of the sources and uses of civil asset forfeiture special funds.

Police are allowed to seize private property during the course of arresting/prosecuting for drug crimes through a federal program, and sell these assets to fund Special Funds - we should have access to detailed information on from whom these assets are seized or how the special funds are used. Again, power without checks and balances can easily be

corrupted. The incentive to seize personal property for departmental gain is too enticing and should be mitigated by oversight.

Re-Appropriation & Transfer of Funds from Police to Community Providers RES. 2020-R047 (item 34)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be prepared and submitted to the Council and the Mayor a report identifying funding in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget and the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Special Fund Budget appropriated to the Department of Police for mental health, substance abuse, and social service functions and that provides recommendations, to the extent permitted by law, for the reappropriation and transfer of such funding from the Department of Police to other City departments and to community mental health, substance abuse, and social service programs designed to perform such functions.

As I mentioned in the Marcus Alert program, I believe mental health crises should be handled by mental health professionals, not police officers. I also believe substance abuse issues should be handled by substance abuse counselors and professionals and that social services should be handled by professionals in that field. The police should not be catch-all for community issues. **We don't need more arrests - we need help!** Please re-direct funds from the police to fund city and community programs that specialize in these fields.

I believe that the adoption of these resolutions and ordinances will benefit our community and I urge you to support these items in Monday's City Council meeting.

I am writing to urge you all to pass ORD.2020-155, RES. 2020-R045, RES.2020-R046, and RES.2020-R047.

ORD 155 - Civilian Review Board. I think that it will be vital to have no police, prosecutors, or judges serving on this task force, or the final board. This ensures a truly independent body that can create structures to provide adequate checks and balances in our criminal justice system. Please directly involve local Richmond activists such as those involved with the Richmond Transparency and Accountability Project as well as Princess Blanding of the Justice and Reformation Project. These folks have been workshopping ideas related to community-police accountability for a long time and there is every reason to begin with the experience and blueprints they already have for our city. Subpoena power is a necessary part of a working civilian review board. And also, I was happy to see that you have some criteria for task force and review board members. Please include at least 50% voices from the outlined marginalized groups in both the task force and the eventual board.

RES R045 - Marcus Alert. Please use the same criteria outlined above for the civilian review board to help create the Marcus Alert. Initial voices should be fully independent from the Richmond Police Department. It is very important to me that organizers and activists from the Richmond Transparency and Accountability Project and the Justice and Reformation group are involved in this project, which is their brainchild and for which they have a clear blueprint ready for the city.

3. RES R047 - Defund the Police. Our police just spent over \$2 million to enforce temporary curfews; to use chemical weapons on protestors; to militarize our streets; to arrest city residents and members of the press; and to stifle free speech and assembly in less than 60 days. - 3. **Drop all charges against every protester, regardless of the charges' nature.** There can be no rightful or even lawful arrests when our officers have in-mass brutalized and agitated the general public so severely over the last few months. They cannot be trusted, and therefore, you cannot punish citizens for their unique responses to these terrorizers and the wrongful legislation that further condoned their gestapo-esque behavior.
- 4. Establish a Civilian Review Board with subpoena powers, separate and completely independent of the Richmond Police Department and Sheriff's Office. It goes without saying that these officers are trained to be afraid, violent, and essentially useless at their once core-duty: to protect and serve the community. Therefore, we need complete community oversight of their policing. Please vote in favor of ORDINANCE No. 2020-155 to get this done.
- 5. Give complete and total rent amnesty to those facing evictions, and suspend all future rent/mortgage payments for the duration of this global pandemic. Despite popular belief, the coronavirus is not over. There is no vaccine. Going forth with any evictions right now, and forcing clearly vulnerable people into even more precarious financial and living situations during an epidemic is a health-risk to everyone. Please protect the people of Richmond. Stop punishing citizens who cannot even afford to live right now.

All that being said, there are a few other items on this meeting's docket which vaguely intersect with the demands above:

I am also strongly <u>urging that city council oppose ORDINANCE No. 2020-117</u>, which would allow VCUPD to become an operational user of the RPD's records management system for the input, retrieval, and storage of records and facilitating interoperability between the two departments. There is obviously already a dangerous lack of civilian oversight on RPD. It is completely unnecessary, and a violation of public trust, to share records and tax-funded resources with what is essentially a private police agency that is almost entirely unaccountable to taxpayers - and which employs unknown, private contract security officers who are unregulated by city government. I vehemently oppose city council allowing RPD to share taxpayer funded resources and information on our city's citizens with a private police force over which we have no control and which is not required to operate transparently.

Similarly, I am urging council to oppose ORDINANCES No. 2019-275 and No. 2019-276—establishing a Technology Zone and giving bizarre tax breaks to these future tech workers—essentially outsourcing Richmond's current economy to profithungry businesses that have absolutely no interest in bettering our communities. It feels redundant to say that this is a sloppy, quick-fix attempt at economic revitalization. We already know what happens to cities just like Richmond that use this approach paying the way for gentrification. No matter how well-intentioned this approach might be, how can you reconcile the outcome which will likely mirror that of Seattle, San Francisco, Boston, Houston, etc...? If your intentions are to revitalize our economy, why not invest in the business sectors and workers that already carry Richmond? Why not raise the minimum wage? Why not invest in affordable housing? Why not provide better safety nets for the Richmond citizens that are statistically most likely to be pushed out by this hasty decision? If what you view as a successful Technology Zone involves negatively impacting and displacing any percentage of the RVA population, where do your priorities truly lie as elected officials? I encourage city council to do much better, and find a different approach to this problem.

Dear Mayor Stoney and Councilmembers,

We, the undersigned Richmond-based lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ+) organizations, join the calls from the Richmond Transparency and Accountability Project, Justice and Reformation, Richmond for All, Southerners On New Ground (SONG) and others in supporting the *updated* demands from the family of Marcus-David Peters, which were released on June 9, 2020.

June is the celebration of Pride month, which marks and honors the Stonewall uprising. In 1969, led by Black and Latinx transgender women, our community spoke out and fought against police brutality and violence. Those five days of riots amplified an international movement for LGBTQ+ rights that continues to this day. Pride was born out of efforts to address police brutality and violence and we cannot in good conscience celebrate Pride without addressing the nation's continued police violence and systemic racism.

The anti-Black racist violence happening throughout the country in the last weeks was brought once again to the national stage with the police killings of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor. In late May, Tony McDade, a Black transgender man, was killed by police in Florida. Just two years ago, Marcus-David Peters was killed by Richmond City Police while he was naked, unarmed, and suffering a mental health crisis. There are clear steps we can take right now to address these injustices and make Richmond a safer place for everyone.

We support the call for Commonwealth Attorney Colette McEachin to re-open the case of Marcus-David Peters. Marcus' family deserves justice. Additionally, Black, Brown, and LGBTQ+ communities have historically lacked trust in our city's criminal justice system, especially due to mistreatment, violence, and indifference from the Richmond Police Department. Re-opening the case will demonstrate Richmond's commitment to justice and start rebuilding trust with the community.

We support defunding the Richmond Police Department (RPD) by reallocating funds from RPD's large budget to the Marcus Alert, Civilian Review Board, and human services addressing healthcare, employment, public education, and general community welfare. LGBTQ+ people are more likely to need essential public services especially since too many live in poverty, lack adequate access to healthcare, employment, and affordable housing as well as face unique barriers in education. This is especially true for LGBTQ+ Black and Latinx adults and youth. Last year, RPD's total general fund was 95 million dollars, while Housing & Community

Development's was 3 million dollars. Additionally, Richmond Public Schools have been in crisis - as of 2018, only 19 out of 44 Richmond Public Schools were fully accredited by the state. In order to cultivate a high quality of life and increase public safety, Black communities must be fully funded first.

We support the Marcus Alert, which would shift the decision-making authority during a crisis call to trained mental health professionals. Currently, law enforcement officers decide which deescalation interventions to use during a crisis. The Marcus Alert proposal would require law enforcement and behavioral health authorities to establish policies that put behavioral health clinicians in charge in these complex situations. Law enforcement may be present to secure the scene and only use non-lethal force if advised by the mental health clinicians. LGBTQ+ people experience higher rates of mental health distress due to the homophobia and transphobia in our communities, and LGBTQ+ people of color experience these at even higher rates. This model recognizes that public health is public safety in times of behavioral health crises.

We support the creation of a Civilian Review Board, which will be an independent body with subpoena power made up of community members, particularly Black and Latinx. Lambda Legal notes that LGBTQ+ people experience higher rates of harassment, misconduct, and violence from law enforcement. The National Center for Transgender Equality found that 58% of transgender people have been mistreated by law enforcement. Our community deserves to be treated with dignity and respect. An independent Civilian Review Board will hold police accountable for their actions.

We support the dropping of all charges for those arrested in connection with the recent protests against the murder of George Floyd, Marcus-David Peters, and countless other Black individuals. While Richmonders were in mourning, the city mobilized curfews, militarized police and the state national guard against protesters resulting in hundreds of Richmonders getting arrested, many for merely for breaking curfew. LGBTQ+ people face significantly higher rates of incarceration, and once in a prison or jail, they face high levels discrimination and harassment. Black transgender women in particular routinely experience appalling conditions such as denial of health care access, solitary confinement, placement in men's prisons, and sexual assault. The criminal justice system, and in particular prisons and jails, are directly harmful for Black and LGBTQ+ people.

Finally, we support the immediate removal of the five Confederate statues on Monument Avenue and all other statues and memorials to Confederate leaders in the city. These memorials dominate Richmond's landscape and have the effect of honoring pro-slavery leaders whose actions directly harmed the ancestors of many Black Richmonders. Their prominent display sends a terrible message that Black Richmonders do not matter to the city.

We look forward to working with you on adopting these important new policies and procedures to continue to protect all of us.

I hope you are well. Please submit my public comment for the the July 27 meeting of the Richmond city council meeting to the city council. Thank you so much!

Public Comment -

My name is Thalia Hernandez and I am a resident of the 5th district in Byrd Park. I would like to express my support ORD 2020-155. I support the demand of countless community organizations and the family of Marcus-David Peters for the creation of a civilian review board, with subpoena power, that is fully independent from law enforcement and prosecutors, and run by the community, particularly those who are most impacted by over-policing. It should receive adequate funding to run its operations that come from the pre-existing budget of the Richmond Police Department, with at least 1% of RPD's current budget. We know the police cannot police themselves and it's time to entrust and empower the community, which the police are supposed to serve and protect, with the power of accountability.

I would like to express my support for 2020-R045. The Marcus Alert, which would shift the decision-making authority during a crisis call to trained mental health professionals is crucial to ensuring everyone receives help not harm. Currently, law enforcement officers decide which de-escalation interventions to use during a crisis. The Marcus Alert proposal would require law enforcement and behavioral health authorities to establish policies that put behavioral health clinicians in charge in these complex situations. Law enforcement may be present to secure the scene and only use non-lethal force if advised by the mental health clinicians. Black, brown, low-income and LGBTQ+ people experience higher rates of mental health distress due to structural barriers to care and stress of living with a marginalized identity, they are also more likely to be targets of police violence. This model recognizes that public health is public safety in times of behavioral health crises.

I would like to express my support for RES 2020-R047. I support defunding the Richmond Police Department (RPD) by reallocating funds from RPD's large budget to the Marcus Alert, Civilian Review Board, and human services addressing healthcare, employment, public education, and general community welfare. Too many live in poverty, lack adequate access to healthcare, employment, and affordable housing as well as face unique barriers in education. This is especially true for Black and Latinx adults and youth. Last year, RPD's total general fund was 95 million dollars, while

Housing & Community Development's was 3 million dollars. Additionally, Richmond Public Schools have been in crisis - as of 2018, only 19 out of 44 Richmond Public Schools were fully accredited by the state. In order to cultivate a high quality of life and increase public safety, Black communities' futures must be fully funded.

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

Furthermore I believe that the police have an excess of money. I was tear gassed by Richmond Police on June 1 at 7:40, 20 minutes before the then-curfew, while peacefully protesting. My first amendment rights were denied. I do not trust a system that routinely and mistakenly uses chemical weapons against its citizens. My tax dollars should go to funding our schools and social services, not to supporting violence by police.

Police have selectively enforced laws in a way that has harmed our community. On Saturday, a firearm was discharged to intimidate people gathered at the former Lee Monument, now known as Marcus David Peters circle. Despite having clear identifying information, no charges were pressed. The city cares about broken windows more than the actual safety of its people.

Last night, July 26, people grabbed off the sidewalk by Monroe Park, as shown in video evidence. - -Re-open the Marcus David Peters case; you know, the man who was having a severe mental health crisis when a Richmond Police officer murdered him? I remember growing up believing that a police officer only fires their weapon as a last resort, not because they're terrified of a naked black man. I guess our officers aren't as brave and honorable as we try to pretend they are.
- -Defund RPD aka take SOME of their RIDICULOUS budget away (I can't even begin to comprehend the amount spent recently on teargas and riot gear alone), and reallocate those funds to services that can improve ALL of our lives! Mental health services, education, housing...I'm sure you all know that these areas that could desperately use a boost in funding. -Enact the Marcus Alert system so that trained mental health professionals respond to mental health crisis calls. This is not rocket science. This makes sense. How many people killed by police would still be alive if this system were already in place?


City Council Members:

To Richmond City Council:

I write in opposition to Resolution No. 2020-R047, which requests the Chief Administrative Officer to prepare a report by October 1, 2020, identifying which functions and monies can be moved from the 20-21 RPD budget to various alternative mental health, substance abuse, and social service programs.

Although the intention of this resolution is something I, and I believe, most of the community supports, the method and time frame make this an impossible and hollow effort for many reasons. No one would disagree that over the years, police have been required to handle an ever increasing list of non-police functions, and need relief so that they can concentrate on keeping all citizens safer. But fixing this is a complicated process.

Let me enumerate my reasons:

- 1. It is inappropriate to move money in the current RPD budget when it is unknown what their costs will be in light of the current pandemic and widespread racial protests.
- 2. It will surely take several months to identify what programs in these fields would not only be appropriate, but also able to accommodate such an increase in workload, even with additional funds. Some programs, and the professionals therein, may be a perfect fit, while others may not. Exploring this delicate information will take considerable study and time.
- 3. What may in fact come out of the study of these functions is that it may be most appropriate to add personnel from another agency to the member of RPD on any given call. For example, a mental health provider accompanying an officer may be the best way to de-escalate and appropriately handle a citizen in a mental health crisis. Or sending a social worker, along with an officer on a domestic violence or child abuse crisis. These situations would still require RPD to utilize their staff (and their money) to address the problem. Also, this requires not only identifying a program to perform a function, but also a specifically trained individual to accompany an officer on these type of calls. Would that alternative provider need to be an employee of RPD? How long would it take to find and contract with providers willing to do this?

- 4. The Resolution only requires one opportunity for public input. That is totally inappropriate in such a complicated and entirely different manner of handling the issues concerned.
- 5. It needs to be researched as to how these issues are being handled by other localities across the country. Various professional organizations will surely need to be consulted as to Best Practices in each field. Will this require action by the General Assembly? Will it require a Charter change? Will MOUs need to be worked out with hospitals and other health care facilities?
- 6. A thorough and thoughtful study of all of this will (and should) take several months to be done appropriately. We need to get it right! The worst thing that could happen is to institute a set of programs that do not address, but only exacerbate the problems that need to be addressed.
- 7. By spending the time between now and the 21-22 Budget cycle, a solid alternative plan could be developed.

I urge all members of Council to vote NO on this resolution as presented.

I am writing in advance of the City Council meeting that will be held on Monday, July 27th at 6pm to express my support for the following ordinances and resolutions.

Marcus Alert Program

RES. 2020-R045 (item 32)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be established a work group including certain employees of the City and a member of the City Council to develop a plan and recommendations for the implementation of a "Marcus Alert" program by October 1, 2020.

Once implemented, this program will potentially save lives of people going through mental health crises. This will divert people away from prison and instead provide them with the mental health care that they need. It also will reduce the case load on the police and instead allow for mental health professionals to care for people who need their services.

Civilian Review Board

ORD. 2020-155 (item 30)

To establish a Task Force on the Establishment of a Civilian Review Board to review and provide recommendations concerning the creation of such a board.

We need an oversight board with citizens (not other police) to review the actions of the police and hold them accountable for their behavior. Any system without outside checks and balances is vulnerable to negligent behavior.

Affordable Housing and Eviction Diversion

RES. 2020-R039 (item 22)

To request that the Mayor introduce such budget amendments to the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget as may be necessary to restore funding for the Affordable Housing Trust Fund and the Eviction Diversion Program to the amounts proposed in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget introduced on March 6, 2020, in the event that City revenues exceed current projections for Fiscal Year 2020-2021.

In this time of COVID-19 our community needs more funding to support eviction diversion and affordable housing. Families should not be put out on the street because of city revenue projections.

Oversight of Civil Asset Forfeiture Special Funds

RES. 2020-R046 (item 33)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be prepared and submitted to the Finance and Economic Development Standing Committee a quarterly report that provides certain data relevant to the City's five civil asset forfeiture special funds for the purpose of increased oversight of the sources and uses of civil asset forfeiture special funds.

Police are allowed to seize private property during the course of arresting/prosecuting for drug crimes through a federal program, and sell these assets to fund Special Funds - we should have access to detailed information on from whom these assets are seized or how the special funds are used. Again, power without checks and balances can easily be

corrupted. The incentive to seize personal property for departmental gain is too enticing and should be mitigated by oversight.

Re-Appropriation & Transfer of Funds from Police to Community Providers RES. 2020-R047 (item 34)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be prepared and submitted to the Council and the Mayor a report identifying funding in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget and the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Special Fund Budget appropriated to the Department of Police for mental health, substance abuse, and social service functions and that provides recommendations, to the extent permitted by law, for the reappropriation and transfer of such funding from the Department of Police to other City departments and to community mental health, substance abuse, and social service programs designed to perform such functions.

As I mentioned in the Marcus Alert program, I believe mental health crises should be handled by mental health professionals, not police officers. I also believe substance abuse issues should be handled by substance abuse counselors and professionals and that social services should be handled by professionals in that field. The police should not be catch-all for community issues. **We don't need more arrests - we need help!** Please re-direct funds from the police to fund city and community programs that specialize in these fields.

I believe that the adoption of these resolutions and ordinances will benefit our community and I urge you to support these items in Monday's City Council meeting.

RES R045 - Marcus Alert. Please use the same criteria outlined above for the civilian review board to help create the Marcus Alert. Initial voices should be fully independent from the Richmond Police Department. It is very important to me that organizers and activists from the Richmond Transparency and Accountability Project and the Justice and Reformation group are involved in this project, which is their brainchild and for which they have a clear blueprint ready for the city.

3. RES R047 - Defund the Police. Our police just spent over \$2 million to enforce temporary curfews; to use chemical weapons on protestors; to militarize our streets; to arrest city residents and members of the press; and to stifle free speech and assembly in less than 60 days. This, while city tenants are threatened with eviction; people are unhoused; families are struggling with food insecurity; and students and educators struggle to prepare for virtual learning. Let's get our priorities straight! Reduce the police budget immediately and fund Black futures; fund Richmond futures. Going forth with any evictions right now, and forcing clearly vulnerable people into even more precarious financial and living situations during an epidemic is a health-risk to everyone. Please protect the people of Richmond. Stop punishing citizens who cannot even afford to live right now.

All that being said, there are a few other items on this meeting's docket which vaguely intersect with the demands above:

I am also strongly <u>urging that city council oppose ORDINANCE No. 2020-117</u>, which would allow VCUPD to become an operational user of the RPD's records management system for the input, retrieval, and storage of records and facilitating interoperability between the two departments. There is obviously already a dangerous lack of civilian oversight on RPD. It is completely unnecessary, and a violation of public trust, to share records and tax-funded resources with what is essentially a private police agency that is almost entirely unaccountable to taxpayers - and which employs unknown, private contract security officers who are unregulated by city government. I vehemently oppose city council allowing RPD to share taxpayer funded resources and information on our city's citizens with a private police force over which we have no control and which is not required to operate transparently.

Similarly, I am urging council to oppose ORDINANCES No. 2019-275 and No. 2019-276—establishing a Technology Zone and giving bizarre tax breaks to these future tech workers—essentially outsourcing Richmond's current economy to profithungry businesses that have absolutely no interest in bettering our communities. It feels redundant to say that this is a sloppy, quick-fix attempt at economic revitalization. We already know what happens to cities just like Richmond that use this approach paying the way for gentrification. No matter how well-intentioned this approach might be, how can you reconcile the outcome which will likely mirror that of Seattle, San Francisco, Boston, Houston, etc...? If your intentions are to revitalize our economy, why not invest in the business sectors and workers that already carry Richmond? Why not raise the minimum wage? Why not invest in affordable housing? Why not provide better safety nets for the Richmond citizens that are statistically most likely to be pushed out by this hasty decision? If what you view as a successful Technology Zone involves negatively impacting and displacing any percentage of the RVA population, where do your priorities truly lie as elected officials? I encourage city council to do much better, and find a different approach to this problem.

Public Comment -

My name is Thalia Hernandez and I am a resident of the 5th district in Byrd Park. I would like to express my support ORD 2020-155. I support the demand of countless community organizations and the family of Marcus-David Peters for the creation of a civilian review board, with subpoena power, that is fully independent from law enforcement and prosecutors, and run by the community, particularly those who are most impacted by over-policing. It should receive adequate funding to run its operations that come from the pre-existing budget of the Richmond Police Department, with at least 1% of RPD's current budget. We know the police cannot police themselves and it's time to entrust and empower the community, which the police are supposed to serve and protect, with the power of accountability.

I would like to express my support for 2020-R045. The Marcus Alert, which would shift the decision-making authority during a crisis call to trained mental health professionals is crucial to ensuring everyone receives help not harm. Currently, law enforcement officers decide which de-escalation interventions to use during a crisis. The Marcus Alert proposal would require law enforcement and behavioral health authorities to establish policies that put behavioral health clinicians in charge in these complex situations. Law enforcement may be present to secure the scene and only use non-lethal force if advised by the mental health clinicians. Black, brown, low-income and LGBTQ+ people experience higher rates of mental health distress due to structural barriers to care and stress of living with a marginalized identity, they are also more likely to be targets of police violence. This model recognizes that public health is public safety in times of behavioral health crises.

I would like to express my support for RES 2020-R047. I support defunding the Richmond Police Department (RPD) by reallocating funds from RPD's large budget to the Marcus Alert, Civilian Review Board, and human services addressing healthcare, employment, public education, and general community welfare. Too many live in poverty, lack adequate access to healthcare, employment, and affordable housing as well as face unique barriers in education. This is especially true for Black and Latinx adults and youth. Last year, RPD's total general fund was 95 million dollars, while

Housing & Community Development's was 3 million dollars. Additionally, Richmond Public Schools have been in crisis - as of 2018, only 19 out of 44 Richmond Public Schools were fully accredited by the state. In order to cultivate a high quality of life and increase public safety, Black communities' futures must be fully funded.

Developing this plan is crucial to the safety and integrity of our community.

Civilian Review Board

ORD. 2020-155 (item 30)

To establish a Task Force on the Establishment of a Civilian Review Board to review and provide recommendations concerning the creation of such a board.

This is incredibly important. We need to have local voices and oversight on police activity. Officers acting with impunity is what creates a culture of violence. Getting this plan started as soon as possible is crucial.

Affordable Housing and Eviction Diversion

RES. 2020-R039 (item 22)

To request that the Mayor introduce such budget amendments to the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget as may be necessary to restore funding for the Affordable Housing Trust Fund and the Eviction Diversion Program to the amounts proposed in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget introduced on March 6, 2020, in the event that City revenues exceed current projections for Fiscal Year 2020-2021.

Oversight of Civil Asset Forfeiture Special Funds

RES. 2020-R046 (item 33)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be prepared and submitted to the Finance and Economic Development Standing Committee a quarterly report that provides certain data relevant to the City's five civil asset forfeiture special funds for the purpose of increased oversight of the sources and uses of civil asset forfeiture special funds.

Re-Appropriation & Transfer of Funds from Police to Community Providers RES. 2020-R047 (item 34)

To request that the Chief Administrative Officer cause to be prepared and submitted to the Council and the Mayor a report identifying funding in the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 General Fund Budget and the Fiscal Year 2020-2021 Special Fund Budget appropriated to the Department of Police for mental health, substance abuse, and social service functions and that provides recommendations, to the extent permitted by law, for the re-appropriation and transfer of such funding from the Department of Police to other City departments and to community mental health, substance abuse, and social service programs designed to perform such functions.

Please relocate these funds. The civil unrest and uprising you have witnessed is a direct result of an inequitable distribution of resources given to people who should not be militarized. Policing is a reaction to crime. Remember the old saying, an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure? By redistributing funds and resources directly to communities, you will help to reduce the causes of crime. Police should be welcomed by the community as members of that community. Right now, they are feared. They are the other. They are an anonymous force of destruction. Reallocating these funds enables communities to take care of their most vulnerable members. Equitable access to healthcare, housing, nutrition, employment, and education will eliminate the need for criminal pursuits. By providing more possibilities for people to choose, they are less inclined to fall into illegal actions. It's basic Maslow's pyramid. Right now, some members of our city are struggling to survive. How are they supposed to make healthy, informed decisions? How are they supposed to access their best selves? Furthermore I believe that the police have an excess of money. I was tear gassed by Richmond Police on June 1 at 7:40, 20 minutes before the then-curfew, while peacefully protesting. My first amendment rights were denied. I do not trust a system that routinely and mistakenly uses chemical weapons against its citizens. My tax dollars should go to funding our schools and social services, not to supporting violence by police.

Police have selectively enforced laws in a way that has harmed our community. I have been a member of several of the protests that have been disbanded by use of chemical agents and sheer brutal force. - -Re-open the Marcus David Peters case; you know, the man who was having a severe mental health crisis when a Richmond Police officer murdered him? I remember growing up believing that a police officer only fires their weapon as a last resort, not because they're terrified of a naked black man. I guess our officers aren't as brave and honorable as we try to pretend they are.
- -Defund RPD aka take SOME of their RIDICULOUS budget away (I can't even begin to comprehend the amount spent recently on teargas and riot gear alone), and reallocate those funds to services that can improve ALL of our lives! Mental health services, education, housing...I'm sure you all know that these areas that could desperately use a boost in funding. -Enact the Marcus Alert system so that trained mental health professionals respond to mental health crisis calls. This is not rocket science. This makes sense. How many people killed by police would still be alive if this system were already in place?
- -Establish a Civilian Review Board—are you a fan of democracy? Great, you should be totally on board with this.
- -Drop the charges against all protestors. Take a look at the points above; this is what these protestors are fighting for. A better, safer, more equitable Richmond. Does it feel right to you that they are thrown in jail for practicing their right to protest, processed through the system for eight long hours in the middle of a pandemic, only to be released and still have to deal with those charges? What about that seems fair or right to you? If you could go back in time, if you were on the city council where Rep. John Lewis was arrested for protesting for his civil rights, would you fight to have the charges dropped? Knowing what you know now?
- -Monuments must go—congratulations, the most performative of all the demands has been almost completely met.
- -Release the names of the RPD officers under investigation for use of force misconduct. You know those "bad apples" everyone's always talking about? I'm so sick and tired of the whole structure of local government protecting corrupt and violent officers. There are people sitting in prison on marijuana charges while violent, power hungry individuals on the force are suiting up in riot gear every night hoping, HOPING to use their pepper spray, their flash bangs, their teargas on Richmond residents. What is going to put a stop to this? More force, more force, and more force is not working. Take a look at Seattle. We're heading that way if this doesn't come under control, and the way to get it under control is to STOP using violent force against protestors and Richmond residents and to start working towards fulfilling their demands for justice.

We have to take a hard turn, at some point. We can't continue like this. Let's turn towards justice and peace, not towards ever growing fear and violence.
