Council President Cynthia Newbille called the meeting to order at 4:02 p.m., and presided.

ELECTRONIC MEETING ANNOUNCEMENT

City Clerk Candice Reid, in accordance with Ordinance No. 2020-093, adopted April 9, 2020, announced the meeting would be held through electronic communication means. City Clerk Reid stated notice of the meeting was provided to the public through a public information advisory issued on July 29, 2020, and through Legistar on the city website in accordance with usual practice. She also stated members of the public were encouraged to provide comments in writing prior to the meeting and all comments received prior to 10:00 a.m., on Monday, August 10, 2020, were provided to Council members. Ms. Reid indicated that members of the public who signed up to speak and provide comment would be called to speak at the appropriate time.

CITIZEN SPEAKER GUIDELINES

Upon the President's request, Deputy City Clerk RJ Warren provided citizen speaker guidelines.

PAPERS FOR CONSIDERATION

The following ordinance was considered:

ORD. 2020-156

To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer, for and on behalf of the City of Richmond, to enter into the Twenty-Third Commercial Area Revitalization Effort Program Cooperation Agreement between the City of Richmond and the Economic Development Authority of the City of Richmond for the purpose of providing for the operation of the Commercial Area Revitalization Effort ("CARE") Program and a business recovery grant program.

Leonard Sledge, Department of Economic Development director, provided an introduction of ORD. 2020-156.

Councilor Kim Gray inquired how an additional \$500,000.00 was identified to provide funding for the Commercial Area Revitalization Effort (CARE) Program. Councilor Gray also requested an update regarding distribution of CARES Act funding to local businesses.

Councilor Ellen Robertson joined the meeting at 4:10 p.m.

Mr. Sledge informed Council that through the CARE Program, local businesses previously received CARE Program loans. Mr. Sledge stated the repayment of the previous loans with added interest provided the newly identified funding for the CARE Program. Mr. Sledge also stated that unused allocated CARE Program funding from previous years rolled over into CARE Program funding currently available.

Councilor Ellen Robertson stated she was concerned that the practice of providing CARE Program funding to businesses outside of CARE designated areas would continue the disenfranchisement of certain areas of the city.

Councilor Gray stated she was concerned about the ongoing potential of additional social unrest causing damage to local businesses. Councilor Gray also stated CARE funding should be distributed as soon as possible to assist local businesses.

There were no further comments or discussions and **ORD. 2020-156 was adopted:** Ayes 7, Larson, Lynch, Gray, Trammell, Addison, Hilbert, Newbille. Noes 2, Jones, Robertson.

To amend and reordain City Code § 9-2, which designates the location for the central absentee voter election district in the city, to relocate and establish a new polling place for the central absentee voter election district.

ORD. 2020-159

To amend and reordain City Code § 9-58, which assigns polling places in the city, to relocate and establish a new polling place for Precinct 206.

ORD. 2020-160

To amend and reordain City Code § 9-58, which assigns polling places in the city, to relocate and establish a new polling place for Precinct 207.

ORD. 2020-161

To amend and reordain City Code § 9-58, which assigns polling places in the city, to relocate and establish a new polling place for Precinct 412.

ORD. 2020-162

To amend and reordain City Code § 9-58, which assigns polling places in the city, to relocate and establish a new polling place for Precinct 702.

ORD. 2020-163

To amend and reordain City Code § 9-58, which assigns polling places in the city, to establish two satellite polling places for in-person absentee voting.

Vice President Chris Hilbert provided additional information regarding ORD. 2020-157, and stated he was working with city administration, the Greater Richmond Transit Center (GRTC) and

City Registrar Kirk Showalter, regarding increased access to the proposed central absentee voter election district.

City Registrar Kirk Showalter stated the central absentee voter election district required a new location due to the need for additional office space necessary to handle absentee voting. City Registrar Showalter also stated that the multiple proposed ordinances addressing voter precinct changes were necessary due to safety concerns regarding the COVID-19 pandemic.

Citizens were provided an opportunity to offer comments in writing regarding ORD. 2020-157, ORD. 2020-158, ORD. 2020-159, ORD. 2020-160, ORD. 2020-161, ORD. 2020-162 and ORD. 2020-163, prior to the Special City Council meeting. All written comments received by the Office of the City Clerk were provided to members of the Council prior to the meeting and are included as an appendix to the August 10, 2020 Special City Council meeting minutes.

Public Hearing

Susan Swecker, Democratic Party of Virginia chairwoman, spoke in support of ORD. 2020-163, and stated it was imperative to make sure citizens have the ability to vote in a safe and secure manner. Ms. Swecker requested that Council consider adding even more satellite voting locations than the two referenced in ORD. 2020-163.

Councilor Kim Gray provided additional information regarding the location change of Precinct 206, referenced in ORD. 2020-159.

Councilor Kristen Larson provided additional information regarding the location change of Precinct 412, referenced in ORD. 2020-161.

President Cynthia Newbille provided additional information regarding the location change of Precinct 702, referenced in ORD. 2020-162.

There were no further comments or discussions and ORD. 2020-157, ORD. 2020-158, ORD. 2020-159, ORD. 2020-160, ORD. 2020-161, ORD. 2020-162 and ORD. 2020-163 were unanimously adopted.

The following ordinance was considered:

ORD. 2020-164

To authorize the Chief Administrative Officer to submit an amended Consolidated Plan and Annual Action Plan to the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as an application for the receipt of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, HOME Investment Partnership (HOME) funds, Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds and Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) funds; to accept funds from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in the total amount of \$6,184,226.00; and to appropriate \$6,184,226.00 for various projects.

Daniel Mouer, Department of Housing and Community Development project development manager, provided an introduction of ORD. 2020-164.

There were no further comments or discussions and **ORD. 2020-164 was unanimously adopted.**

The following resolution was considered:

RES. 2020-R050

To approve the City of Richmond Plan of Services under the Virginia Juvenile Community Crime Control Act.

Dawn Barber, Department of Justice Services director, provided additional information regarding RES. 2020-R050.

Councilor Kristen Larson inquired why expedited consideration of the proposed resolution was requested at the July 27, 2020 Formal Council meeting, and why no one was available from city administration to provide information regarding RES. 2020-R050.

Ms. Barber stated the ordinance and resolution request for RES. 2020-R050 was submitted on July 23, 2020, and that the plan referenced in RES. 2020-R050 was recently adopted by the Virginia Department of Juvenile Justice. Ms. Barber also stated that due to a communication error she was unavailable to participate in the July 27, 2020 Formal Council meeting.

Councilor Larson suggested additional efforts be made to provide meeting participation instructions to city agencies that do no regularly appear before Council.

There were no further comments or discussions and **RES. 2020-R050 was adopted:** Ayes 8, Jones, Larson, Lynch, Gray, Trammell, Addison, Hilbert, Newbille. Noes None. Robertson was excused.

The motion was seconded and approved: Ayes 7, Larson, Lynch, Gray, Trammell, Addison, Hilbert, Newbille. No None. Abstentions 1, Jones. Robertson was excused. RES. 2020-R046, as amended was considered.

Councilor Michael Jones provided additional information regarding RES. 2020-R046, and stated the proposed resolution provided much needed oversight over civil asset forfeitures.

Public Hearing

Allan-Charles Chipman spoke in support of RES. 2020-R046, but he stated the data referenced in the proposed resolution should be submitted quarterly rather than annually. Mr. Chipman requested that additional statistics not addressed in RES. 2020-R046 be required.

Commonwealth Attorney Colette McEachin addressed Council and provided additional information regarding civil asset forfeitures. Commonwealth Attorney McEachin informed Council of the process of distributing funds collected through civil asset forfeitures.

Councilor Michael Jones inquired how the annual report referenced by Commonwealth Attorney McEachin could be accessed and shared.

President Cynthia Newbille requested that Commonwealth Attorney McEachin provide the annual report to Council.

Councilor Ellen Robertson requested the annual report be provided to allow Council the opportunity to determine if current oversight of civil asset forfeitures was sufficient. Councilor Robertson inquired if Council could obtain copies of previous annual reports.

Acting Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) Lenora Reid stated city administration receives the report annually. Acting CAO Reid also stated that city administration would present information before the Finance and Economic Development Standing Committee regarding the requested information.

There were no further comments or discussions and **RES. 2020-R046 was adopted:** Ayes 8, Robertson, Larson, Lynch, Gray, Trammell, Addison, Hilbert, Newbille. Noes None. Abstentions 1, Jones.

President Cynthia Newbille requested to be added as a co-patron of RES. 2020-R046.

No. 2020-133, adopted Jun. 22, 2020, all for the purpose of funding necessary expenditures incurred due to the public health emergency with respect to the COVID-19 pandemic.



Good morning,

I want to express my disappointment with the move the Registrar's office is making from City Hall downtown, to a very inaccessible location on Laburnum Ave. Unless a city resident has a car, there is no easy, efficient way to get to this new location - by bus, bicycle, or on foot, like there is at City Hall. While I understand your need for more space, for the increase in staff, storage and the strong likelihood of skyrocketing absentee voting this coming November, it will make it very hard for many of our city residents to drop off those absentee ballots in person. That drop-off scenario is becoming more and more likely with the news that the US Postal Service will struggle on their end with the expected increased volume of mail-in ballots, all amidst the continuing pandemic.

I'm glad that ORD. 2020-163 has been introduced, which will supply the city with 2 Satellite Voting offices - one back at City Hall and another on the Southside of the James River. It's unfortunate that they can only be open the 2 weeks prior to Election Day and not the full drop-off time allowed, but I understand that timing is an issue due to state-imposed limitations.

All this is to say that ORD. 2020-163 is very important under the current circumstances and I fully support its passing on August 10th. This is a vote that cannot be continued, because time is running short.
