WHEREAS, the Affordable Housing Trust Fund currently receives funding of a maximum of \$1,000,000.00 per year from expiring partial exemptions from real estate taxes and proceeds from the sale of tax delinquent properties; and

WHEREAS, upon information and belief of the Council, the Affordable Housing Trust Fund exists to assist the City in rectifying the disparity between the average housing cost and average income in the Richmond metropolitan area where individuals and families suffering under such disparity are constrained to spend more than 30 percent of their monthly income on housing, making it less likely they are able to afford other necessities, such as clothing and food; and

ORDINANCE/RESOLUTION SUMMARY

The Patron is requesting that the Administration fund the Affordable Housing Trust Fund \$10 million annually. The Patron requests that this funding begin in FY 2022.

BACKGROUND

Summary:

The Affordable Housing Trust Fund (AHTF) currently has dedicated funding from expiring partial exemptions from real estate taxes and proceeds from the sale of tax delinquent properties. Due to limited funding available from these 2 sources, the maximum annual funding they provide to the AHTF is \$1 million annually.

The AHTF exists to assist the City in rectifying the disparity between the average housing cost and average income in the Richmond metropolitan area. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) states that individuals and families spending more than 30% of their monthly income on housing are cost burdened and less likely to be able to afford life's necessities such as clothing and food.

Prior to the Pandemic, Richmond families that were cost burdened struggled with evictions and housing affordability. These families are at a severe disadvantage in their ability to weather the

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economic recession, unemployment, lack of paid sick leave, and mounting evictions resulting from the pandemic. Additionally, as a result of the pandemic more families are in need of housing assistance due to a decrease or loss of wages.
