PURPOSE: To authorize the Acting Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) to accept Nineteen Thousand Five Hundred Eighty-One (\$19,581) from the Virginia Department of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) and to appropriate the same to the Richmond City Sheriff's Office FY2021 Special Fund Budget for the purpose of reimbursing programs, projects, and services that assisted the Sheriff's Office in preventing, preparing for, and responding to the coronavirus. This funding and support includes the following: Richmond City Sheriff's Office (RCSO) - Personal Protective Equipment, Cleaning Supplies and Equipment, Thermometers and Fit Tests.

REASON: The Richmond City Sheriff's Office submitted an application to the DCJS to request support to combat the coronavirus in the City of Richmond.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that this funding is accepted and appropriated to the Richmond City Sheriff's Office FY 2021 Special Fund Budget.

BACKGROUND: DCJS is making \$6.5 million of the federal Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding Grant (CESF) funds available to assist eligible applicants in preventing, preparing for, and responding to the coronavirus. The \$6.5 Million is approximately 60% of the \$10,832,775 CESF grant awarded to the Commonwealth of Virginia. Applicants can apply for no more than \$50,000, unless extraordinary circumstances necessitate a greater need. There is no match requirement. Allowable costs must be utilized to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus pandemic and must adhere to the Federal Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Uniform Guidance

for Federal Awards, 2 CFR Part 200, and the U.S. Department of Justice DOJ Grants Financial Guide effective edition.

I. <u>DESCRIPTION OF THE ISSUE & NEED STATEMENT</u>

About Richmond City Sheriff's Office

The Richmond City Sheriff's Office (RCSO) is one of the largest sheriff's offices in the Commonwealth with nearly 500 sworn and civilian staff members. It is responsible for the operation of the Richmond Justice Center and the safety and security of the residents in its jail. The RCSO is also responsible for the safety of the citizens, judges and staff at its three courthouses: John Marshall, Manchester, and Oliver Hill. The RCSO provides service of civil process and the execution of court ordered documents, transportation of inmates, and the safety of the general public.

The RCSO has an inmate population of nearly 800 individuals housed at the Richmond City Justice Center (RCJC). Protecting the inmates as well as staff from the current coronavirus pandemic is of paramount concern to Sheriff Antionette V. Irving.

Statement of Need

The RCSO has established a pandemic preparedness plan via standard operating procedure in an effort to address the coronavirus pandemic. The plan addresses the implementation of screening procedures via the contracted medical provider in accordance with best practice methods developed by the Richmond City Health District (RCHD), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and World Health Organization (WHO). The plan further addresses infection control procedures to include the contracted medical provider's establishment of isolation and cohort procedures, institutional directives regarding hygiene, and the use of personal protective equipment (PPE). Modified cleaning procedures, booking and intake procedures, staffing, and modification of regular institutional activities such as visitation and delivery round out the plan.

Currently, no cases of coronavirus have appeared thus far at the Richmond City Sheriff's Office. However, despite taking into account best practices and protocols, the coronavirus is still proliferating in correctional facilities statewide, as well as within the public at whole in the greater Richmond region. In implementing the RCSO plan, Sheriff Antionette V. Irving has prioritized the health and safety of RCSO's resident inmates and staff, yet more must be done as the numbers continue to climb across the state, within the region, and within the City of Richmond. The RCSO has allocated significant fiduciary and human resources to address the pandemic and it will need to continue to do so to protect the welfare of facility residents, staff, and city constituency at large.

Prior to the coronavirus pandemic, the RCSO was addressing a vacancy of 70 swom officers, which resulted in increased overtime to ensure the safety of the inmates and staff housed at the facility. As a result of the increased overtime due to the high vacancy rate, the RCSO was



aiready battling a budget shortfall. To combat this, the RCSO engaged in an aggressive recruitment campaign. Although RCSO successfully recruited 23 new deputies recently, staffing vacancy issues remain. In addition, to the prevent spread of coronavirus, 73 non-essential civilian personnel went on rotating leave (with pay) and 20 staff members began telecommuting, which increased the responsibility of sworn officers to ensure the agency remained fully operational. This continued strain on the staffing levels and financial resources of the agency is not sustainable without assistance, such as that offered via DCJS' CESF grant.

II. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Justification

As of June 19th, 2020, the number of confirmed COVID-19 cases in the United States is just over two million (2.17M) with over one hundred eighteen thousand (118,365) deaths. The number of new cases, while appearing to level off, continue to fluctuate at great intervals. New cases ranged from sixteen thousand forty (16,040) on June 1st, 2020 to twenty-seven thousand eighty-two (27,082) on June 18th, 2020.

Also as of this writing, the numbers of cases in Virginia is fifty-six thousand two hundred thirty eight (56,238) with one thousand five hundred eighty-six (1,586) deaths. The number of new cases appear to be declining with intermittent fluctuations. The number of new cases in Virginia on June 1st, 2020 was seven hundred ninety-one (791) while on June 18th, that number dropped to four hundred sixty-three (463).

While correctional facilities in Virginia at first seemed to be able to avoid significant outbreaks, they have become prevalent recently with Norfolk and Hampton Roads experiencing cases in correctional facilities. Central Virginia also experienced outbreaks in juvenile facilities and cases are now appearing in other facilities, such as the Chesterfield jail as well as Riverside Regional Jail. It has become clear that community spread of the virus occurs quickly and that the virus itself has not and will not dissipate easily.

Correctional facilities are still scrambling to keep up with the spread. The amount and frequency of testing and screening has increased to include those who are asymptomatic. Employees and others entering facilities are screened with temporal thermometers. Demand for sanitation and PPE needs have increased despite a decreasing supply/shortage nationwide. Correctional facilities, including RCSO, have spent funds not included in the original budget to provide for supplies and equipment designed to limit the spread of the virus.



RCSO Actions and Challenges

The RCSO is no different in terms of attempting to stay at the forefront of limiting the spread of the virus and protecting residents, staff, and citizens in the surrounding community. However, there are significant obstacles to overcome to ensure that it can continue to stay ahead of the curve. One such obstacle is budget. City of Richmond general funds provided minimally for the needs of the RCSO, however, annual budgeting could not have taken into account the proliferation of the virus and the resulting devastating impact on individuals as well as the economy. RCSO has procured supplies which were not in the agency's original budget in order to sanitize the facility and to keep its staff and immates as safe as possible during the pandemic. As previously referenced, RCSO has 70 sworn staff vacancies and a sworn staff vacancy rate of 19%. Complicating the staffing situation further, the virus has resulted in 73 non-sworn staff members temporarily taking rotating leave with an additional 20 teleworking from home.

While uncertainty remains over testing and reporting accuracy of the virus numbers, it is clear that RCSO and other correctional agencies are struggling to meet the everyday demands of their respective facilities amid an ever uncertain pandemic with adverse economic conditions. Funding for the items listed will help ease the administrative burden that RCSO faces in the wake of an uncertain and ongoing pandemic.

III. STATEMENT OF COORDINATION

RCSO's efforts to combat the spread of the virus and its resulting effects on budget and staffing have been comprehensive. RCSO recently applied for and were awarded, via partnership with the Richmond Police Department and the Commonwealth Attorney's Office, Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding through the Bureau of Justice Assistance. That funding helped to defray costs associated with cleaning supplies and various PPE used in Covid relief efforts for the agency. Similarly, RCSO is working to apply for CESF funding through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) via aggregate application through the City of Richmond. RCSO will be applying through FEMA for reimbursement of personnel costs associated with virus relief efforts. The application is pending and FEMA reimburses at 75% of cost. Even as some of that funding has been awarded, agency expenses on additional supplies and PPE have continued. For example, projected annual spending on janitorial supplies alone in February 2020 was approximately ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000) and the projection currently sits at roughly one hundred forty-six thousand seven hundred (\$146,700.00) due to the ongoing Covid-19 pandemic. RCSO is seeking additional funding to help offset those additional expenses as listed below.

Cleaning Supplies

According to OSHA, information from the CDC, the National Institutes of Health, and other study partners suggests that the virus can survive on certain types of surfaces, such as plastic and stainless steel, for 2-3 days. However, because the transmissibility of the virus from contaminated environmental surfaces and objects is still not fully understood, every effort should be undertaken to maintain routine cleaning and disinfecting of facilities to help reduce the efficacy of the virus and its potential spread.

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

The CDC recommends wearing face coverings in public settings where other social distancing measures are difficult to maintain (e.g., correctional facilities), especially in areas of significant community-based transmission. The CDC also advises the use of face coverings to slow the spread of the virus and help staff who may have the virus and do not know it from transmitting it to others. Gloves protect cleaning staff while dealing with potentially harmful disinfectants and when used properly, may help avoid virus contamination.

Other Supplies

Thermometers are used for screening all who enter the Richmond City Justice Center. Sneeze guards are placed strategically throughout the facility to protect staff as well as inmates from spreading the virus through respiratory droplets. COVID-19 informational signs are for placement throughout the resident sections of the facility and aid in the dissemination of educational information regarding the virus.



Fit Tests

Fit testing confirms the fit of any respirator that forms a tight seal on the user's face before it is used in the workplace. This ensures that staff users are receiving the expected level of protection by minimizing contaminant leakage into the facepiece.

Inmate Supplies

Fresh hand towels, washcloths, towels and sheets are used for the promotion of personal hygiene of residents and increase the rate of linen exchange. Water soluble laundry bags minimize contact between service staff and contaminated laundry before washing. Workbenches allow for separate, socially-distanced work spaces for resident in the laundry area, thereby limiting potential spread of the virus. Coveralls are considered PPE and work to protect residents who are in transport to courts or other facilities. Face coverings slow the spread of the virus and help inmates who may have the virus and do not know it from transmitting it to others. COVID-19 informational signs are for placement throughout the resident sections of the facility and aid in the dissemination of educational information regarding the virus.
