CARES Coronavirus Relief Funds Background

- On March 27th Congress established and passed the "Legislative Intent" Title V: The Coronavirus Relief Fund
- The Commonwealth received the funds and the Commonwealth's Secretary of Finance notified Virginia localities of their allocations in May and August 2020
- The City received \$20.1M in funding under the Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES Act) on June 1, 2020.
 \$3.0M of this revenue was recognized in FY2020 while the remaining balance was deferred as of June 30, 2020. A second allotment of \$20.1M was received August 2020
- Council adopted Ordinance 2020-185 on August 20, 2020 to receive these funds for necessary expenditures incurred due to the COVID-19 public health emergency

CARES Act Spending in Richmond

- Department of Emergency Communications purchased meals for first responders, purchased Plexiglas dividers for call center staff, and invested in improving telework capabilities (\$797K)
- Office of Minority Business Development provided QuickBooks training, laptops, software subscriptions, website design, and marketing support to 52 area small businesses with less than 5 employees (\$612K)
- Department of Housing and Community Development partnered with the nonprofit community to provided direct assistance to Richmond residents in support of the Eviction Diversion program to keep persons housed during the pandemic. Homeward awarded over \$1.3 M in direct payment support to Richmonders. Additionally, the Greater Richmond Continuum of Care (GRCoC) supported of our citizens experiencing homelessness and supported first-time persons who lost their housing and became homeless during the pandemic



Cares Act Spending in Richmond

- Richmond Fire and Emergency Services purchased Deccan Adam predictive modeling software to track the spread of COVID-19 and to determine where cases were on the rise in Richmond. PPE and sanitizing supplies (P100 face masks, KN95 and N95 masks, Tyvek suits and surgical gown, UV cabinets, non-contact forehead thermometers, and hand sanitizers) were also purchased to mitigate risk at all stations (\$466K)
- Richmond City Sheriff's Office utilized its support to continue protecting the welfare of the more than 800 inmates, department staff and constituency at large by investing in COVID-19 and other contagious medical tests (flu, Pneumovax, and shingles), food programs, improving telework, purchasing medical support items like oximeters, nebulizers, spirometers, and nasal cannulas (\$1.02M)
- **Department of Information and Technology** expanded VPN licensing, upgraded capability for Teams remote meetings, purchased laptops for home use (\$500K), expanded internet pipeline to 10GB and increased data sharing capabilities, and modified security infrastructure on primary equipment



Cares Act Spending in Richmond

- Department of Economic Development awarded grants to small businesses and non-profit organizations (\$5.7M), distributed PPE and sanitizer (\$268K), worked with local restaurants to provide meals for Public Safety First Responders (\$236K) supported a Virtual Holiday Market for small businesses (\$130K), supported the Richmond Rate Reduction Program for restaurant meal delivery (\$120K) and helped to fund the relaunch of the Small Business Development Center (\$50K).
- **Department of Public Works** used its funding in support of critical protective measures including Plexiglass installations **\$100k** 500+ installations
 - HVAC Ionization filtering \$450k
 - Continuous Cleaning **\$4M** for Covid-19 positives and PM in 80+ City owned Facilities
