This project allows for the purchase of replacement vehicles and equipment used to provide services throughout the City. The City's Fleet consists of approximately 2100 vehicles and pieces of equipment.

Complete streets is a transportation policy and design approach that requires streets to be planned, designed, operated, and maintained to enable safe, convenient and comfortable travel and access for users of all ages and abilities regardless of their mode of transportation. This project will continue to fund the multiple aspects of complete streets for all citizens of the City of Richmond. This project consists of the former projects: Citywide Traffic Calming, Pedestrian Safety Crossing Improvements, Sidewalk Projects, Streets, Sidewalks, and Alley Improvements, Traffic Control Installation, and Transportation Projects. Increase FY 2022 Funding by \$500,000 with the expectation that \$500,000 will be allocated to speed tables on top of the current expected allocation.

Freeze all new fleet purchases for FY22 that are funded by user fees.

Complete streets is a transportation policy and design approach that requires streets to be planned, designed, operated, and maintained to enable safe, convenient and comfortable travel and access for users of all ages and abilities regardless of their mode of transportation. This project will continue to fund the multiple aspects of complete streets for all citizens of the City of Richmond.

The Department of Parks, Recreation, and Community Facilities (DPRCF), in conjunction with Friends of James River Park, developed a comprehensive updated Master Plan for the Park in 2019. The Master Plan took input from all Council Districts and over 2,300 surveys collected from the City of Richmond residents and the residents of the region to develop a detailed, action oriented plan of development and protection. The plan was introduced to the City Council on Dec. 9th, 2019 for formal adoption. The James River Park is Richmond's largest and perhaps the best known Park in the Region with over 2 million visitors a year and an economic impact on the City of \$33.5 million. Based off of the community developed Master Plan, DPRCF is requesting on-going capital funds to address prioritized infrastructure needs to enhance and preserve the City's largest economic driver. In FY21, the request will provide funding specifically for the North Bank tower repair and the James River Maintenance Operations. The North Bank Tower has been surveyed and found to be structurally deficient with a cost estimate for repair at \$900,000. The Department is requesting funding for FY22 to execute these repairs.

Deductions from Cash for Capital to cover 5th District amendments. The three lakes within Byrd Park are in need of dredging and installation of catch basins or drain inlets and storm drains. The drainage around the Byrd Park lakes and the park maintenance compound are in need of repair. The work shall also take into consideration some of the existing problems, such as algae growth and sand and soil infiltration and accumulation. Maintaining the function and operational efficiencies of the park and its facilities will provide residents and visitors an aesthetically pleasing setting in the historical park. This has been an ongoing issue that was never properly funded. FY22's request of \$600,000 should get us dredging in Fountain Lakes which sees the highest levels of algae and fish dead offs. We will need to continue this to the other lakes in FY23 and FY24 for Swan Lake and Shields Lake. Requesting funding from Cash for Capital account.

Notes

The Carter Jones / Fonticello Park playground equipment was vandalized in November 2020. Due to its age and cost to repair it was quickly removed without any notification. In May 2020, after a community input process a new master plan was adopted. In that plan the playground area is to be relocated within the park and named the Markiya Simone Dickson Imagination Zone. Parks has held

several additional public meeting to discuss the playground equipment with stakeholders. This project is already 81% funded.

The Grayland Tot Lot needs upgrades to become ADA accessible. It is one of a small handful of playgrounds that still uses sand in the city. The Parks Department has been holding meetings throughout 2020-2021 with the Carytown South Civic Association to agree upon a design.

Focused on improving vehicular and pedestrian safety (e.g. retiming the crosswalk) by adding left hand turn signals at the intersections Ellwood & Nansemond, Main & Harrison, and Main & Meadow. These important corridors run through areas with high pedestrian and high vehicular traffic that often conflict with each other. This has been an ongoing request.

The Grayland Tot Lot was set to be replaced when an emergency pulled the funding in a different direction.

This has been an ongoing issue that has never been picked up even through submitted by me and my predecessor. Curb/gutter, and sidewalks in Swansboro & Swansboro West. The flooding in these areas is impacting lower income/elderly families. Swansboro includes all/some of streets between W. 22nd and W. 26th from Semmes to Bainbridge. Please note there are several developments that will be adding infrastructure on their side of the street. Swansboro West includes parts of Wythemar, Larchmont between Wythemar and E. 37th, 3900 block of Marcy Place, Darden, and the 00 block of E. Roanoke Street.The Swansboro neighborhood slowly slopes towards what use to be Canoe Run Ravine that flows into the James River. It sees high volumes of rain. This is the only section of the Swansboro West neighborhood that does not have curb/gutter.This request will also allow for complete street designs that will improve safety of two communities that have high numbers of pedestrians.
