Report on Requested Amendments to *Richmond 300*





Master Plan (aka Comprehensive Plan) - Enabling Legislation

Code of Virginia § 15.2-2223

- "The local planning commission shall prepare and recommend a comprehensive plan for the physical development of the territory within its jurisdiction and every governing body shall adopt a comprehensive plan for the territory under its jurisdiction."
- "The comprehensive plan shall be general in nature, in that it shall designate the general or approximate location, character, and extent of each feature..."
- **Richmond City Charter, Chapter 17** The City Council and the City Planning Commission shall have the power to adopt by ordinance a master plan for the physical development of City, which shall include the items required by the Code of Virginia, and may include, but shall not be limited to:
 - General location, character, and extent of roads, walkways, playgrounds, recreational facilities, parks, squares, stadiums, swimming pools, arenas, waterways, and other public places or ways;
 - General location, character, and extent of all public buildings and public property;
 - General location, character, and extent of slum clearance, and housing and neighborhood rehabilitation projects; and
 - A general plan for railways, streetcars, buses, and all other vehicular traffic.

Plan Implementation Tools

- Section 15.2- 2224 of the Virginia Code identifies several methods available to local governments for implementation of the Master Plan, including:
 - a capital improvements program,
 - a subdivision ordinance, and
 - a Zoning Ordinance and zoning district map.
- In addition to these tools, the City creates plans in many areas including transportation, sustainability, water, sewage, public health, and economic development which support and implement the strategies within *Richmond 300*.
 Not all of these plans are officially adopted by the City Council, but rather are policy plans that guide City decisions. These plans included but are not limited to the Bike Master Plan, the Vision Zero Plan, the RVA Clean Water Plan, the Richmond Connects Plan, RVAgreen 2050, the James River Park Master Plan, the Public Art Master Plan, and the Consolidated Plan.

Creating Richmond 300: A Guide for Growth

- 21 members of the *Richmond 300* Advisory Council volunteered their time for 2.5 years to help guide the plan
- 209 participants in *Richmond 300* Working Groups who crafted the goals, objectives, and strategies of the plan
- 70+ Staff from City departments and partnering agencies who have provided their input throughout this process
- Hundreds of members of civic and stakeholder groups who invited the *Richmond 300* team to over 200 meetings to discuss the plan
- Over 2,000 attendees of Richmond 300 meetings, either in person or virtual, who provided their thoughts on the future of Richmond
- Thousands of Richmonders who took the time to complete surveys and provide comments that shaped this plan






Nodes

Future Land Use


- Future land use designations are visionary and include language about how the area should look and feel in the future, but do not specify what an owner can or cannot legally do with their property.

ADOPTING RICHMOND 300: A GUIDE FOR GROWTH AS THE MASTER PLAN OF THE CITY OF RICHMOND

WHEREAS, Section 17.06 of the City Charter authorizes the City Planning Commission to adopt a Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, harmonious development, a sound economy, attractive residential areas, and the health, safety, and general welfare of the citizens of Richmond can best be achieved with the guidance of a long-range Master Plan: and

WHEREAS, the present Master Plan the City Planning Commission adopted on November 6, 2000, and the City Council approved by Ordinance No. 2000-371-2001-11 is now outdated; and

WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission appointed an Advisory Council by City Planning Commission Resolution 2017-79 to guide the planning process, the staff of the Department of Planning and Development Review held and attended hundreds of meetings and collected thousands of comments and survey responses over the course of three years to create the new Master Plan, and the Advisory Council recommended that the City Planning Commission adopt the new Master Plan at a meeting held on September 16, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission conducted a public hearing on the Draft Master Plan on June 1, 2020, and a public hearing on the Pre-Final Master Plan on September 21, 2020 for the purpose of receiving public comment relative to the Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, the City Planning Commission has reviewed the proposed plan, taken into consideration comments received at its public hearing, and received a report from the Director of the Department of Planning and Development Review, which is contained in the record of this Commission's proceedings:

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Richmond City Planning Commission hereby adopts the *Richmond 300: A Guide for Growth* Master Plan dated September 29, 2020 as the City of Richmond's official Master Plan, which will supersede all parts of the 2001 Master Plan and all amendments thereto, with exception of the Riverfront Plan (Ord. 2012-202-190 and Ord. 2017-148), VUU/Chamberlayne Neighborhood Plan (Ord. 2016-022), Pulse Corridor Plan (Ord. 2017-127), James River Park Systems Master Plan (Ord. 2019-337), and



Amendments Already in the Plan: 17

- Amendments which are already part of the Richmond 300 master plan.
- Examples:
 - Inclusion of Shockoe Small Area Plan as part of Richmond 300
 - Inclusion of Pulse Corridor Plan as part of Richmond 300
 - Affordable housing strategies addressing displacement and gentrification
 - Strategies to increase the viability of transit and other modes of non-automobile travel

Clarifying Amendments: 5

- Amendments that are mainly clarifying or explanatory
- Does not require broad public input or significant community engagement
- Examples:
 - Including Jackson Ward in a small area plan of Gilpin
 - Amending Objective 14.4(a) to "...at or below 50% AMI"
 - Adding examples of colloquial names of Accessory Dwelling Units

Out of Scope Amendments: 24

- Amendments which are either too specific or not relevant to a land use planning document
- Examples:
 - Specific zoning-level requirements or recommendations
 - Very specific requirements for public housing and affordable housing
 - Inclusion of private easements
 - "Burial grounds" as part of the Future Land Use Map

Fundamental Change Amendments: 21

- Amendments addressing elements of the plan which were vetted through extensive community input and would require significant public engagement at both the community and citywide scale.
- Examples:
 - Amendments to the Future Land Use Map
 - Amendments to the Future Land Use categories
 - Amendments to the Future Connections Map
 - Amendments to the Street Typology Map


