Project Description	JXN Ward Walking Tour: JXN is a research-based project rooted in historic preservation through the lens of restorative truth-telling, redemptive storytelling, and reparative community-building. This endeavor is intended to unearth and elevate the under-told narratives of Jackson Ward through a self-guided walking tour through Historic Jackson Ward guided by the use of painted sidewalk stamps and integrated QR code technology activations. The stamps will lead participants to various activation points throughout Jackson Ward highlighting honorary street designations named after pivotal figures in Jackson Ward's history.
