## FRIENDS Association for Children 150 Year Anniversary

Richmond City Council, the governing legislative institution of Richmond, Virginia, in the United States of America, does hereby recognize, honor, and celebrate the FRIENDS Association for Children for 150 years of dedicated service, support, and care for children and families throughout the Greater Richmond Metropolitan area and Central Virginia.

A non-profit organization specializing in childcare, youth development, and family support services, FRIENDS Association for Children serves a broad age range of children: from babies as young as six weeks old to youth 17 years of age. FRIEND's programs and services focus on the critical literacy and developmental skills children need to succeed at school and in life. It also provides development programs for families, young children, and youth, and programs in music, performing arts, and health education.

FRIENDS Association for Children was originally founded as the Friends Asylum for Colored Orphans in 1871 by Lucy Goode Brooks in the Jackson Ward Neighborhood of Richmond. A former enslaved person whose family was torn apart when her daughter, Margaret Ann, was sold and never heard from again, Lucy Goode Brooks was especially concerned for the plight of Black children left orphaned and abandoned in Richmond by former slave owners. She, along with the Ladies Sewing Circle for Charitable Work, appealed to the Richmond-based Quaker Society of Friends to sponsor the orphanage and, with their backing, a plot of land was donated by Richmond City Council to found the orphanage.

FRIENDS Association for Children currently operates two multi-service licensed child development centers in Richmond's Church Hill and Jackson Ward Neighborhoods, both of which aim to provide safe, stimulating, nurturing learning environments.
